

Trout Releases In N. Umpqua Begin

First 10,000 Rainbows Set Free Tuesday

About 10,000 fall spawning rainbow trout were planted Tuesday in the North Umpqua River as local game commission crews began the annual release of Rock Creek Hatchery fish.

According to commission biologist Bill Pitney, it is planned to have all of the 76,000 legal sized trout allocated for release in this area planted before the current season begins on April 30.

A total of nine bodies of water will get distribution with the North Umpqua slated for the largest individual share.

Other stocking will take place on the South Umpqua, Little River, Cow Creek, Rock Creek, Callapooya Creek, Elk Creek, Smith River and Loon Lake.

Pitney estimated that the size of the fish should average from eight to nine and one-half inches in length.

He explained that the total released was about the same number as were released last year, but that due to work in other areas, the planting was started a little later this year.

More fish will be planted through June and July, he added.

Opening of the spring chinook season in open areas and the main Umpqua River opens Friday, as indicated in the 1955 Oregon Angling Regulations.

W. C. Rylander of Lubbock, Tex., took up bowling at the age of 68. Now at 83 he has a 150 average in league play.

San Diego edged Los Angeles 2-1, and Hollywood had a 5-4 victory over Seattle.

At Hollywood, star first baseman R. C. Stevens singled in the ninth with the sacks loaded to score shortstop Jack Lohrke with the winning tally.

Seattle pilot Freddie Hutchinson used three pitchers in the final frame only to see the Stars come from behind to tie the score and then pull the game out of the fire.

San Diego's home town opener

saw Padre Ed Karak belt a triple in the sixth to score Milt Smith and win a 2-1 pitching battle. Bill Thomason scattered seven hits for his first win of the season. Southpaw Joe Hatten limited the Pad-

res to only three hits, but walked two in the third and then he wobbled a bunt which allowed the Padres to score one run without a hit.

Pitching Holds Up
The Solons, continuing to have good pitching, have held their Hollywood and Oakland opposition to a total of 13 runs in the first eight games of the season. Nippy Jones slugged the 2-run blast in the eighth for Sacramento.

Bill Werle of the Beavers rationed only four hits to the Seals before a crowd of 7,007. Seal chucker Tony Ponce had a shut-going into the sixth when Don

Eggert pounded his 2-run homer with teammate Don Lundberg following with a bases empty clincher.

Werle earlier in the day had complained of getting a "raw deal" from Cincinnati in his sale to Portland last week as he had only 62 days to go in the majors to qualify for a five-year pension of some \$50 a month. He showed no indication of being upset, though, on the playing field.

Werle not only pitched well but handled five fielding chances smoothly, twice starting double plays.

SEATTLE — The boxing future of both Carl (Bobo) Olson and Joey Maxim is at stake tonight in their scheduled 10-round bout before a near-capacity crowd at the Palouse arena and a national television audience.

Olson's world middleweight championship is not on the block, but the star of Sid Flaherty's stable anxious to whip Maxim decisively and put himself into a position to challenge Archie Moore for the light-heavyweight title.

The situation is even more crucial for the 33-year-old Maxim. A loss to the smaller Olson, and the former light-heavyweight champion will be shunted to the sidelines as far as any future big money matches are concerned.

The word from Jack (Doc) Kearns, Maxim's manager, was that his tiger was in "the best shape of his life this morning."

Jansen Returning To PCL Patures

SEATTLE — After eight years as a frontline pitcher and coach for the New York Giants, Larry Jansen is returning to the Pacific Coast League.

Dewey Soriano, general manager of the Seattle Rainiers, said Tuesday Jansen, who won 30 games when he worked for San Francisco in the PCL, in 1946, has been released by the Giants and is flying west to join the Seattle club.

Soriano said the 34-year-old right-hander has been signed on a 30-day "look" basis.

Jansen went to New York in 1947, after his big year at San Francisco. He won 21 games and lost 5 that year to lead the National League, and was a steady winner in succeeding years until a back injury put him on the inactive list last season. He became a pitching coach.

Soriano wouldn't say what salary Jansen will receive.

At Philadelphia, where the Giants announced Jansen's release, the pitcher, who is the father of seven, said the Seattle offer was "too good to refuse." He didn't give figures but said it was more than the \$10,000 he drew as a Giant coach. He added he also would be closer to his home at Forest Grove, Ore.
