Red China Has Done Much Purging Since Communists Took Over Government

(Editors: Fred Hampson, Associated Press bureau chief in Hong Kong, watched first hand as the Chinese Communists took Shanghai, where he was chief of bureau until forced to leave six months later).

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Red China has done much purging since the Communists gained control in 1949, and the fate of Kao Kang and Jao Shu-shih proves that the highest heads can roll there too.
Earlier, purges all were class purges. Party men sometimes got caught in the elimination of landlords, unreformable bourgeoisie, unrepentant nationalists, exploiters, actionaries and enemies of the people, as the purges were labeled. But never above middle levels and never for reasons of party rebellion. No Peiping satrap fell until Kao Kang disappeared—fatally as it turned out—in January, 1954.
Li Li-San, the Russian trained doctrinaire, disappeared two years ago but has reappeared and seems to have regained some ground. He at least has not been shot.
Po Yi-Po, former finance minister, faded conspicuously two years ago but he was washed away enough of his sins that he has been allowed to be elected to the National Congress.
Kao's suicide ends the myth that the Chinese Reds never let central committee or equivalent blood flow. Jao's failure to "repent" indicates some form of "suicide" awaits him too.
Three years ago Kao sounded like the biggest man in China next to Mao Tse-tung himself. As boss of the Manchurian semi-autonomous region he had rebuilt much of the industrial maze built by the Japanese and looted by the Russians. Compared to the rest of China, Manchuria looked good. Kao talked on every conceivable subject. The Red press printed it all and people begin to think that here was Mao's successor.
Then he was put in charge of the first five year plan. He no longer had the freedom of action he had had in Manchuria and at the end of the first three months had to cut the first year's targets by a third.
The Reds say he was conspiring to seize power and that Jao joined him. Maybe, Kao appears to have been ambitious. But there was another story—that he told the party bluntly that its policies were hamstringing the industrial plan and that the fault lay not in leadership in the field but in party directives. From all you can find out about the five year plan, Kao was right. He also is dead.

The Chinese Nationalists say this purge reflects internal troubles in Red China and that any further retreat—such as at Matsuo or Quemoy—would only ease the pressure in Peiping. Some Nationalists say Kao was too independent in Manchuria and that the Russians dealing with him were afraid they might get caught in a dangerous intrigue and chose to work for his removal. One Nationalist says: "This is a Russian purge in China."

Major Earthquake Hits California Gulf Area

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—A major earthquake, probably centered in the Gulf of California, Mexico, was recorded here Tuesday by seismologist Fred Robinson. The quake was not felt in San Diego. Robinson said the shock started at 7:10:51 a.m., Pacific standard time, and continued for 30 minutes. There have been previous heavy quakes centered in the area, 800 to 1,000 miles south of San Diego. Damage has been slight because lower California and the coast of Mexico's mainland are generally sparsely inhabited in the area.

Mary Pickford Bids High For United Artists Lot
HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Top offer for the old United Artists Studio lot has been submitted by Mary Pickford, court appointed referee has disclosed. She bid \$1,525,000 and hopes to acquire the property April 10 unless higher bids are made in open court at that time. Superior Judge Paul Nourse ordered the property sold in connection with a partition suit between Miss Pickford and Sam Goldwyn. He set April 20 for confirmation of the sale.

Geological Survey Maps Southern Oregon Areas
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Geological Survey's topographical mapping program includes several quadrangles in Southern Oregon which have been given "first priority" by the state's mapping advisory committee, the office of Rep. Elsworth (R-Ore) said Tuesday. Additional mapping will be authorized later this spring when the new annual program is developed. The Survey advised.
Top priority was given by the state committee, an advisory group working with the Geological Survey, to work in the unmaped quadrangles in Southern Klamath and Lake counties.
A quadrangle is roughly 750 square miles.

Traffic Tangles At No. 10 Downing Street In London

LONDON (AP)—Traffic tangled itself into an historic jam Tuesday in a dead end thoroughfare named Downing Street.

The cause was a cabinet meeting—maybe Winston Churchill's last as Prime Minister—at No. 10. Ministers dashed helter-skelter into the street looking for their cars. . . some automobiles blocked others. . . Albert Roach, 69, fell to his knees and began to pray on the pavement.
In the midst of the confusion Sir Anthony Eden, who is to be the next Premier, decided to walk back to his office.
"Will there be any big news today, Sir Anthony?"
The foreign secretary looked as startled at the question as if he'd been hit over his handsome head. "Really!" he fairly gasped. "Really! Good morning."
Lord Woolton, chairman of the Conservative Party, the man who'll have a big role if a general election is called—strode into the street.
"Where's my car?" he asked. "I'm afraid it's temporarily blocked, sir," said a policeman. "Lord Woolton, are you in for big news today?" asked a news man.
"Big news? Is there going to be any big news today?"
"Now, how would I of all people know?" he said with a laugh. Then he added, wishing his right eye. "But I wouldn't go fishing if I was you. Mind you, I said nothing."

A crowd of several hundred people—helmeted lighters, children and American war veterans—packed Downing Street, stared at the cabinet members and interviewed one another.
Five-year-old Henrietta Dunning, of Holham, perhaps had the most original explanation of what was happening.
"Mr. Winston is resigning," she said. "This means the Queen's going to run the country."

Teacher Hiring Problem, States Oregon Educator

SPOKANE (AP)—An Oregon educator Tuesday described the teacher procurement problem in the Northwest as "one of the worst we have faced in years."
Donald A. Emerson, deputy state superintendent of schools in Oregon, said state colleges in the Northwest have fewer graduates ready to enter the teaching profession while the school population continues to grow and the need for instructors increases.
"We have made some strides in making the teaching profession more attractive for men and women alike, but we must go still further in providing good salaries and living conditions," he said.

Emerson, here for the 53rd annual convention of the Inland Empire Education Assn., said many teachers are leaving the profession, including young women who are quitting to raise families.
More than 2,000 teachers are expected from Northwest states for the convention opening Wednesday and Emerson predicted teacher procurement officers during the sessions.
Some 300 educators were here Tuesday for pre-convention conferences.

Walla Walla Prison Hunt Produces Weapons

WALLA WALLA (AP)—Continuing the investigation of the fatal stabbing of a state penitentiary inmate, Warden Lawrence Delmore Jr. said here recent prison "shakedown" had turned up knives and other weapons and equipment which could be used in escape attempts.
Delmore said among items: guards found hidden in the prison were makeshift ladders and pipes that could be fitted together and a rope with a hook on the end. Knives were found in the prison powerhouse.
The latest "shakedown" was ordered after the fatal stabbing Saturday night of Ralph Stevenson, 22, of Seattle. Stevenson was knifed as he sat in the darkened prison motion picture theater.
Delmore said Charles N. Lambert, 22, later orally confessed the slaying.
