Defense Dept. To Make MacArthur Notes Public

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department has announced it will make public "information relevant to the question of whether Gen. Douglas MacArthur supported 1945 efforts to bring Russia into the war with Japan."

A brief statement said the department is "expeditiously" surveying documents in connection with requests from members of Congress and the press for their release but will not publish the information piecemeal. It added: "The Department of Defense believes that, in the meantime, the release of separate items connected with Russia's entry into the Pacific war would confuse rather than clarify the situation."

C. Herschel Schooley, department information chief, said he was unable to say when the material might be released.

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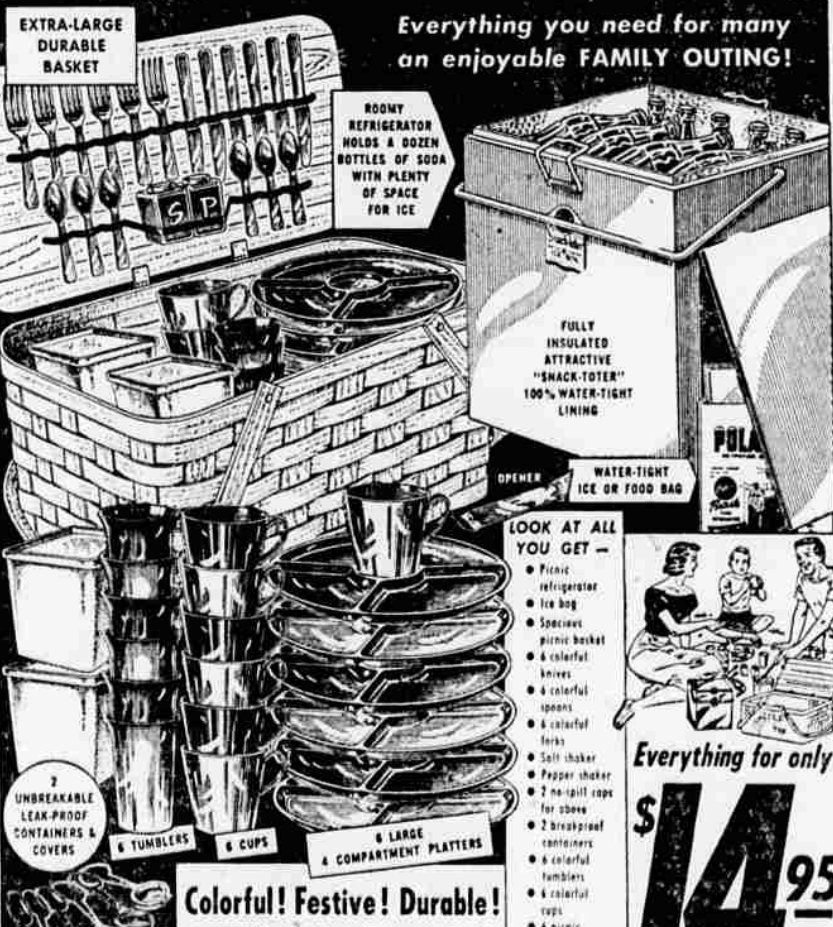
