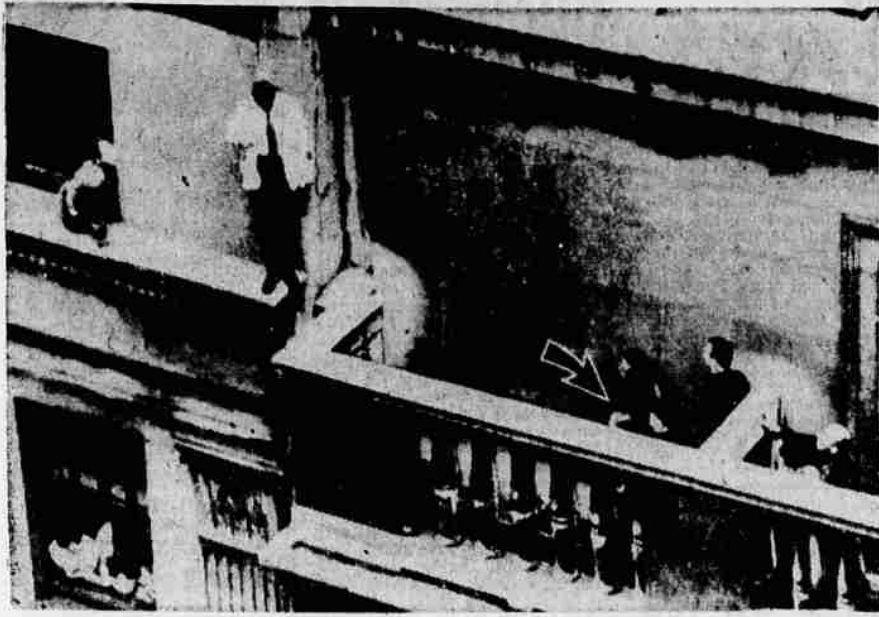

Shelling Of Matsui Island Answered By Nationalist Fire

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Mme. Chiang Kai-shek disclosed Monday the Communists last week shelled Matsui Island from the mainland nine and one half miles away and the Nationalists replied with their own guns.

The wife of President Chiang Kai-shek also disclosed in an exclusive interview she and Chiang visited Matsui on Thursday for eight hours. Official reports released here have not mentioned

shelling of any of the offshore islands for the past three days. She said the shelling was "quite heavy" but declined to say if it occurred while she was there. "Our troops are in fine fettle and have the will to resist," she added.

The Matsui group, blocking the Red harbor of Fochow, lies 120 miles northwest of Formosa. About 11,000 civilians live on them, and at last report their garrison had

been increased to about the same amount of soldiers. Chiang Kai-shek, his wife said, is "inflexibly determined" to defend the Matsui and the Quemoy group which block the harbor of Amoy 150 miles to the south. She said this will be done "with or without American help."

Oppenheimer Pays Glowing Tribute To Albert Einstein

SEATTLE (AP)—"For all scientists and most men, this is a day of mourning," said Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer Monday upon hearing of the death of world-acclaimed scientist Albert Einstein. Oppenheimer, controversial atomic scientist, was moved visibly by the news as he changed planes here en route to Eugene, Ore., where he is to lecture at the University of Oregon.

"Einstein was one of the greats of all ages," Oppenheimer said. "A year that sees the death of Einstein and Fermi is a hard year on physicists. Physics isn't getting any easier."

Enrico Fermi, 53, Italian-born physicist who was the first man to split the atom, died last Nov. 28 of cancer.

Oppenheimer had been scheduled to lecture at the University of Washington but Dr. Henry Schmitz, president, refused to invite him. Faculty members and scientific groups protested. Asked by a reporter if he would come to the university if an invitation were extended in the future, Oppenheimer replied: "Yes. If the university wanted me and it could be arranged. No one is interested in a repetition of the events of the last four months."

Construction Finished On N. Umpqua Road Link

Construction of the North Umpqua Highway between the Circle H Ranch and Steamboat has been completed, and the Douglas County Court is planning a tour of inspection preparatory to accepting the road. Commissioner E. R. Metzger said the section has passed the inspection of the Bureau of Public Roads and the county will now take a look at the cooperative project.

The road has a gravel surface for the approximately 14 miles to Steamboat. Contractor on the job was the John H. Saxton Construction Co.

Foreign News Briefs

PARIS (AP)—Moderates showed the most strength and followers of Gen. Charles de Gaulle suffered the biggest losses in Sunday's elections for 1,869 members of regional councils, the interior ministry announced.

CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—Dr. Herbert Evatt, Australia's stormy Laborite leader, won re-election Monday as boss of the opposition party in parliament by a 2-1 majority.

ANTWERP, Belgium (AP)—Some 30,000 Catholics demonstrated here Sunday against the government's proposed cut in school subsidies.

YOKOHAMA, Japan (AP)—Fifty pro-Nationalist and pro-Communist Chinese clashed in a free-for-all fight Monday that prevented a Red China trade mission from stopping over here. A hundred police broke up the melee. Kyodo News Service reported several persons injured.

NEW DELHI (AP)—The Indian government has relaxed—albeit of schedule—its virtual ban on shipments of the monkeys needed to make the Salk polio vaccine.

Wisman and Schmeling, by winning the debate the third time for Concordia, retired the championship cup in that event.

America Proud Of Einstein—like

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower, in a statement on the death of scientist Albert Einstein, said Monday "No other man contributed so much to the vast expansion of twentieth century knowledge."

The statement issued at the President's vacation headquarters said: "For 22 years, the United States has been the freely-chosen home

of Albert Einstein. For 15 years, he has been a citizen of the United States by his own free and deliberate choice. Americans welcomed him here. Americans were proud, too, that he sought and found here a climate of freedom in his search for knowledge and truth.

"No other man contributed so much to the vast expansion of twentieth century knowledge. Yet no other man was more modest in the possession of the power that is knowledge, more sure that power without wisdom is deadly.

"To all who live in the nuclear age, Albert Einstein exemplified the mighty creative ability of the individual in a free society."

Ousted School Supt.'s Backers Win At Polls

IRVING, Tex. (AP)—Backers of fired Supt. John Beard have won control of this city's strife-torn school system.

But their regime will last only three weeks. They'll have to win another election May 7 to keep control. County Judge Lew Sterrett was to canvass returns Monday in an election Saturday which re-created the Irving independent school district with a new seven-member board. Beard backers won four seats.
