Helser Testifies 'Objectives' Of Clients Followed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — J. Henry Helser testified Wednesday that his management investment firm, with headquarters at Portland, Ore., handled accounts in conservative stocks in efforts to fulfill a client's "objectives."

"What do you mean particularly by clients' objectives?" asked Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman. "Everybody who comes into the market wants to make money," Helser replied.

He explained that a client in opening an account with his firm explains his particular "objective," such as desire for money to build a house or educate children.

Judge Goodman is nearing the case without a jury. The Securities and Exchange Commission is seeking a permanent injunction to restrain the company and Helser from alleged violations of anti-fraud regulations.

Helser, in his fifth day on the witness stand, was questioned by SEC attorney Robert E. Burns.

Helser said the company in buying stocks for its clients "tried to buy into a basic industry that holds up in good times and bad."

He said the company did not purchase promotional or highly speculative stocks.

House Approves Bill Regulating Signs On Highway

SALEM (AP) — Legislation to license and regulate billboards along highways was passed by the Oregon House of Representatives Wednesday with only four dissenting votes. It goes to the Senate.

The bill provides that the state labor commissioner shall license them, and set up standards of attractiveness.

Signs would have to be 1,000 feet apart on throughways.

On other highways, signs of more than 300 square feet would have to be 500 feet apart, while signs smaller than that would have to be 300 feet from each other.

No business would be allowed to advertise more than once in each half-mile.

A five-year period would be granted existing signs to comply with the law.

Voting against the bill were Reps. William W. Bradeen, Burns; Pat Dooley, Portland; Thomas R. McClellan, Neosho; Boyd R. Overhulse, Madras; and Walter J. Pearson, Portland.

The bill was drafted by the House Highways Committee after the Oregon Roadside Council and the billboard industry couldn't agree on a measure.

Edmund Purdom, Wife Fail At Reconciliation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A four-hour conference with a Superior Court judge left actor Edmund Purdom and his blonde wife Tita without a reconciliation.

The Purdoms separated last November and he filed suit for divorce in January charging mental cruelty. It was delayed automatically when Mrs. Purdom, former London dancer, applied for a reconciliation.

She emerged tearfully from Superior Judge Louis H. Burkes chambers after the lengthy discussions. She had nothing to say.
