

Control Breeds Controls, Chamber Speaker Maintains

"Control breeds controls" according to a spokesman for the Oregon Natural Gas and Oil Resources Committee.

Charles D. Dolph was in Roseburg Monday to address the Chamber of Commerce luncheon forum in reference to federal regulation of natural gas. Dolph termed natural gas a commodity and said it was "not fair to control one commodity and not others."

Specifically, the producers and gatherers of natural gas take exception to the June 7, 1954, Supreme Court decision which ruled 5-3 that the Natural Gas Act "does not authorize" the FPC to regulate prices of independent producers and gatherers.

They say the ruling prevents competition. "Without competition of natural gas," Dolph added, "it is doubtful if we would have come (progressed) as far as we have."

The natural gas exponents cite four major reasons the control is "bad." They say it is necessary, dangerous, unfair and shortsighted.

From the consumer's angle Dolph sees several bad points: A hindering effect on production; a threat to the growth of the natural product; and loss of incentive for producers and gatherers.

Dolph pointed out that one fourth of the total energy requirements in the United States are filled by natural gas. He said it was now in 25 million homes and "has great potential."

The problem simply, he said, revolves around "what type of economic system you believe in?" The two alternatives, said the speaker, were federal regulated economy or private enterprise.

The first showing of a film entitled "You The People" followed the speaker's remarks. The motion picture has been prepared by natural gas producers to tell their story to the general public. Dolph said the Roseburg showing was the first in the country.

The Chamber speaker flew in from Portland. He is Northwest sales attorney for the General Petroleum Corp. He was introduced by Virgil Lomax, General Petroleum distributor in the Roseburg and Cottage Grove areas.

Oakland's Best Cafe, Greyhound Depot Closed

Oakland's largest restaurant closed last week. The move also left the city temporarily without a Greyhound Bus Depot, reports News-Review correspondent Edith Dunn.

For the past two years the restaurant, the Best Cafe, has been operated by Jesse and Fay Hamilton. The Hamiltons plan to remain in Oakland, the correspondent said.

Meanwhile, until a new bus depot is opened, Oakland area residents have been requested to take the bus at Locust Street in Downtown Oakland. Tickets may be purchased from the driver, Mrs. Dunn said. Temporarily Oakland will be a flag stop only.

Yoncalla Youth Still Critical From Rifle Shot

An 18-year-old Yoncalla youth, wounded by a rifle shot Sunday evening, was reported in satisfactory condition today at Sacred Heart Hospital, although still not out of danger.

LeRoy Arcey was rushed to the hospital soon after the mishap on the Joe Holoman ranch, just west of Yoncalla on Hayhurst Road.

Further investigation by Dep. Sheriff John McCool established the shooting as accidental, Sheriff Cal Baird said. McCool went to Eugene Monday night to talk with Arcey.

Arcey apparently was going over a fence when he fell, pulling the short-barrel 22 behind him. The gun caught on a strand of wire and discharged. With him were his brother, Gary, 15, Nancy Holoman, and another unidentified girl, McCool said. The Arceys and Holomans are neighbors. LeRoy and Gary are sons of Mrs. William Keys.

The bullet struck LeRoy under his left arm, hit a rib, bounced off his backbone and came to rest near a lung, the deputy sheriff was told by doctors. The youth was operated on Sunday night.

Sprague Named To Labor Post

WASHINGTON (AP) — Appointment of Charles A. Sprague, publisher of The Oregon Statesman of Salem, Ore., and governor of Oregon from 1939 to 1943, to a committee to advise Secretary of Labor Mitchell on labor-management problems in the atomic field was announced Monday.

Sprague will serve with John W. Nickerson of West Haven, Conn., and John T. Dunlop, a Harvard University economics professor, and a fifth member to be named later, Chairman David L. Cole said.

Cole said the group will make a detailed study of labor relations in the atomic field and will recommend means of improving machinery to settle disputes.

Dunlop was a member of the board of inquiry into the bituminous coal industry in 1950.

Nickerson is a labor-management consultant and former chairman of the Advisory Group on European Productivity of the Mutual Security Agency.

writing insufficient fund checks of more than \$75. Checks smaller than that amount would draw a penalty of one year in the county jail and \$1,000 fine.

A bill sent by the House to the governor makes it illegal to sell liquor to anyone under 21 years old. The law now prohibits sales to anyone under the age of majority, which has been interpreted by some as meaning that girls could buy it at the age of 18.

Another bill on which the House completed legislative action would bring drugs under state regulation. It provides for proper labeling and makes fraud illegal.

The Senate Tax Committee, working on the House revenue program, scheduled eight meetings this week. The main bill, increasing income taxes, will be considered Friday and Saturday.

Cause of the crash and the extent of Anderson's injuries were not determined immediately. He was taken to a Lakeview hospital.

He was alone in the two-passenger plane.

It was the second crash in three days involving planes which were flying out of The Dalles. Jack LaRocque was injured and his passenger was the object of a search in a crash near Goldendale, Wash., Saturday.

Salk Vaccine Safe, Potent, States Report

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sease among about 1,400,000 children not vaccinated.

