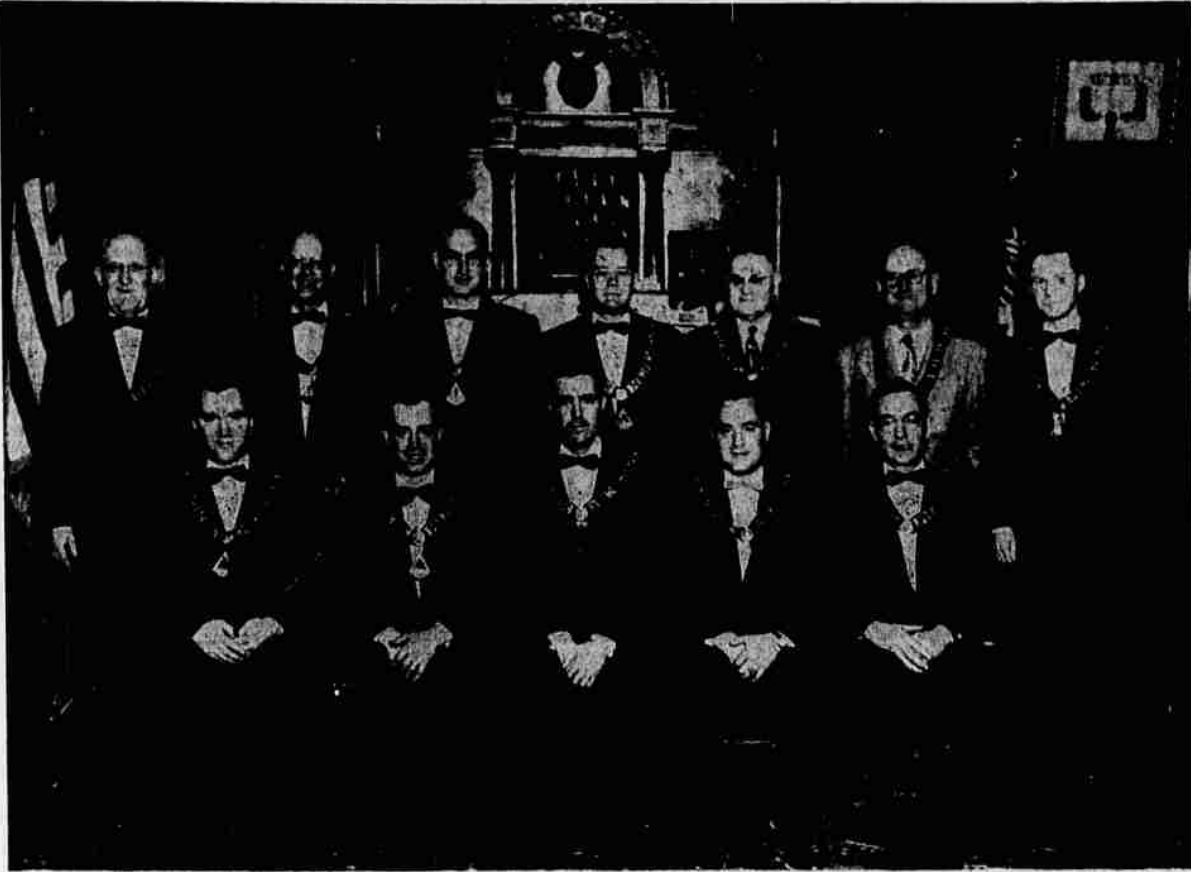

MR. MICELLI SPEAKS ON SCHOOL BUDGET AT BPW CLUB MEET

Victor Micelli, clerk of School District No. 4, spoke Monday evening to the Business and Professional Women's Club on the 1955-56 proposed budget. Mr. Micelli said that in his opinion this was a good budget, made up by responsible people, who had worked diligently to bring a good budget to the voters.

Mr. Micelli brought out the fact that most of us do not take enough interest in our school problems. We let a handful of people decide school issues when in reality District No. 4 is big business and should be the concern of all voters. People must believe that the educational program is worthwhile and work for the continued betterment of school conditions. A comprehensive study item by item in the budget was made by the group. Residents are asked to vote on \$1,014,454.16, which is \$79,338.90 more than the amount approved last year outside 6 per cent limitation. However, the new budget provides for the education of approximately 270 more pupils than last year. In addition it includes payments on bonds and interest approved January 11, 1955.
