

Corporation Income Tax Given Approval By Senate

SALEM, Ore. — The Oregon Senate completed legislative action Friday on the first segment of the revenue program.

It passed and sent to the governor the bill to enact an 8 per cent corporation income tax. It would parallel the 8 per cent corporation excise tax, the new measure being designed to tax interstate corporations which escape the present levy.

The committee approved House bills to extend the corporation excise tax to utilities and large building rental corporations, and to provide that property assessment be based on market value, effective in 1961.

The House, with five dissenting votes, approved and sent to the Senate a bill to compel county assessors to reappraise property every six years. This bill, which would make the appraisers pass state-sponsored examinations, is one of the series of property tax reform bills.

The Joint Ways and Means Committee solved one of its biggest headaches Friday by approving a \$69,077,000 budget for public welfare. It is the amount the governor recommended, but \$3,000,000 less than the Public Welfare Commission requested.

Sens. Gene L. Brown, Grants Pass, and John Merrifield, Portland, opposed the budget, contending it should be cut.

In the child, the tonsil is relatively and often definitely larger than in the adult. The size of the tonsil is not the important consideration, for it may be large and still be quite normal or it may be diseased and quite small. In adults, the almost hidden tonsil is often pusulent, or its crypts may contain caseous debris. The color of the tonsil is important, the normal pink may be replaced by an inflammatory red color, and the lymph glands beneath the angle of the jaw usually are swollen and tender.

The function of the tonsils has been a matter of much study and controversy and many theories have been advanced. The tonsil is a lymph gland and the chief function of lymph glands appear to be to produce lymphocytes for the blood stream. Since the tonsils are a small part of the general lymphatic system, it has been suggested that too much emphasis has been placed on their removal. Since a ring of lymphoid tissue composed of seven of these lymph glands has been developed around the oro-nasal entrance to the body cavities, nature must have had some important function for this tissue to subsist. It is known that not all the lymphocytes produced in the tonsils are emptied into the blood stream. Some of them make their way to the surface of the ton-

A bill approved by the House and sent to the Senate would create a three-man state census board to make annual population estimates for every city in the state. These estimates would be used as a basis for distributing state highway and liquor revenues to cities.

sil and there seem to aid whatever antiseptic or bactericidal power the mucous membrane of the mouth and throat may have.

Confirming this theory, the tonsils are most active and best developed in the early years of life. In advanced age when the body has pretty well developed immunity to its environment, the tonsils shrink and usually disappear. A study of the after effects of surgical removal of the tonsils at an early age has not resulted in a uniform agreement. Many claims of severe damage are made by certain observers and often serious interference with the orderly development of the body structure after the tonsils have been removed in childhood. Some observers state that a child whose tonsils have been removed is usually more prone to infections and diseases among which fewer and various forms of chronic bronchial and pulmonary involvements are common. The incidence of Polio is not ed to be much higher if not altered in children who have had their tonsils removed.

Some of the predisposing factors bringing on a tonsillitis attack are: sudden exposure to wet and cold, dietary indiscretions, run-down condition due to malnutrition, overeating of rich foods and many other factors.

Glendale Hearing For Considering Closing Street

The Glendale City Council reached no decision at a meeting this week on a proposal to condemn a portion of First Street which runs between the Elementary School and another piece of school property.

A public hearing on the matter will be held at the next regular meeting, the first Monday in May, reports Correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox. In the meantime, the city attorney will study the matter.

The proposal came from the Glendale School Board members, who said they would like to convert the property in question into a playground for first and second graders. The property was formerly leased to the Robert Dollar mill as a workers' trailer park but was cleared of trailers more than a year ago.

School officials contend increasing enrollment has caused congestion of playground facilities, that closing the street would not cut off access to homes in the area or to the city cemetery, although it would cause some inconvenience.

In other council action, members decided to take turns doing police duty for a few days for Chief Eugene Lacey, who had to go to California on business.

The council decided to petition the State Highway Dept. in regard to improvements to the west end of Pacific Avenue. The action is based on a legal provision whereby the state can provide certain sums to cities of less than 1,000 population for street work.

Runaway Soviet Teen-ager Goes Back To Russia

BERLIN, Germany — A teenage Russian who ran away to West Berlin three weeks ago rejoined his parents at his own request Saturday and returned tearfully with them to the East.

Valery Lyskov, student son of a Soviet lieutenant colonel, was turned over to his father and mother in American headquarters at noon. After four minutes of embraces and kisses, the family drove off with two Soviet liaison officers to East Berlin.

Outspoken for two weeks against Communism, the boy had a change of heart four days ago and asked in Frankfurt for permission to go back. U. S. authorities said, "An American high commission spokesman said permission was given 'in the name of the spirit' that asylum had been provided the young Russian when he came West."

Seven Children Perish In Fire At Tacoma Home

TACOMA, Wash. — A flash fire, believed to have started in a faulty refrigerator, raged through a 2-story frame house here early Saturday and burned seven children to death.