It was reported there was an incredible low incidence of either minor or severe reactions among the vaccinated. Indeed, children receiving completely innocuous dummy shots had about as many reactions—skin rashes and feverish feelings—as those getting the real vaccine.

The vaccine is powerful, particularly against the most terrible type of polio that hits at the brain—bulbar polio.

There is no doubt, Dr. Francis said, that children can be vaccinated successfully, protected against the silent invasion of three types of virus.

The vaccine is expected to be approved or licensed quickly by the national institutes of health, and within a week or two, perhaps be given to children, and pregnant women, to stymie polio's attack this summer.

Snow Hampers Rescue Chance In Washington

GOLDENDALE, Wash. (AP) — Eight inches of new snow lay over a wet blanket Tuesday over the hopes of searchers for a plane crash survivor in the Simcoe Mountains northeast of here.

More trained mountaineers and search dogs arrived in the area, but the snow virtually wiped out any chances of the dogs being of value.

Omo Daiber, veteran of many Cascade Mountain rescue efforts, and 20 members of the Seattle Mountain Rescue Council, arrived to take part in the search for Henry Baker, 20, of The Dalles, Ore.

But whether Baker, a The Dalles service station attendant, was still alive after three days and three nights in the snow and bitter cold was problematical.

La. Robert Kittelson, co-pilot of an Air Force helicopter which took part in the unsuccessful search Monday said after a flight over the area, "If the guy's still alive, it's a miracle."

But another member of the crew, Airman I.C. Raymond Whitehurst, said Baker "stands a chance" if he got below the snowline.

Baker and Jack LaRocque, 40, of The Dalles, his employer, survived the crash of LaRocque's light plane high on a Simcoe peak early Saturday.

The State Game Commission told the Lees that a "reasonable effort" now had been made to get rid of the deer.

The Lees, father and son, invited the commission to witness last month's slaughter. They said they had been forced to take the matter into their own hands because the commission had not helped them drive the deer off their land where they were eating the grass intended for cattle.

The deer congregated in the Cherry Grove area after the herd became too large for the normal feeding areas.

The Lees said Monday they would abide by the commission's decision. They added that the deer were now taking to the hills anyway.

made that clear." Stevenson proposed a resolution be submitted by the United States to the U. N. condemning any use of force to alter its status.

Sen. George (D-Ga.) said Tuesday such a step as asking the U. N. General Assembly to condemn the use of force in the Formosa Strait is under consideration by the Eisenhower administration.

However, Dulles said there was no contemplation at the moment of calling the U. N. General Assembly into special session. The cease fire proposal is on the U. N. Security Council agenda, he said, and normal procedure is for it to be disposed of there before going to the 60 nation General Assembly.

He called for a joint declaration by the free nations condemning the use of force in the 100-mile-wide strait between Nationalist Formosa and Communist China.

The 1952 Democratic presidential nominee, in a nationwide radio broadcast last night, said a "dead end policy" of the Eisenhower administration put the United States in its present position in Asia.

The administration's "policy of extravagant words" in the Far Eastern situation, he declared, "has alarmed our friends a good deal more than it has deterred the aggressors."

"The tragedy is that the possibility of war just now seems to hinge upon Quemoy and Matsu, small islands that lie almost as close to the coast of China as Staten Island does to New York," he said.

"I have the greatest misgivings about risking a third world war in defense of these little islands in which we would have neither the same legal justification nor the same support as in the defense of Formosa."

He said the United Nations should enlist both its friends and the neutral nations in "an open declaration condemning the use of force in Formosa Strait."

He said Russia also should be asked to "declare its position."

Stevenson spoke on a nationwide radio hookup provided free as a public service by the CBS and NBC networks. Friends said he decided to give his views on Far Eastern policy in response to "hundreds of letters, telegrams and phone calls."

He said the United Nations General Assembly also should seek a permanent solution to the Formosa problem.

quint, one charging forgery by endorsement and others that he knowingly issued forged checks.

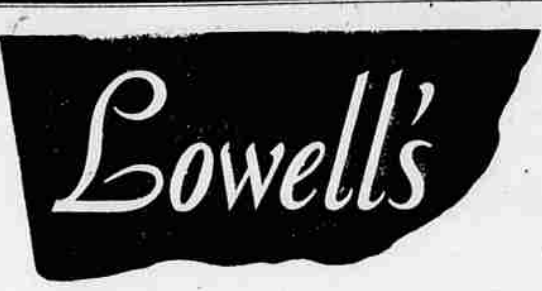

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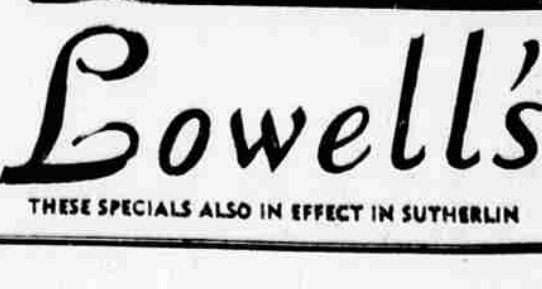
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
