Fresh Fighting Breaks Out In South Viet Nam

SAIGON, Viet Nam — The Binh Xuyen private army shelled the headquarters of the Vietnamese national army Tuesday afternoon in a new outbreak of violence in free South Viet Nam.

Eight Nationalist soldiers and two Binh Xuyen commandos were wounded in a 50-minute battle which raged around the heart of Saigon.

(The French news agency reported that a Saigon dispatch to Paris that new fighting had broken out in the Dakao quarter, on the northeast side of the Vietnamese capital across town from the army headquarters. The dispatch said armed groups were exchanging shots and grenades.)

The bombardment of the headquarters was the most serious break in the uneasy truce between the government and the Binh Xuyen since their street battle March 30. At least 26 persons were killed and 112 wounded in that clash.

Compromise Seen On Allotment Of State Senators

SALEM — Sponsors of the proposed constitutional amendment to give each county one state senator after running into strong opposition.

Reps. Wayne Giesy, Monroe, and Emil Stunz, Nyssa, told the House Elections and Reapportionment Committee Monday night they would amend their measure to keep the present limit of 30 senators.

They would have 18 senators from Western Oregon, and 12 from the east side. Under the measure as introduced, there would be 18 senators from each side of the mountains.

Under the system now in effect, which was voted by the people in 1952, there are 24 senators from Western Oregon and six from Eastern Oregon.

The committee already has voted 6 to 5 for the resolution, but now will consider it again. The committee split along geographical lines, with the five Multnomah members comprising the opposition.

The resolution would leave the House apportioned by population.

Opponents at Monday night's hearing includes Mrs. Ronald K. Campbell, Corvallis, president of the League of Women Voters of Oregon; Elmer McClure, State Grange Master; and Ken Reinke, chairman of the Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee.

Reinke also spoke for the Republican committee of that county.

They argued that the resolution denies majority rule.

Reinke called it a "flagrant effort to create sectionalism." He asked for another hearing based on the proposed amendments.

Diane Committed Suicide, Mrs. Fong Tells Witness

PORTLAND — A bartender and one-time police undercover agent testified Monday that he had been told by Sherry Fong that Diane Hank committed suicide.

Mrs. Fong and her husband are on trial for murder in the girl's death.

The witness, Robert Richards, said that in the course of a love tryst with Mrs. Fong in a Portland motel, he told Diane, 16-year-old Portland schoolgirl, had committed suicide because of unrequited love.

Police have said that Mrs. Fong has denied knowing what happened to the girl who vanished after spending a night in the Fong home a year ago.

Bernarr McFadden Jailed For Failure To Post Bond

JERSEY CITY, N.J. — Former publisher and physical culturist Bernarr McFadden—whose wealth at one time was estimated at 30 million dollars—spent the night in the Hudson County jail for failure to post a \$20,000 bond.

The 86-year-old exponent of rugged living was arrested Monday in connection with his third wife's attempts to collect several thousand dollars in back-alimony.

His attorney, Harry Gilgulin of Brooklyn, N.Y., was to appear before juvenile and domestic relations Judge Morris E. Barison Tuesday in effort to free the octogenarian.

County, Lumber Firm Reach Swap Agreement

Agreement has been reached in the exchange of 120 acres of timberland by the Douglas County Lumber Co., according to Robert E. Kischel, head of the County Land Dept.

In a hearing late last week, all negotiations with the exception of release of mineral rights were completed. Oil rights on the lumber company ground are held by Sinclair Oil Co. and by the county with Oil Developers Inc.

The land is located in the lower part of Smith River. Kischel said the exchange consolidates immature forest land for the county in that area.

John Wood, San Francisco, vice president of the lumber company, and other company officials represented the firm here.

Two Colorado River Swimmers Return Safe

GRAND CANYON, Ariz. — Believed for several hours Monday to have perished in the treacherous Colorado River, two Los Angeles swimmers are alive and continuing their attempt to be the first to swim the 290 miles from Lees Ferry, Ariz., to Lake Mead, Nev.

The two Stanford University graduates, William K. Beer, 25, and John Daggett, 27, had completed 87 miles of their journey when they reached Bright Angel's Lodge in the Grand Canyon National Park Monday night.

They had spent nine days in the chilly waters of the Upper Colorado dressed in skindivers' face masks, swim fins, woolen underwear, sweatshirts, skin tight rubber shirts and inflated life jackets.

Chou En-Lai Says Dangers Of War Are Increasing

BANDUNG, Indonesia — Red China's Premier Chou En-Lai told the Asian-African conference Tuesday that "both in the East and in the West, the danger of war is increasing."

But he also added: "The peaceful coexistence of countries with different social systems can be realized."

Chou's only reference to the Formosa situation was one sentence: "The United States continues to create tension in the Taiwan (Formosa) area."

Chou had other tough words about the United States.

He declared Communist China was not interested in subversive activities but instead is being "subverted by the United States of America."

"If you do not believe this," he told the delegates, "then you can send representatives to China to take a look. You are all welcome."

Chou continued: "We do not hide the fact that we believe in communism. But this is not a meeting to discuss ideologies but to seek a common ground and not great divergences."

CAA Hearing On Ditched Airliner Opens Tuesday

SEATTLE — A Civil Aeronautics Board hearing on the ditching of a Pan American World Airways airliner off the Oregon coast March 26 was to open here Tuesday.

Thirty three witnesses, including 13 of the 23 persons aboard when the plane set off on the ill-fated flight to Honolulu, have been called to testify.

Four persons died in the crash-landing at sea.

The hearing is expected to last two or three days.
