

Committee Backs Education Bills

SALEM (AP) — The House Education Committee Tuesday recommended passage of Senate-approved bills to let the governor select Board of Higher Education members from any city in the state, and repeal the law requiring physical education and health instruction in schools.

Before Portland State College became a full-fledged unit of the state higher education system, members of the Board of Higher Education could not reside in cities where state colleges were located.

In urging junking of the law requiring physical education and health programs, Rep. Charles A. Tom, Rufus, committee chairman, suggested amending the bill to repeal other sections of the statute requiring the teaching of morality and temperance ethics, kindness to animals and observance of Arbor Day.

Other committee members dissented, saying that because of lateness of the legislative session, bills changes probably would get scant attention.

Rep. Loucks Opposes Marion Sub-Districting

SALEM (AP) — Rep. Al Loucks, parting company with the other three Marion County representatives has announced that he opposes the Marion County sub-districting bill because it would help the Democrats.

The bill, introduced by the four Marion County House members, would divide the county into two sub-districts to elect state representatives. One would include Salem and four suburban territories and the other would be the rest of the county.

Democrats and labor representatives supported the measure at the hearing.

OPIUM RING SMASHED

ROME (AP) — A multi-million dollar smuggling ring whose opium and morphine was intended for S. addicts has been smashed. The move was made by Lebanese customs officers, cooperating with the U. S. Bureau of Narcotics and police of Syria, Turkey, Italy, France and Egypt.

Student-Teacher Ratio Increased For State Schools

SALEM (AP) — The Legislature's Ways and Means Subcommittee on Higher Education tentatively has agreed to increase the permitted number of students per faculty member in the state university and colleges.

In general, each faculty member would have an average of two more students.

The ratios now are 15.1 students per faculty member at the University of Oregon, 13.3 at Oregon State College, and 16.7 to 23.3 at the colleges of education.

Sen. Gene L. Brown, Grants Pass, chairman of the subcommittee, said the recommendations would save the general fund considerable money.

The subcommittee also agreed to increase fees for resident students \$10 a quarter. Non-resident students would also get an increase which would vary according to the institution.

The subcommittee also made the following recommendations: Don't give scholarships to students from other states.

Give half of the foreign scholarships to Oregon residents.

Compel the Board of Higher Education to spend its receipts from fees and other outside sources before spending its general fund appropriation. This would give the Legislature strict budget control over how the fee money is spent.

Combine the administrative and clerical staffs of the medical and dental schools, but keep them under separate deans.
