Throughout the county work on the drive continues, according to staff members at county Red Cross offices in the Roseburg Armory.

Cited for outstanding work by Brig. Gen. Curtis T. Beecher, national director, were women in Canyonville, Tenmile and Riddle. Gen. Beecher said Canyonville residents turned in \$28,311. Mrs. M. P. Chappell conducted the drive in that area.

Riddle residents boosted the RC sum by \$436.36. Mrs. Lewis Rosser headed the work there.

Two Tenmile women, Mrs. John Ratkey and Mrs. Emma Dietrick, collected \$30.25 for the Red Cross. Reports from the three areas were final, said the general.

Court Decision

Backs Wolfson

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — The Illinois Supreme Court Friday ruled in favor of Louis E. Wolfson in his campaign to win control of Montgomery Ward & Co.

The decision upholds Wolfson's contention that Ward's system of electing three of its nine directors at annual meetings of stockholders was unconstitutional. The Supreme Court's opinion upheld a ruling by Circuit Judge Harry M. Fisher of Chicago.

In Chicago, Wolfson's headquarters issued a statement quoting the financier as saying he "is confident he will win control of the board at next week's meeting" of stockholders. Wolfson is in New York.

To Oregon Award

PORTLAND — The Edith Knight Hill award for service to Oregon went Thursday night to George S. Turnbull, 72, former dean of the University of Oregon Journalism school.

Now an editorial writer for the Albany Democrat-Herald, Turnbull was with the university Journalism school from 1917 until his retirement in 1948. He was acting dean in 1944-46 and dean in 1946-48.

Despite retirement, he is not through with the university. The school, noting his history of Oregon newspaper, published in recent years, has invited him to return to carry on research. He is expected to go back to the school in June.

The award was presented at the annual Matrix Table dinner given by the Portland chapter of Theta Sigma Phi, national honor society for women in Journalism.

Besides his career at the university, Turnbull has worked on newspapers in Bellingham, Seattle, Portland and San Francisco.

Towing Service Sale Suit Results In Foreclosure

A circuit court suit involving the sale of P&B Ambulance and Towing Service, 743 S. Stephens St., has resulted in foreclosure of mortgages on equipment and the home of the purchasers.

Circuit Judge pro tem A. N. Orcutt ruled in favor of J. M. and Lillian L. Veden, who sold the business to R. E. Ada and J. Dean McFall in December for \$20,000. The Vedens claimed the McFalls had defaulted in payments on the sales contract. McFalls countered that the sale was fraudulent, that the rolling stock of the company was in poor condition.

The suit was brought to trial before Judge Orcutt last week, and he wrote his judgment and decree this week.

Vedens had control of the business for about a year, purchasing it from Lyle F. Buell, who now is in the Army. Operating it until the time of the sale to McFalls were Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Gose, son-in-law and daughter of the Vedens. McFalls also claimed that earnings of the company were misrepresented before the sale, but the plaintiffs countercharged that the purchasers hadn't inspected the company's books before the sale.

Thalia Players

Set Performance

Tonight, Saturday

A three-act dramatic play, "The Night of January 16th," will be presented tonight and Saturday at 8 o'clock in Roseburg by the Thalia Community Players. It will be given at Central Junior High School. Tickets may be purchased at the door.

A mystery-drama written by Ayn Rand (author of "The Fountainhead"), the play revolves around a courtroom trial. It concerns a woman on trial for murder. Conflicting testimony leaves doubt as to her guilt.

Miss Rand's play is written with two conclusions. One finds the defendant guilty, the other does not. The verdict is rendered by a jury chosen from playgoers. Different juries will be chosen each night from the audience, according to Director Lorraine Kesner.

The cast will work in an unusual setting. The courtroom has been placed on the floor of the junior high school auditorium and presents a semi-theater-in-the-round. Because of this, cast members say, seating in the balcony is better than usual.

A cast of 21 players is featured. The three major roles are District Attorney Flint (Elliott Motschenbacher), Defense Counsel Stevens (Lynn Gaston), and defendant Karen Andre (Connie Linden).

Several cast members have had previous little theater, radio and television experience. This is the first production of the Thalia players in 1955.

Mrs. Kesner said the cast members were chosen for their visual aptness to the roles. Little makeup will be used, she added.

Sale Of Timber Results

In \$20,000 Law Suit

Sale of timber east of Myrtle Creek, which allegedly resulted in termination of a logging contract, has resulted in a \$20,000 lawsuit in circuit court.

The complaint, filed this week, was made by Ivan Bode against Ernest W. Segessenman. Bode said Segessenman contracted his services in the logging of five million feet of timber. When Segessenman sold the timber, Bode charges, he was ordered to stop logging. He asks the amount in recompense for the amount he says he would have made from logging.

U. S. Savings Bonds Sales Down Slightly

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in Douglas County during March were less than during the month a year ago, but so far this year, the county is running ahead of last year on sales.

This year, \$314,106 worth of bonds have been sold here, compared with \$248,673 for the first quarter of last year. In March, \$131,884 of the total was sold, compared to \$163,447 in March, 1954.

Ted R. Gamble, Portland, chairman of the Oregon Savings Bond Committee, said 27.8 per cent of the county's quota for 1955 has been sold. That compares to 29.4 per cent for the state.

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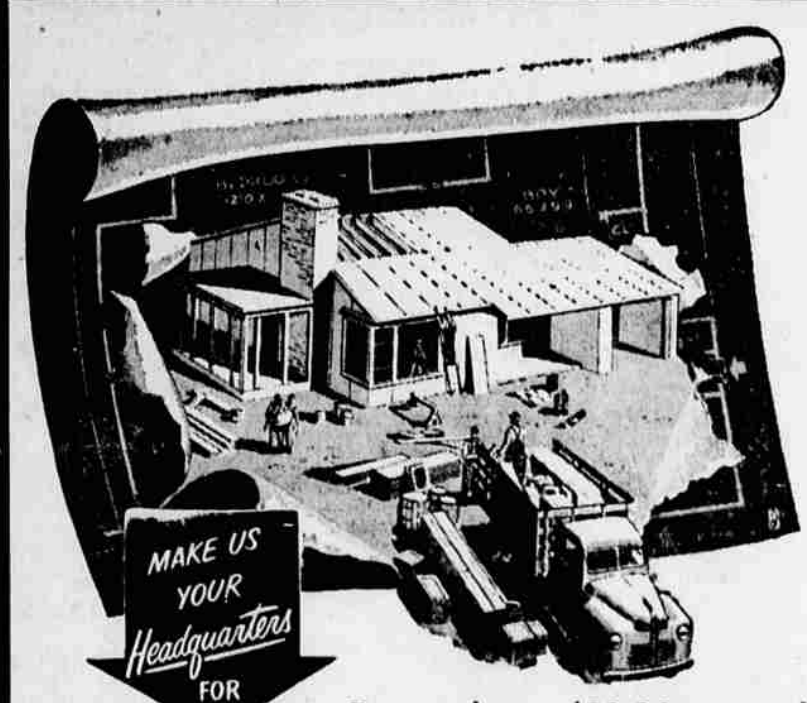
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
