March 9. The rules were suspended and the vote by which the bill was passed was reconsidered and the bill was re-referred to Committee on Alcoholic Traffic on March 10.

The committee reported the bill back with new amendments and with the recommendation that the bill be passed and it was passed by the Senate on April 4. Then it was sent back to the House and the next few days will show whether it will be passed by the House with these amendments, and signed by the speaker and the president and the governor.

It looks like a lot of red tape? Well perhaps it is, but every step in this rather arduous procedure is an attempt at protecting the people of the state from hasty and ill-thought out legislation which might have dire and unforeseen results. And at every step along the way there has been opportunity for the citizens of the state to voice approval or disapproval of the legislation.

Needless to say, only a small fraction of the over one thousand measures that have been introduced will successfully navigate these hurdles and live to see the light of day from a page of the Oregon Statutes.

and safety. Bryden points out. Logs can be picked up either side by operator Manley Kemper, and he can reach down into six or eight feet of water if necessary to reach "sinkers."

So that he will have a choice of size and length and a steady supply, pondmen keep the logs moving up to the loader. To assist the pondmen are electric pusher motors, similar to outboards, along bounding walkways. The pushers help move the logs toward the loader and are especially useful against the consistent north wind.

The system, supervised by Ray Wilkinson, has been keeping 14 truck drivers and four pondmen busy, a vital employment factor during the winter logging lull in the snow-covered hills.

Mario Lanza's Appearance Off

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Where does Mario Lanza go from here? That was the question the show world pondered today after the tenor failed to appear and was fired from the world's highest salaried night club date.

The Hotel New Frontier yesterday canceled Lanza's contract, which called for \$100,000 for two weeks of singing twice a night.

Lanza, his wife Betty, their four children and two nurses were scheduled to motor back to Hollywood today. The rest of their entourage pulled out last night.

A friend reported Lanza was heartbroken by his failure to keep the date. The reason is more than professional. He expected to use the \$100,000 to rent a new house. Heavily in debt to the government for past income taxes, he now plans to rent an apartment. For the past three months he has been living in Palm Springs and preparing for the abortive night club engagement.

"He was in a good mood and talking very sensibly," a close friend said. "He remarked that he guessed 'that motion picture is my business.'"

Lanza apparently will go back to the movies. He is under contract to Warner Bros. for the James M. Cain story "Serenade."

The East Myrtle Creek area (Herman's Addition and surrounding sections) presented the Myrtle Creek City Council with a petition for annexation at the meeting Tuesday night.

Correspondent Ruth M. Evans reported the petition carried 199 names. The council tabled action on the petition until its next meeting after considerable discussion. It will come before the council again next week, Tuesday, April 12.

He promised members of the American Legion that there would be the actual painting if the paint were furnished. The council agreed to free the funds. Evergreen Park is city-owned.

Former Teacher Writing Poetry

A former Roseburg high school teacher is acquiring a reputation as a poet of national note.

He is Dr. Walter E. Kidd, who taught English at the local school in the early 1930s. Under the pen name of Cornelia Peniston, Dr. Kidd said he is represented in "The Poetry Awards of 1955" by his poem "Honey in Rock." The poem was first printed in "The Virginia Quarterly Review."

Dr. Kidd is an editorial member of "Twentieth Century Literature," a scholarly and critical journal. The first issue of the magazine will be printed this month, he added.

He is a graduate of the University of Oregon. His book length collection of poems entitled "Slow Fire of Time" recently was awarded first prize at the Southwest Conference.

Several of his stories, reviews and poems have appeared in national publications.

ing the unit carried over from last year. A budget goal of \$19,000 still must be reached before Douglas County will be assured of a program, he said.

Beecher, in submitting an itemized report of the budget, noted that the greatest outlay of expense went for the blood program (\$1,150); assistance to the Armed Forces (\$2,500); and to telephone, telegraph and postage (\$1,600). The Armed Forces assistance, Beecher said, comes through an appointment of the Defense Dept. and must be continued at all costs. Some 900 Douglas County servicemen now receive aid and communication assistance through the Red Cross.

Other items on the budget which more directly affect Douglas County residents as a whole include nursing services, (\$100); First Aid (\$150); water safety, (\$150); and public information, (\$100). An executive secretary, Mrs. Mildred Herman, is maintained in the office and at home on 24-hour duty for a salary of \$2,700.

Remaining items on the budget include rent, \$720; office supplies, \$250; gas and oil \$200; national quota, \$8,450.

The drive for funds will continue as long as is necessary to assure a program in Douglas County. Beecher concluded. Volunteers may contact OR 3-3255 or OR 2-3908 to offer their services.

cal leasing agent for the new development, which has been incorporated and will be known as the Roseburg Shopping Center.

First project to be completed will be the new Safeway store. It will be one of the largest and most modern of the company's food stores in southern Oregon, according to O. R. Blair, Safeway realty manager, who joined in an announcement today.

"This store will include the most up-to-date fixtures and interior decoration that have been tested and approved by our company," Blair said. "The building will be of permanent, fireproof construction similar in appearance to our other latest, larger supermarkets. It will feature a covered walkway and a newly designed, comfortable lobby."

