Transportation Saving Possible, Board Points Out

WASHINGTON — The government could save 150 million dollars a year by consolidating its transportation services, the Hoover Commission says.

In addition, it said in a recent report to Congress, the government should give a bigger slice of the three billion dollars it now spends for transportation to private industry, which the commission said badly needs it.

The report was another in a series from the commission on organization of the government's executive branch. Former President Hoover heads the commission.

It said all Defense Department transport should be put under a military director, and all that for civilian branches of the government under a civilian director.

It recommended that the Defense Department re-establish the Military Air Transport System, as a consolidated service. That would eliminate separate, and in some cases parallel, services set up for their own use by the Navy and Air Force since MATS was organized.

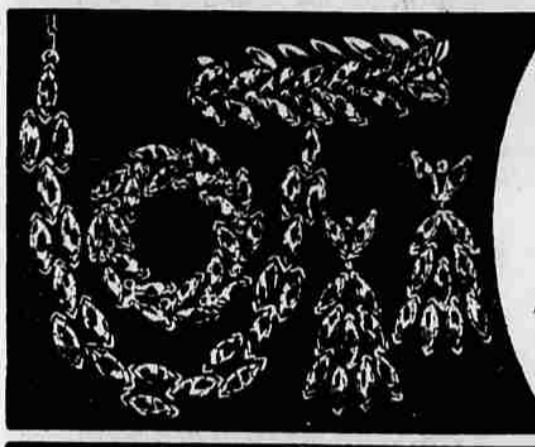
The report was particularly critical of the Air Force system, which it said had been used to transport such things as blank forms, religious goods, athletic equipment, musical instruments, lumber and laundry and dry cleaning equipment. The inference was that these could have been handled by cheaper means.

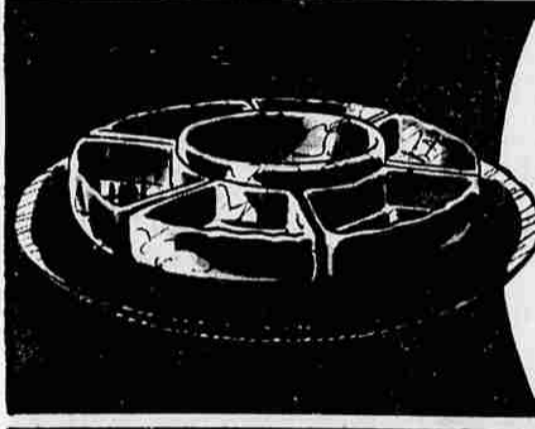

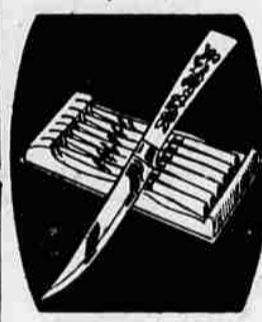

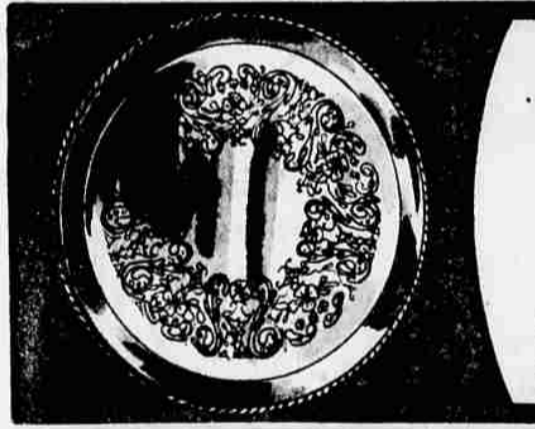
