FULLERTON PTA HAS INTERESTING MEETING MONDAY

The April meeting of Fullerton PTA held Monday evening drew a crowd of over 150 persons who enjoyed a meeting centering about the theme: "Let's Honor Our Youth." Special guests for the evening were Dr. James Millar, pastor of the Roseburg Presbyterian Church, Fullerton first grade teachers and youth leaders from Fullerton youth groups.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Arthur Lamka, and a welcome was extended by her to all present. Presentation of colors was made by boys from Cub Scout Den 3 of Fullerton Pack 114, who then led the flag salute under direction of Den Chief, Steven Dorsey. Inspirational for the evening was a meditation taken from the current State PTA Bulletin. Minutes were read by the secretary, Mrs. Robert Beardsley, and a treasurer's report was given by Mrs. Lamka in the absence of Mrs. R. G. Brady, treasurer.

First vice president, Mrs. Ted Prusia, gave a report on the executive board meeting held March 25. Chairman's reports included one from Lyle Eddy, Safety and Visual Education chairman, which covered the year's work in the classrooms under that heading; membership report from Mrs. Marlin Cox, chairman, which stated that the third grade had won the March room prize and that membership now showed 481 parents and teachers enrolled in Fullerton PTA; not-look report from Mrs. Frank Morrison, chairman, which stated that 128 had attended the 4th grade potluck in March, making the year's total thus far 869 who have attended the various potluck dinners. Next potluck dinner was announced for April 14 for the fifth grade. Special reports included one from project chairman, Mrs. Millard Magness, and stated that the year's school project is well under way. The auditorium public-address system has been installed, two room-size record players have been ordered, additional records for the record-library are being purchased and trees for the playground will be planted in the near future. These items are being purchased by the PTA for the school.

Mrs. Helen Hanford, program chairman, who is volunteer director of the Fullerton boys and girls chorus, a PTA project for youth sponsored and financed by the PTA, reported that a performance by the chorus could be expected at the regular May PTA meeting and that ample time should be allowed that night for such performance which will be in the form of a two-act operetta with costumes and scenery. At present there are 30 boys and 56 girls in the chorus.

An audit committee was appointed to include Clifford Baxter, Donald Reed and Austin Drake. A report from this committee will be received in May after the treasurer's books have been audited. All chairmen were advised by Mrs. Lamka to turn in a typed report showing work done by them during the year and offering suggestions for next year, said reports to remain in the permanent file. It was announced that the preschool tea will be under the direction of Mrs. Vance Shugart and Mrs. Ted Prusia and will be held later this year honoring all preschool parents, whose children will enter Fullerton next fall.

Youth leaders from various groups in Fullerton were acknowledged by Mrs. Lamka and commended on the fine work being done with youth. This year there are 48 adult leaders in the Cub Scout group and Camp Fire and Blue Bird groups which are sponsored by Fullerton PTA. Other groups include 4-H workers and Boy Scout leaders.

The meeting was turned over to Mrs. Helen Hanford, program chairman, who introduced the first grade teachers. They were Mrs. Bodemer, Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Meiling, Mrs. Blehman and Mrs. Wilhoff. The first grade teachers used their portion of the program to explain some of the technique of teaching children to read, with Mrs. Bodemer acting as spokes-

man. Parents in the audience were a make-believe first grade class and enjoyed a very interesting and unique instruction period as students of Mrs. Bodemer.

Guest speaker of the evening was Dr. James Millar who used as his theme: "Youth In The World Today" and brought out in his talk how the home and school combined to develop "attitudes" in the child which could be the basis for good character and good citizenship. After the short address by Dr. Millar, an interesting panel discussion was held with six 6th grade Fullerton students as members and Dr. Millar acting as moderator.

Also included on the program was a short skit "Postures On Parade" by the 4th grade. The skit was aimed to show the benefit from and steps to correct posture.

Parents were invited to view the displays furnished by the first grade students of Fullerton which had been placed about the auditorium and those places along the hallway furnished by children of youth groups in the school including Camp Fire girls, Bluebirds, Cub Scouts and 4-H groups.

Refreshments were served by the 2nd grade parents as parents and teachers enjoyed a social hour. The next meeting is scheduled for May 2 from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.
