

Train-Car Deaths In Oregon Decline

Automobiles tangled with rail-road trains 303 times in Oregon last year, bringing death to 16 persons and injuring 118 more, Secretary of State Newbury reports.

This was a decline from the 21 train-car fatalities recorded a year ago, the secretary said, although the total number of accidents and persons injured increased slightly.

Six deaths occurred inside the limits of incorporated cities and towns while 10 were charged to locations in rural areas.

Safety men said grade crossing accidents could be all but eliminated if all drivers would assume a train is approaching every time they neared a crossing. In rural areas, some accidents stem from a driver's misjudgment of the speed of an approaching train, particularly diesel-powered locomotives which frequently are traveling much faster than they appear to be.

Solution Sought For Problem Of Starving Deer

BAKER—Several suggestions for dealing with the problem of starving deer on the Baker range were advanced during a weekend tour by 120 sportsmen and farmers.

The tour was sponsored by State Game Commission officials who have been criticized for the situation.

Commission officials said scores of animals had starved to death because of the unusually severe winter which had forced the large herd into inadequate forage land.

They said providing the deer with such artificial foods as hay frequently had not worked out when tried in the past, since deer require their normal diet to survive.

Suggestions offered to prevent future mass starvation of the deer included:

Establishment of an either-sex hunting season this fall.

Moving part of the herd to other ranges.

Setting aside certain areas for deer forage exclusively and the development of proper deer feed coverage.

Establishment of a multiple-use program for ranges with stockmen abandoning the practice of burning brush.

SOME STURGEONI

CHEBOYGAN, Mich.—The waters of Mullet Lake have yielded a record-breaking sturgeon.

Ward Spray of Cheboygan speared the fish which weighed 175 pounds, measured 7 feet 2 inches and had a girth of 37½ inches.

The old record, which had stood for four years, was 6 feet 6 inches and 152½ pounds.
