Truman And FDR Portraits Replaced In White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—Portraits of Washington and Lincoln have replaced those of former President Truman and Franklin D. Roosevelt in the White House entrance foyer.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said Saturday the change—which moved likenesses of Truman and Roosevelt to other walls on the same floor—was made more than six months ago. He said he knew of no particular reason for it.

Hagerty was commenting on a newspaper report on the switch. The story said that by tradition portraits of the two most recent presidents have claimed the most prominent wall spaces in the foyer.

But it added that White House guards no longer have to explain to sightseers who used to ask why pictures of two Democrats hold such conspicuous positions within the present complexion of the museum.

Hagerty said Truman's portrait is now in the green room and that of Roosevelt is in the foyer outside the state dining room.

"What's wrong with Washington and Lincoln?" Hagerty asked.

"When we arrived at the White House, pictures of Truman and Roosevelt were hanging in the entrance foyer. Now the founder of our country and President Lincoln are hanging there."

"I know of no tradition or reason for the change, but again I say: What's wrong with Washington and Lincoln?"

administration's refugee relief act which seeks to admit 214,000 immigrants into the United States by the end of 1956.

This job was abolished at a time when Corsi was under fire in Congress.

Rep. Walter (D-Pa.) questioned whether Corsi should administer admission of immigrants. Walter said Corsi had associated with pro-communist organizations in the 1930s.

Corsi denied there was anything in his record to support Walter's complaints.

Corsi is known to believe that Dulles buckled in the face of pressure from Walter to fire him. Corsi has been a longtime outspoken foe of the McCarran-Walter 1952 immigration act.

Dr. J. Hudson Ballard Will Speak In Roseburg

A nationally-known churchman and educator will speak publicly in Roseburg Friday night.

He is Dr. J. Hudson Ballard. His lecture, titled "Overcoming Worry," is sponsored by the Men's Club of the First Presbyterian Church. Dr. Ballard will speak at the church, beginning at 8 p.m.

Church officers announced Monday that an offering will be taken to help defray expenses. There is no regular admission charge.

Dr. Ballard has an imposing background as a pastor and instructor. He has been minister of Presbyterian churches in New York, California and Oregon. Educationally he served as principal of a private high school and a junior college in New York.

For eight years he was head of the philosophy and religion department at Occidental College in Los Angeles. His most recent post before retirement was as head of the Christian psychology department at San Francisco Theological Seminary. Dr. Ballard is now professor emeritus.

He is well-known as a writer-lecturer in the field of psychology and its relation to Christianity. His column on psychological problems appears regularly in the Methodist church publication "The Christian Advocate."

According to church officers, Dr. Ballard's address Friday will be non-technical. They termed him "a psychologist you can understand."

Flood Spreads Havoc In Southern Manitoba

WINNIPEG (AP)—Hundreds of volunteer workers toiled through the Easter weekend to stem the spreading tide of flood waters sweeping over thousands of acres of rich southern Manitoba farmland. Homes were isolated; bridges destroyed and highways submerged.

Hardest hit by the sudden spring runoff, accelerated Sunday by mid-70 temperatures, were the outskirts of suburban St. Vital and the Oakville-Poplar Point district 30 miles west of here.

More than 100 homes southwest of Winnipeg were reported surrounded by flood waters from the Seine River, swollen to its greatest size since the 1950 flood disaster. At least four bridges in the area were submerged. Water covered the tracks on the Soo line railway bridge.

Primary Date Change Gets State Senate OK

SALEM (AP)—Sitting on straight party lines, the Oregon Senate approved 23-6 Saturday a bill to change the date of the primary election from the third Friday in May to the fourth Tuesday in June.

The bill, which goes to the House, originally called for an August primary.

Russ-Austrian Treaty Looms In Raab's Visit

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab left by Soviet plane for Moscow today for talks that may indicate whether the Kremlin is changing its tactics in Europe.

