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VINDICATES FATHER

LONDON (AP) — Adm. Earl Louis Mountbatten finally vindicated his father Tuesday. The handsome 57-year-old cousin of Queen Elizabeth II took over the job of Britain's first sea lord and chief of the Naval staff. Mountbatten's father, Prince Louis of Battenberg, was forced to resign the job under political pressure at the onset of World War I because of his German ancestry.

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Pan American Says Planes Have All Undergone Tests Since Stratocruiser Crash

SEATTLE (AP) — A Pan American World Airways official said Tuesday the airline has conducted additional tests and inspections of its entire Stratocruiser fleet of 27 planes since one of them was ditched in the Pacific Ocean March 26 with loss of four lives.

Clarence M. Young, executive vice president of the company's Pacific-Alaskan division, testified as one of the first witnesses at a Civil Aeronautics Board hearing into last month's accident.

Young said the airline has "taken all practical measures" to assure there will be "no other incident, similar in character."

The PAA plane had 23 aboard when it went down off the Oregon Coast after losing an engine. Nineteen were rescued.

Young said the measures taken by the airline to check the Boeing

airplane Co.-built Stratocruisers would be covered in detail by other witnesses.

Young said the airline's investigation was handicapped because it was unable to recover the engine which dropped from the plane into deep water.

"The aircraft (Stratocruiser) still remains in the front rank of the latest equipment," he said, "and compares most favorably with any aircraft in service today in terms of safety, reliability and passenger comfort."

Capt. Herman S. Joslyn, pilot on the Honolulu-Seattle flight when the ditching occurred, told in detail of the last five minutes after the No. 3 engine dropped off.

"I took the mike and stated that we had an emergency and dropped it," Joslyn said. "Someone yelled that No. 3 was gone, so I told him to give it to the radio (call for help)."

"At the same time I was trying to get the plane under control."

"The airspeed was about 220 and going higher, so I closed the throttles on all engines to keep the airspeed down."

Joslyn said that later, after the plane was more nearly under control, he called for full power but the flight engineer told him the engines would not respond. Joslyn said "a circuit breaker had popped."

"With all power available," he

continued, "we still maintained a high rate of descent. The only thing we lacked was power."

Joslyn estimated five minutes elapsed from the loss of the engine to the ditching.

The hearing was expected to end Thursday. Thirty-two witnesses are scheduled to testify.

The panel conducting the hearing includes Joseph P. Adams, vice chairman of the CAB, and Leon Cuddeback of the CAB bureau of safety investigation.

Trial In Deer Hunting Tragedy Commences

Ferguson later told authorities he had accidentally shot the artist.

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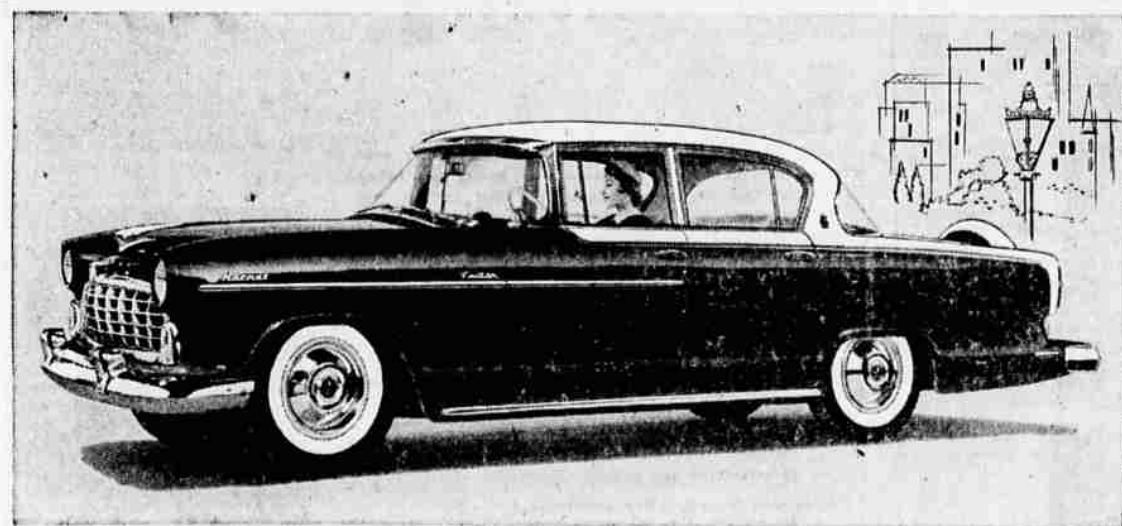
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