The victims were James Clifton, 15; Nancy McCarty, 12; Thomas McCarty, 11; Cyndia McCarty, 9; Darrell McCarty, 8; Susan McCarty, 3; and Magnus McCarty, 8 months.

Six of the victims were the children of Mrs. Jean McCarty, 28. James Clifton was Mrs. McCarty's brother.

Six of the children were found in their beds. Cyndia's body was found close to an upstairs window.

Fire Chief Harold Fisk said the "children didn't have a prayer" of escaping that fire. "He described the house as a 'scorched shell'."

Police Detectives Al Waters and R.D. Rebeck said Mrs. McCarty, a divorcee, was attending a movie at a drive-in theater at the time of the fire. She was held for questioning.

Fast Switch Nets Bunco Artist Nearly \$7,000

SEATTLE — A fast switch in one of the older dodges known to bunco artists has cost a Seattle bank nearly \$7,000, presumably paid to the same man who got \$4,000 the same way in Spokane in February.

The generous Seattle organization was the Pacific National Bank. The confidence man started the little drama late in March, opening a savings account with a small cash deposit in the University branch of Pacific National.

A few days later he added to the account with another small deposit. Next, he deposited two checks drawn on San Francisco banks totaling \$6,755.50. Then he obtained a cashier's check for the amount of his savings account.

He took this check down to the main office and cashed it, leaving well ahead of notice received from San Francisco that the two checks he had deposited were worthless.

Police said the swindler used the name L. P. Benoit here. He was the same man, they said, who obtained \$4,000 from a Spokane bank — unnamed — by the same method early in February. In Spokane he used the name of Franks.

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Logger Kills Brother; Captured In Gun Fight

OROVILLE, Calif. — A gaunt, brooding lumberjack shot and killed one of his three brothers in a fit of fury Friday, wounded another, held off a posse in a gun battle and then attempted suicide.

Sheriff Larry Gillick said Clifford Taber, 42, was saved after the suicide attempt by Highway Patrol Sgt. A. T. Cummins who pressed his thumbs against the lumberjack's neck to stop the flow of blood after Taber slit his own throat.

Taber was recovering in a hospital Saturday.

Mrs. Alice Taber, 84, mother of the brothers, said she saw Clifford kill his brother Clarence, 56, with a single shot. She was in the house with Clifford when he seriously wounded another brother, Floyd, 50, but fled while he shot at an 18-man posse outside.

Retired Sutherlin Employee Succumbs

Charles Stone, 71, died at a Roseburg hospital Friday evening after a short illness. He was born in Surrey, England, July 3, 1883, and moved to Canada when he was 16.

In 1904, he moved to the United States and homesteaded in Itasca County, Minn. About 20 years ago he came to the West Coast, and moved to Sutherlin in 1948, where he was employed by the city. He had retired on April 1 this year.

Survivors include a brother, Walter Stone of Mudje Island, B.C. Canada; a sister, Agnes Evans of Surrey, England, and a nephew Steven Stone, Victoria, B.C.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 2 p.m. at the Methodist Church in Sutherlin, with the Rev. Linn Bove officiating. Interment will follow at Fair Oaks Cemetery. Stearns & Little Mortuary, Oakland, is handling arrangements.

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Governor Refuses To Call Guards In Phone Strike

ATLANTA, Ga. — Gov. James E. Folsom refused to call the National Guard to duty in the strike-ridden Southern Bell Telephone strike area of Birmingham, Ala., Saturday but ordered the State Highway Patrol reinforced there.

Folsom called a news conference at the executive mansion in Montgomery and told reporters: "I do not intend to use the state militia as a strike-breaking organization."

However, he said he intends to "provide ample security in the Birmingham area," and he appealed to workers and management alike to "maintain non-violent and peaceful picketing."

The governor's statement came in reply to requests from Sheriff Holt McDowell of Jefferson County and Mayor Jap Bryant of Bessemer for National Guard troops to preserve order in the wake of renewed outbreaks of strike violence.

All Alaska Plane Routes Expected To Be Continued

EVERETT, Wash. — Rep. Jack Westland (R-Wash.) said Friday he has learned from authoritative sources that the Civil Aeronautics Board has recommended that the routes on all four airlines serving Alaska from the Pacific Northwest be continued.

In Washington, however, official sources would not disclose the recommendations. The office of Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) said the CAB had sent its recommendations to the Budget Bureau for action by the president.

Westland said that according to his informant Northwest Orient Airlines would receive a 7-year certificate to fly between Seattle, Portland and Anchorage and Pacific Northern Airlines and Alaska Airlines would receive 3-year certificates to fly their present routes.

PNA now flies between Seattle-Portland to Anchorage and Alaska Airlines flies between Seattle-Portland and Fairbanks.

The fourth carrier involved, Pan American World Airways, Westland said, would be denied the right to compete with Northwest Orient in flights to Anchorage. PAA has a permanent certificate for flights between Seattle, Fairbanks and Nome via Kotzebuk, Juneau and Whitehorse, Y.T.

There had been speculation that the CAB would recommend that the number of carriers in the Alaska traffic be trimmed to as few as two, PNA and Alaska Airlines, most likely to lose their certification.