There was speculation the Russians are ready to end the occupation of Austria in exchange for a promise of neutrality in the East-West struggle. Such a Soviet move would be calculated to get the West Germans to join their rearmament in hopes they could reunite their divided country by a similar deal.

The Russians have blocked an Austrian treaty for 10 years. Promised liberation by the Big Four during World War II, Austria is still occupied by 25,000 Western troops and 44,000 Russians.

California Visitor Dies At Roseburg

William Albert Lewis, resident of Redding, Calif., died Monday morning at a Roseburg hospital. He had been visiting a nephew, William Lewis, in Tenille when he became ill about a week ago.

He was born Aug. 3, 1877, in Woodland, Calif., and was a retired Shasta County employee. He had been a county road foreman in Shasta County for over 20 years.

Surviving are two brothers, Homer of Sacramento, Calif., and Harry of Stockton, Calif.; and his nephew, William, Tenille.

The body has been removed to the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, and will be shipped to Redding for funeral services and interment in the Redding Cemetery.

Canada, U.S. Seek Bogus Check Passer, Gunman

WASHINGTON (AP)—The FBI Monday added to its list of "10 most wanted fugitives" the name of Daniel William O'Connor, described as a chronic bogus check-passer.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police also list O'Connor as one of their "most wanted men."

The FBI said O'Connor, a native of Detroit and only 26 years old, has been engaging in the fraudulent check racket since a 1946 desertion from the U.S. Army at Ft. Campbell, Ky.

Police at Windsor, Ontario, caught him breaking into a hotel there in 1948, and he was given a two-year sentence.

The FBI said O'Connor changed his name to Jack O'Brien and returned to the United States, leaving a trail of bad checks and fraudulent money orders across Montana and North Dakota.

While driving through British Columbia with his wife and two small children, he was apprehended by a Royal Canadian Mounted Police officer in connection with an irregular bank money order. The FBI said he drew a pistol, fired on the officer and then beat him.

As a result, O'Connor is charged in Canada with attempted murder.

The fugitive is described as being of medium height, weighing 200 pounds and with a muscular build. He has blond hair, blue eyes and a ruddy complexion.

Salk Polio Vaccine Test Report Slated Tomorrow

The 40-year-old University of Pittsburgh virus expert will claim no special credit for the vaccine, if it's found successful. He'll point to the scientific groundwork laid by others and to the long hours out in his assistants at the Pitt virus research laboratory, which he heads.

Before the vaccine could be mass-produced, it had to be perfected. That took time.

As the father of three small boys, Dr. Salk was inclined to hurry.

But as a scientist he was forced to move slowly.

His working schedule was rigorous—18, sometimes 24 hours a day. He had to be careful methodical.

Dr. Salk's friends know he can't be hurried. One of them says: "He is one of the clearest, most deliberate thinkers I've ever known. He has great emotional stability. You can bet he won't rush his work one second faster than it is absolutely safe to do."

During the early testing of the vaccine on humans, he observed: "When you inoculate children with a polio vaccine, you don't sleep well for two or three weeks."

A striking characteristic is his kindness and gentleness in dealing with children.

When he conducted trials with youngsters in Pittsburgh district schools before the nationwide test, he spent considerable time personally reassuring frightened first and second-graders.

Dr. Salk typically hasn't ventured a prediction on what tomorrow's report will show. But it's obvious he is sure the vaccine is a success. His three sons ranging in age from 5 to 11, were among the first to be inoculated.

Four Juveniles Face Liquor Possession Count

Four Roseburg juveniles, aged 15, 16, 16 and 17, were arrested by city police Saturday night and charged with illegal possession of liquor by a minor.

They were taken to juvenile court Monday. All but one had previous arrest records, officers reported.

Officers stopped the car the youths were in because it exceeded the designated speed limit in the 300 block of Jackson Street, and had the boys get out of the car. One of them produced a 3 1/2 gallon jug of wine. This followed a query by the officers, prompted by the presence in the car of two soda pop bottles.

