

## Col. McCormick Leaves Big Estate For Charities

CHICAGO (AP) — The major portion of the vast publishing empire of the late Col. Robert R. McCormick has been left in trust for charity and education.

This was disclosed Tuesday in the reading of the will of the 74-year-old editor and publisher of The Chicago Tribune, who died Friday after two years' illness. The will was executed last Dec. 18 and is expected to be filed for probate this week.

McCormick named three executives of The Tribune as executors who likewise assumed management of the newspaper. They are Chester M. Campbell, vice president of The Tribune Co. who was elevated to president by the board of directors; William D. Maxwell, formerly managing editor of The Tribune and now placed in charge of the editorial department, and J. Howard Wood, treasurer of The Tribune Co. and now in charge of the business, advertising and circulation departments of The Tribune.

After disposing of numerous individual bequests and annuities, the will provided for the remainder of the estate to be established in two trusts. No value of the estate's holdings was disclosed. They include, however, McCormick's shares of stock of The Tribune and his beneficial interests in the McCormick-Patterson trust.

## Jane Powell Proves Hit As Soloist In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Jane Powell, Portlander who has become a movie star, was guest soloist with the Portland Symphony Orchestra Tuesday night and music critics spoke favorably of her talents.

Writing in the Oregon Journal, Frederic Rothchild said "as far as projecting the songs, as far as tempo and phrasing are concerned, Miss Powell is good. As to what she might sound like without her voice magnified to super-normal strength by a public address system, I can only guess. She should sound fine, but there was no way to find out."

Hilmar Grondahl, in the Oregonian, said Miss Powell left Portland as a wisome tyro of promise and returned "a singer of charm and skill."

The conductor was George Stoll, who used to conduct theater orchestras here many years ago.

## BLM Schedules Another Timber Sale On May 4

The Roseburg office of the Bureau of Land Management has scheduled another small timber sale this month and a big one May 4.

Sealed bids on two small tracts will be received April 20 at 9 a. m. in the office at 132 S. Jackson St. A 0&I tract of green timber southeast of Glide contains 70,000 board feet of Douglas fir. The fir, appraised at \$14.60, will sell for no less than \$1,022 total price. A sale of 32,000 feet of public domain timber south of Coles Valley is appraised at \$235.20.

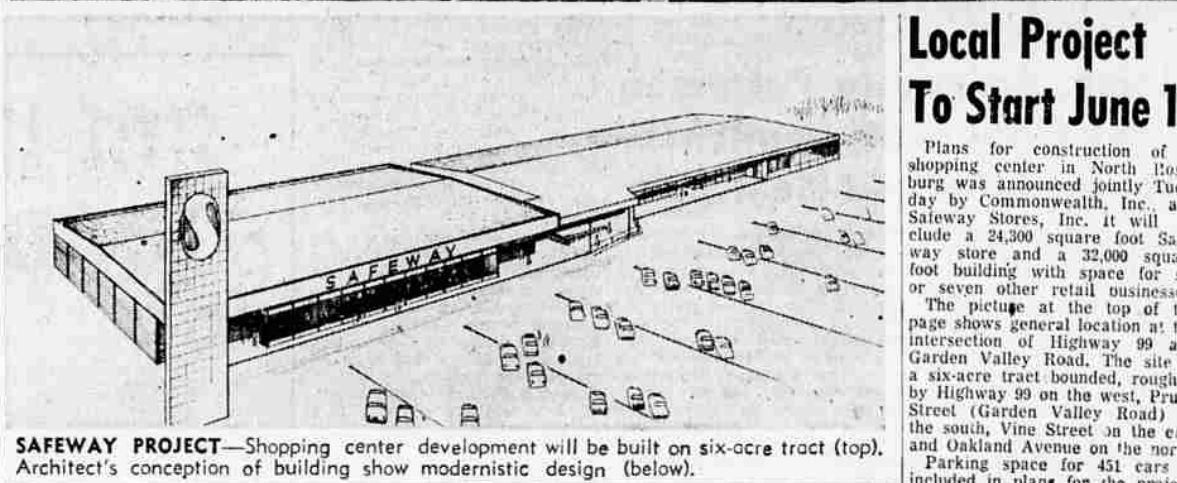
The big sale May 4 includes 6,233,000 board feet appraised at \$101,925. One tract east of Olalla contains 1,648,000 feet appraised at \$27,600.90. Douglas fir is appraised at \$17.45 per thousand.

The biggest tract contains 2,955,000 board feet appraised at \$47,627.9 and \$18.20 per thousand for Douglas fir. It is located northeast of Tiller.

Another tract east of Myrtle Creek contains 1,386,000 feet appraised at \$23,804.20. Douglas fir is appraised at \$17.60.

A small tract of 244,000 feet west of Myrtle Creek is appraised at \$2,892. Douglas fir is appraised at \$11.85.

# Shopping Center Plans Revealed

## Local Project To Start June 1

Plans for construction of a shopping center in North Roseburg was announced jointly Tuesday by Commonwealth, Inc. and Safeway Stores, Inc. It will include a 24,300 square foot Safeway store and a 32,000 square foot building with space for six or seven other retail businesses.

The picture at the top of the page shows general location at the intersection of Highway 99 and Garden Valley Road. The site is a six-acre tract bounded, roughly, by Highway 99 on the west, Prune Street (Garden Valley Road) on the south, Vine Street on the east and Oakland Avenue on the north.

Parking space for 451 cars is included in plans for the project, which has been incorporated as the Roseburg Shopping Center.

Building of the center is expected to start about June 1. It will cost in excess of \$750,000 to complete.

Businesses to occupy the extra business space haven't been selected yet, though applications have been received. Earl O. Wiley, Roseburg realtor, is local leasing agent for the development.

The Safeway store in downtown Roseburg will continue in operation, according to A. G. Anderson, Safeway district manager, Portland.

## Cleavage Between Russia And West Appears Wider

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cleavage between Russia and the Western powers over an Austrian peace treaty appeared wider Wednesday after they had swapped blows over forthcoming Austrian-Soviet talks in Moscow.

With Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab scheduled to visit the Russian capital next Monday, the United States, Britain and France told Russia in effect not to try to use its greater power to try to pressure little Austria into accepting unfavorable terms.

In a joint declaration, the Western Big Three reminded the Soviet Union that "questions relating to the conclusion of the (Austrian) state treaty are of concern to the governments of all four responsible powers, as well as to the Austrian government."

The United States, Britain, France and Russia all have occupied different parts of Austria since the end of World War II 10 years ago. Efforts to work out an Austrian peace treaty have been deadlocked, mainly over the issue of when occupation troops might be withdrawn.

The Russians have insisted all along that the military occupation of Austria would have to continue until after a German peace treaty had been concluded. But last Feb. 8, Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov said that if things worked out, foreign troops might be withdrawn before that time.

Since that Molotov speech, the Russians have been vague — some Western officials say purposely so — about conditions they might lay down for such a troop withdrawal. In their pronouncement Tuesday, the Western powers said they "trust" the Austrian chancellor's trip to Moscow will result in "useful clarifications."

### ESTATE IN PROBATE

An order for probate of the estate of Maxine Patebett, who died in Richmond, Calif., March 9 at the age of 54, has been signed, according to county clerk's records. Her sister, Leah Sykes Crafton, Roseburg, was named administratrix and sole heir-at-law. Estimated valuation of the estate included \$12,500 in real property in Douglas County. Appraisers are M. E. Ritter, W. F. Harris and G. V. Wimberly.