The Safeway store will be 135 x 180 feet and will be connected with the adjoining shops by a covered patio. The Roseburg Shopping Center buildings will be set back on the property, facing toward Prune Street (Garden Valley Road), with the parking lot in front of the buildings.

"It is not our intention to close the present midtown location," A. G. Anderson, Safeway district manager, said. He explained the new Safeway development represents the company's confidence in Roseburg's growth.

Stassen Refuses To Produce 10 Requested Papers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Harold E. Stassen refused Wednesday pending a further "review" to produce 10 documents called for by the Senate investigations subcommittee in its inquiry into a Pakistan grain storage project.

The Foreign Operations Administration head took his stand at a hearing in which: 1. Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) accused Stassen of lying under oath and demanded he be called before a grand jury "for indictment." Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) brushed aside the McCarthy-Stassen clash for the time being.

2. Stassen announced he will start all over on the Pakistan project, calling for new bids, to make sure "no breath of scandal" touches the multi-billion dollar operations of FOA.

The agency had selected the Agricultural Construction Co. of Los Angeles for the job but the final signing was held up after the committee planned its inquiry. Sen. Symington (D-Mo.) complained that the chosen bid was the highest submitted.

Aged Brockway Resident Dead

Alpa Jane Rowland, 92, resident of Brockway, died Tuesday evening at a local hospital. She was born Jan. 23, 1863, in Louisville, Ky., and came to Roseburg in 1912. She was preceded in death by her husband a number of years ago. There are no known survivors. She was a dominican of the St. George Episcopal Church.

Anthony Eden Takes High British Position

sleek black limousine depart. "Good luck to you, Sir Anthony!" a small crowd shouted on his return to the foreign office in Downing Street to wind up his business there.

"Thanks, thank you all very much," he replied with a wave and a nod of his iron-gray head. His first major duty as Prime Minister was to pick his cabinet, and several important changes were expected. The biggest was the naming of his own foreign secretary. The general assumption in London was that the nod would go to Defense Minister Harold Macmillan, 60, a director of the Macmillan Publishing Co. and a wartime friend of President Eisenhower.

Eden's succession to No. 10 Downing St. touched off the first heavy shots in the campaign for the general election he is expected to call within months. Many politicians are expecting a vote as early as May 25.

Even while Eden was at the palace leaving laborite Rebel Aneurin Bevan cut loose with a political blast which tipped the line that many Socialists are likely to take in the drive to unseat the conservative party.

"Scarcely adequate to meet the challenge of the new hydrogen age," Bevan wrote in the weekly tribune, adding:

"The problem for Sir Anthony Eden is that he does not possess a personal ascendancy over the rest of his colleagues."

Therefore, Bevan charged, Britain is likely to pass from personal to "committee" leadership, with no strong hand at the helm.

Eden, like Churchill, a friend and staunch ally of the United States, was certain to carry out many of the policies he and his old chief worked out together in the years of their close partnership. That association began as far back as 1938, when Eden—then 41—quit the government of Neville Chamberlain in a dramatic protest against appeasing the Axis dictators.

Eden's forceful refusal to give way was one of the political steps that first brought him under the personal wing of Churchill, who with the same vigor opposed yielding to the threats of Hitler and Mussolini.

"He seems to me at this moment to embody the life force of the British nation," Churchill said at the time.

Churchill reappointed him to the foreign secretaryship soon after he took over as Prime Minister May 10, 1950, eight months after the outset of World War II. Again when Churchill returned to No. 10 Downing St. in 1951 after six years of Laborite rule in the country, the war leader called his protégé to direct foreign relations.

Their association was so close that it ultimately led to a merger of their two families. Eden divorced his first wife, the wealthy Beatrice Beckett, in 1950 on grounds of desertion. Two years later he married Churchill's niece, Clarissa Churchill, now 34.

lications for dam construction licenses.

Holland Houston, Langlie's power advisor, testified at the hearing the half-billion-dollar federal dam would be a "flagrant dissipation" of the taxpayers' money. And he urged that steam plants be used in the Columbia Basin power system to replace "cyclical" reservoirs (those which cannot be refilled annually).

Patterson announced Monday he would testify against the proposed federal dam legislation.

Neither governor has come out for Idaho Power's 3-dam plan, which is before the FPC.

Three senators and three representatives, the latter members of the House Interior Committee, flew here late Tuesday following a hearing at Pasco, Wash. The group was in Boise and Pocatello, Idaho, Monday.

Presiding Wednesday was Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore), co-sponsor of the Hells Canyon bill and a foe of the Republican administration's partnership plan for construction of power dams by federal and non-federal groups.

In the group were Sen. Morse (D-Ore), who introduced the bill and also has fought the partnership plan, Sen. Dworshak (R-Idaho) and Reps. Green (D-Ore), Post (D-Idaho) and Sisk (D-Calif.). Mrs. Green and Mrs. Post are sponsoring Hells Canyon bills in the House.