After questioning, the boys told officers they had given an unnamed "drunk" on West Cass Street money to buy the wine, allowing him to keep the change. They got the drunk to leave the wine in a service station rest room at the corner of Cass and Stephens where they later picked it up, they added.

Three of the youths were sent home until Monday. The fourth was placed in the Douglas County Jail in lieu of \$50 bail.

Diamond Lake Resort Head, Wm. E. Fox, Dies

He was born at Coburg on Aug. 22, 1906, and attended school at Brownsville. He was in the service station and parking lot business in Long Beach, Calif., 20 years ago. He returned to Oregon 12 years ago. During the winter, he resided at Ashland.

He was married April 27, 1928, to Thelma Beckett, who survives him. He was a member of the Christian Church and the Elks Lodge.

New Earthquakes Hit Areas Of Philippines

MANILA (AP)—Widespread earthquakes today collapsed homes, cut highways and reportedly injured an undetermined number of persons in the southern Philippines—already hard hit by disastrous tremors April 1.

There were no immediate reports of deaths. The April 1 quakes caused at least 432 deaths and left thousands homeless.

Quakes panicked residents in nine cities, six of them on Mindanao, second largest island, Philippine News Service reported.

PNS said many persons were injured in the Lake Lanao area of Mindanao, which bore the brunt of the previous earthquakes.

Residents in the Maranao district on the west shore of the lake reported "a yardwide fissure extending several miles" immediately after the first shock, said PNS.

"All buildings partially damaged by the recent quakes collapsed during this morning's tremors," PNS reported.

Pope Asks Disarmament, Peaceful A-Energy Use

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Giving his annual blessing to one of the biggest throngs in Vatican history, Pope Pius XII yesterday endorsed progressive disarmament and peaceful use of atomic energy.

The 79-year-old pontiff also warned against the still unknown effect on human reproduction of radioactivity from nuclear explosions. He spoke from the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica. The vast Easter crowd numbered between 200,000 and 300,000.

Airman Sacrifices Life To Avoid Crash In City

ATSUGI, Japan (AP)—A U. S. Marine pilot sacrificed his life today rather than let his F4J Fury jet crash in Yokohama's crowded streets.

The plane crashed into a hillside seven miles east of the naval air station here.

The Navy said the pilot, whose name was withheld, developed engine trouble over Yokohama. He refused to bail out over the city and tried to make it back to the base.

BROKEN SKYLIGHT

Roseburg city police reported no evidence of entry after they had investigated a broken skylight at Patterson's Bakery, 624 Short St., Saturday morning.

Timber Sales Plan To Be Told At Glide Meet

An informal U.S. Forest Service meeting is scheduled Wednesday at Glide to reveal the timber sales program planned this year, reports correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

District Rangers Gordon Sanford, George Williams and George Churchill will present the program for all timber operators and mill owners in the Diamond Lake, North Umpqua and Little River areas. The meeting will be held at the Glide High School library, starting at 7:30 p.m.

In previous years, the meetings have been held in the Glide Forest Ranger Station, but turnouts at the meetings have outgrown seating capacity of the offices.

Last year 70 operators attended. Glide School superintendent, Byron Evans, permitted use of the school facility.

Mrs. Selby reports that detailed data will be given on each sale. Information will include location, size, type of timber, logging methods, road specifications. Foresters will also answer any questions.

The following sales will be presented during the year in that area:

Diamond Lake District—Trag Mountain (19,000 board feet), Middle Rough Creek (2,000), miscellaneous salvage (2,000).

North Umpqua District—Ragged Ridge (25,000 board feet), Singe Creek (10,000), Deep Creek (4,000), Johnson Ridge (10,000), miscellaneous salvage (1,000).

