Big Field Of 78 Given Tee Times For Masters Play

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Snead or Souhak? Hogan or Hebert? Midgolf or Mangrum? Who will win the 19th Masters golf championship?

Either one of them could. But maybe none of them will. There are many more fine golfers in the field of 78 who could capture this tournament and earn one of golf's most cherished titles.

Fifty-nine professionals and 19 amateurs were assigned tee times for today's first round of the 1955 Masters, which in 21 years has grown in prestige until it ranks second only to the National Open.

There were two schools of thought in pre-tournament speculation about the possible winner of this year's classic. One leaned toward the younger golfers, pointing to the way they had stolen much of the limelight during the winter tour. The other stuck with the veterans, pointing to the tremendous pressure generated in this prestige-loaded event.

Lagging Olympics Activity Approved By Avery Brundage

MELBOURNE (AP) — Australia's preparations for the 1956 Olympics, reported lagging behind schedule, today had the approval of Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, who is making a special, first-hand inspection because of the rumors.

Brundage, long an Olympic watchdog as head of the United States committee before taking over as chairman of the international group in 1952, said, "So far, I have seen nothing to seriously criticize." He added he was confident all preparations for the games would be completed in time.

Brundage visited the main stadium at the Melbourne Cricket Club yesterday and found everything adequate, except for the need of a coat of paint. He also suggested the addition of dressing rooms, showers and toilet facilities.

He assured the officials he would do as much as he could when he returned to the United States to dispel rumors that the Aussies weren't 100 per cent behind the games. "You have received a lot of bad publicity," he said. "I will do my best to counter it."

Unofficial reports had indicated the Aussies were having serious troubles getting ready for the games.

PORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP) —The American Bowling Congress scoreboard is due for a rest the remainder of this week after a big scoring splurge Wednesday which resulted in 11 changes in the standings.

The singles division drew most

of the fire, with six changes, highlighted by a bristling 704 by Dave Moffat, a Chicago bowling alley manager rolling in his seventh ABC. Moffat took over second place, behind Eddie Gerzine of Milwaukee, who leads with a 733. Gerzine also heads the all events with 1,938.

Unless Eddie Stanky really is a changed man this season, \$5 will get you \$10 the scrappy little manager of the St. Louis Cardinals had his hands jammed in his hip pockets, staring bitterly at the ground and ripping the turf in short jabs with his spikes at the Little Rock ball park yesterday.

Harvey Haddix, his southpaw ace, and the struggling Vic Raschi were belted for a 13-3 decision by the Chicago White Sox.

It was pitching, or the lack of it, that outweighed the Cards' hitting power and scuttled them in sixth place last season. Haddix particularly had trouble. He was off

Meanwhile the injury hoodoo that has run with Bobby Thomson, the Flying Scot, since he hooked up with Milwaukee threatens to keep him sidelined on opening day.

Thomson, pushing aside chances that 1955 will turn out like last year, said he'll be "ready to go" when the Braves open their home season against Cincinnati Tuesday at County Stadium. Thomson said he wants "just a good year for a change."

His immediate problem was an ailing right shoulder that brought him into town this week for examination and treatment by the team physician.

Thomson came to the Braves in the winter dead a year ago that sent Johnny Antonelli to the Giaris. He fractured his right ankle in Florida in the 1954 spring drills and was out of the lineup until late in the season. Even when he returned he saw only limited action.

The 31-year-old star said he's been working out each day since he returned to Milwaukee, but has confined himself to running.

Dr. Albert Schmidt, team physician, X-rayed his shoulder Tuesday and said the results were negative. He said a sore elbow that bothered Thomson earlier in the exhibition season may have caused a reaction in the shoulder. Additional X-ray treatment is slated for Saturday.
