 The 1955 Pacific Coast League baseball season started with a bang Tuesday—several in fact. Home runs decided four of the five games.

Joe Ginsberg's grand slam homer sent Seattle off to a winning start as the Rainiers clubbed Oakland, 8-2. The Los Angeles Angels socked four homers out of their home park in thumping Portland 9-5, and round-trippers figured in the doubleheader split between San Diego and San Francisco.

It was a ninth inning single, however, that set up Hollywood's 4-3 win over Sacramento.

Seattle, picked by many sports writers to go all the way, combined heavy hitting and tight pitching to upend Oakland, regarded as another top contender.

Ex-big leaguer Ginsberg, one of the many new players signed by Seattle during the winter, hit his grand slammer in the eighth to break up a pitching duel. Vic Lombardi limited the Oaks to five hits in his first start for Seattle. The former Brooklyn and Pittsburgh southpaw struck out seven.

At San Diego, the San Francisco Seals held the defending champion Padres to a split.

Arm Trouble Bothers Brooklyn's Karl Spooner As Braves Win, 8-0

 It begins to look as if the Brooklyn Dodgers may not have Karl Spooner any sooner this season than last.

The 23-year-old lefty was the kid who broke up the wake held by the Brooklyn faithful at the tail end of the 1954 campaign after the New York Giants had laid the Brooks to rest.

Spooner came up from Fort Worth and in two starts he set the Giants on their ears 3-0 and bunched off Pittsburgh (the club that slugged the Dodgers in the home stretch) 1-0. His 15 strikeouts against the National League champs was a league record for a first appearance. And the 12 strikeouts he added against the Bucs gave him a NL mark for two consecutive games.

Over the winter, Spooner had a balky right knee set right and he showed up for spring training ready to fire. Trouble was, he fired too hard too soon.

A shoulder pain made him rest a while. Then he threw against the White Sox and did well, but felt the pain again. He rested again, coming back April 1 for three innings against Milwaukee.

Is That So!

"With the angling season bearing down on us, can't you put us straight on the origins of our great sport? The early tackle used? And for us dry fly nuts, perhaps give something of its history?" writes J.O.B. an Oakland Tribune reader.

Frankly, J.O.B., there are few things I would rather discuss. As you perhaps know, angling as a sport reaches into antiquity. In fact, the oldest representation of an angler with a rod goes back almost 4,000 years and shows some fishing with a short 6-foot rod.

Just which type of angling came first—rod, spear, net—is debatable. The three methods were used before 2,000 B.C.

THE FIRST mention of fishing with a fly—it may have been a natural fly impaled upon a hook—is right around the time of Christ. Martial writes, and he's the first as far as we know: "Who has not seen the Scurus rise, decoyed, and killed by fraudulent flies?"

Two centuries later, Aelian is the first to tell exactly how artificial flies were tied by the Macedonians who caught fish. "With speckled skins," he wrote: "They fasten red wool around the hook and fix on to the wool two feathers which grow under a cock's wattles, and which in color are like wax."

The next mention of artificial flies is 1,400 years later—and the book is the Treatise of Fysshynge with an Angle, compiled by a woman, too—Dame Berners, a prioress of a Nunery.

FOLLOWING THIS, in 1653 Isaac Walton wrote his immortal book, The Compleat Angler, which has gone into some 250 editions (of which my revised and edited edition for the 300th anniversary is perhaps the last).

Meanwhile, the Greek philosopher Aristotle was the first to blaze the trail for the discovery of scale reading—which came some 2,100 years later with the invention of the microscope—saying: "The old fish are distinguished by the size" (Get this!) "and the hardness of their scales."

In these early days, the rod made of cane or some light elastic wood, was only 6-8 feet long. The line was made of the bristly hairs of animals, mainly horsehairs. Usually the braided line, no longer than the rod, was fastened to the top of the rod. The hook was made of bone, thorns, iron or bronze.

The principle of the "loose running line" was not evolved until the middle of the 17th century. Hence the playing of big fish was a difficult matter—the custom being to throw the rod into the water immediately, letting the big fish fight the rod and tire out after which the exhausted fish was

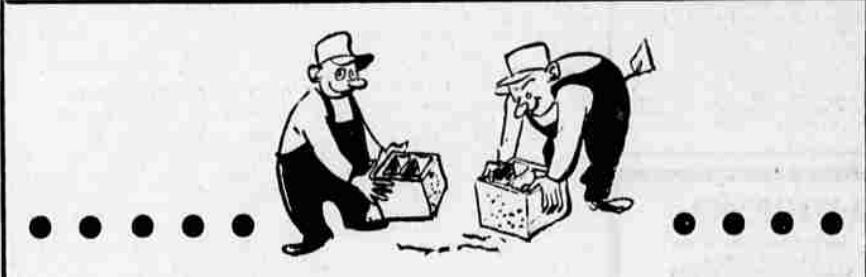