Little River District—Clover Butte No. 2 (4,500), Cavitt Mountain (8,900), Peter and Paul (6,000), Snowdrift (14,000), Limpy Connection (9,000), Cougar Ridge (4,000), Willow Flats (2,000) and miscellaneous salvage (3,000).

Treason Cases Of War Origin May Exceed 200

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department says an estimate that some 200 treason cases might stem from the Korean War may have been "much too conservative."

Asst. Atty. Gen. William F. Tompkins told a House Appropriations subcommittee, in testimony released Sunday night, that the department already is acting on 176 treason cases involving GIs captured by the Communists during the Korean fighting.

Tompkins, Justice Department security chief, said he expected "many more" cases to follow.

Although there have been a number of court martial trials against former POWs, none has yet been charged with treason.

Without elaborating, Tompkins said also that "a large number of potential espionage cases," not limited to service personnel are being investigated.

start a stampede, like a theater fire, to get vaccine at any cost? Will there be bootlegging, venality?"

"Or will parents demand intelligent self-control of themselves and others, insist the vaccine be used where it will do the most good to reduce polio—among young children and pregnant women?"

"Suppose," he continued, "the vaccine is found ineffective, or less than perfect?"

"How much dismay or loss of confidence may result? A vaccine can be a success without being a fire. Can it give control like vaccines against yellow fever or smallpox, which are not 100 per cent? Fire-proofing buildings does not eliminate all fires, but it does drastically reduce the amount of destruction."

Churchill Assured Party Nomination

WOODFORD, England (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill Saturday was assured the Conservative Party nomination for Parliament in this suburban London district.

Col. W.H. Berlow-Wheeler, secretary of the Woodford Conservative Assn., wrote the retired prime minister to that effect.

Churchill has represented this London dormitory area for 30 of the 52 years he has served in Parliament. He had three opponents, one a Communist in the 1951 election but won with 40,033 votes—a majority of 15,579. The vote given his three rivals: Laborist W.A. Archer 22,559, Communist J.R. Campbell 871 and Independent A.A. Hancock 851.

The Labor party has not announced its nominee for the next election expected to be held about May 26.

REEDSPORT WOMAN FINED

Myrtle H. Wallin, 52, ReedSPORT, was fined \$12.50, then committed to the county jail in lieu of payment, when she appeared before Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum Saturday. The woman was charged with being drunk on a public street. She was arrested by city police Friday after falling down in the street at Washington and Main.

Blizzard Halts Search For Air Crash Survivor

GOLDENDALE, Wash. (AP)—A spring blizzard blotted out the Simco Mountains 15 miles north-east of here early Monday, temporarily halting a search for a lost plane crash survivor and increasing fears for his safety.

Searchers called in from a 5,800-foot peak, site of the plane crash Saturday, said unless Henry Baker of The Dalles, Ore., found a place to "hole up" they doubted he could survive in the subfreezing cold.

Baker was injured, either in the crash Saturday or later as he made his way down the mountain to try to get help for Jack LaRocque, critically hurt when the plane plowed into the peak, the searchers said. LaRocque was rescued Sunday by helicopter.

Bloodstains were found in the snow at a point where Baker tried to start a fire, they reported, and later his tracks indicated he was wandering aimlessly on the mountain slope.

The sky-and-mountain drama began at 7 a.m. Saturday when LaRocque, who owns a service station at The Dalles, and Baker, his employee, took off for a flight to Yakima. Baker hadn't planned to make the flight but changed his mind at the last minute and climbed aboard.

As authorities reconstructed the accident, the plane, flying in low clouds hit the mountainside about 30 minutes later.

Lattimore Indictment Reinstatement Sought

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government Monday asked the U.S. Court of Appeals to reinstate an indictment accusing Owen Lattimore of swearing falsely he had never been a follower of the Communist line or a promoter of Red interests.

The government's brief asked the appellate court to overrule U.S. District Judge Luther W. Youngdahl, who threw out the indictment Feb. 18 on the ground it was vague and nebulous.
