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Streams Rising With New Rains; Ease Power Pool

SPOKANE (AP) — Northwest streams are rising in the wake of warmer weather, the demand for electricity has dropped and the situation is "less acute" for the Northwest Power Pool, Marshall L. Blair said here.

Blair, power supply manager for the Washington Water Power Co. and a power pool spokesman, said lower river flows, particularly on the Coast, have begun to increase.

The Lewis, White, Cushman and Willamette rivers are rising. The Clear water, too, is producing more water, although the main stem of the Columbia has not yet shown any significant increase in flow," Blair said.

Unusually cold spring weather

brought heavy demands last month for power but Blair said the requirements have now returned to near normal for the season.

"Pool records indicate that loads are running from 100,000 to 200,000 kilowatts lower than a week ago," he said. "Stream generated electricity is being used sparingly now, and only for peaking purposes."

Major reservoirs, however, still being tapped until stream flows get up to normal, he said.

The Bonneville Power Administration sharply cut interruptible power supplies to industrial users in March because of the cold and low stream levels. BPA officials here said there is no indication

when it will be restored. Industrial plants turned to steam-generated power when the loads were cut.

Bicycle Riding Safety Talk Set For Newsboys

A new idea to promote safer bicycle riding will be put into operation here Saturday morning when Roseburg newsboys meet at the Armory at 10:30.

The carrier-salesmen (about 100 in town) will hear a safety talk and explanation of laws and ordinances by Sgt. Vernon Murdoch Jr. of the Roseburg Police Dept. Substitute and prospective carriers also are urged to attend.

Factors concerning bike riders will be stressed, of course, since all the young men who carry newspapers used the two-wheel vehicles.

The idea for the safety meeting originated with Fuller Johnson, circulation manager of The News-Review. It came to him when he read a recent report from the Secretary of State's Office which included the following statistics on Oregon bicyclists in 1954: Seven killed and 307 injured.

In planning the meeting for Roseburg carriers, Johnson said he met enthusiastically with the response and cooperation on the part of Oregonian and Journal district managers, city officials and the editor of The News-Review.

Johnson says he hopes another such session can be held in September after the paper carriers go on their winter routes. Then, it is hoped meetings will continue twice a year. Johnson also said he hopes other cities will copy the plan, which may help reduce accidents and poor bike-riding habits.

St. Louis Is Rocked By Mild Earthquake

ST. LOUIS (AP) — An earthquake described as a "strong local shock" by a St. Louis University scientist, shook metropolitan St. Louis and a wide area east and south of the city at 7:01 a.m. Saturday, but no major damage was reported.

The tremor rattled dishes and spilled coffee, but the only reports of damage came from St. Louis County, where the sheriff's office said four persons told them of cracked walls in their homes.

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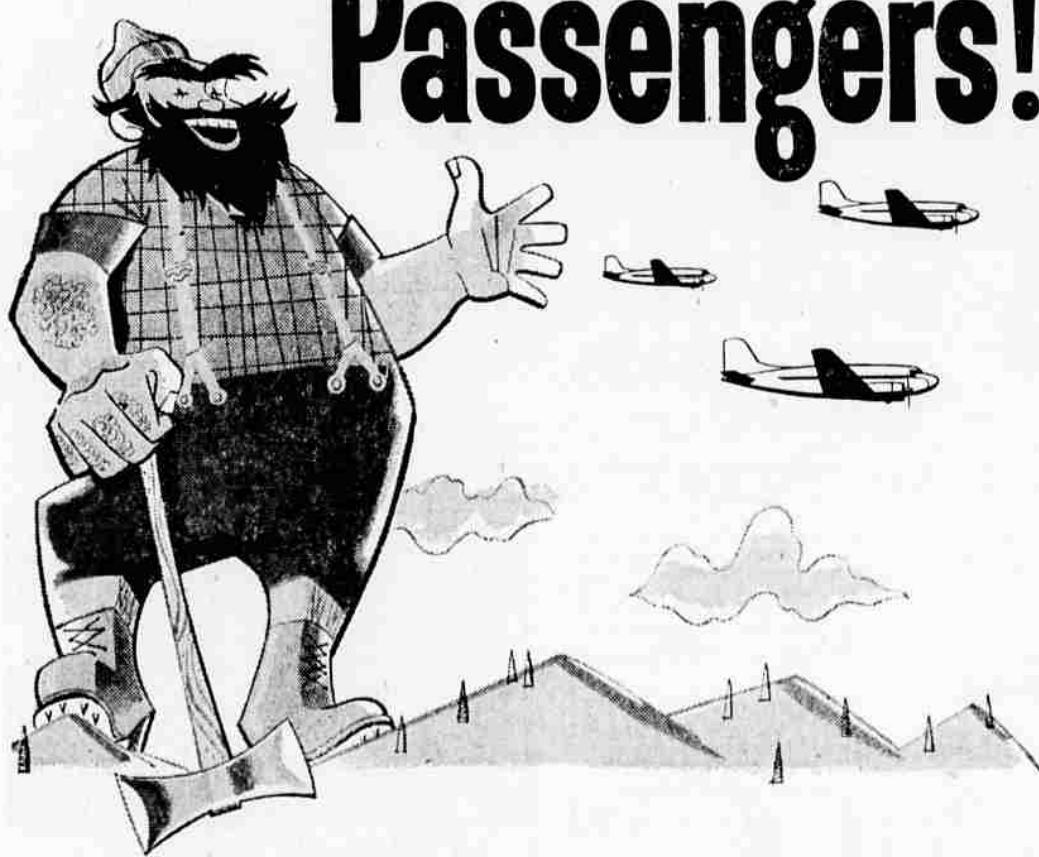
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
