Indians Grab Five Matches For 66th Win

Roseburg downed Grants Pass in abbreviated matches 5-0 Tuesday afternoon here to roll to a 66th straight dual match triumph.

The Indians of coach Al Hoffman won four singles matches, split one and won one double match. Indian batters won routinely, with all five match wins coming in two sets.

The day's fifth singles engagement ended with the two contenders, Jim Coen of Roseburg and Jack Russell of the visitors each having won one set. That match and the second double match were called off when Grants Pass was forced to catch a bus.

Possibly the day's easiest decisions came when Wayne Henninger and Jim Powell combined to win a 6-0 and 6-4 doubles match and Powell thumped rival Bruce Merrill by the same margin in the number three singles match.

Chicago Team Moves Into ABC Tie For 1st

FORT WAYNE, Ind. — One Chicago team moved into a tie for first place and a second Windy City quintet blew an opportunity to take over the lead in Tuesday night's competition in the American Bowling Congress tournament.

The Cole Finner-Mercure team posted a 3,015 total to tie Howard's Clothes, of St. Paul, Minn., which had held the lead since the tourney opened March 26. The Chicago team, paced by 18-year-old Morrie Oppenheim, had games of 1,055, 982 and 978. Oppenheim shot a 653 series while anchor-man Stan Weglarz had 614 and Carl Berker a 614.

Local Harriers Win Springfield Meet; Robbins Hits Top Mile; Sprinter Stars

Roseburg trackmen picked up 11 clear-cut first places and tied for a twelfth as they galloped to a 78 1/2 to 43 1/2 dual track meet win over Springfield on the losers' track Tuesday.

The Indians swept only one event, the javelin, but scored 59 points on first places to subdue the home team.

Sprinter Ronnie Lowe, who ran a 10.5 100-yard dash, and distance man Mark Robbins were double winners for the Indians. Lowe also won the 220-yard dash while Robbins took first in both the mile and 800 yard runs.

Robbins turned in his best mile time of the year in his third effort of the season, running the event in 1:37.9.

In another notable performance, javelin thrower Henry Hall uncorked a throw of 165-10 to lead the Indian sweep in that event.

Springfield won the javayee meet by a score of 74-48. Freshman Byron Auer pole vaulted nine feet for the Indians and shot putter Larry Exceen won that event with a 43-11 throw in his first competitive meet.
