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Anti-Communist Feeling In Evidence At Conference Of Asian, African Nations

WASHINGTON (AP) — The West thinks it has troubles. But the 29 Asian and African nations in conference at Bandung, Indonesia, have troubles, too.

They sent more than 600 delegates there, representing over one billion people who include Christians, Buddhists, Moslems, Hindus, Communists, anti-Communists and nations such as India called neutralists.

What they have in common is that they are from Asia, Africa, and the Middle East and that most of them are colored. Russia and the other big white powers — the United States and the West Europeans — were not invited.

While the United States and its Western Allies have differences, they are at least united in common defense against communism. The delegates at Bandung do not have even that kind of unity.

Indian Prime Minister Nehru may have to struggle with Red China's Premier Chou En-lai, if not for leadership of the conference then at least to chart its direction or to prevent it from following Chou out the window.

Nehru, great critics of the West and soft-talkers about China, is a tough anti-Communist at home. Chou will probably be asked by some delegates to promise not to start war by attacking Formosa or the Matsuo and Quemoy Islands.

Anti-Defence Strong — That group's members — the United States, Britain, France, New Zealand, Pakistan, the Philippines, Thailand and Australia — banded together for mutual defense against attack by the Communists of China or North Vietnam.

Of the eight members only Pakistan, the Philippines and Thailand were invited to Bandung. If the organization is assailed at the conference they can be expected to team up in its defense, led by the Philippines' Carlos Romulo.

At the conference Egypt's Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser would like support for the Arabs' dispute with Israel, which isn't there. But the Arab nations at Bandung — Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia, Iraq — don't see eye-to-eye on everything, either.

The first three have criticized Iraq for signing a defense treaty with Turkey which, although present at Bandung, is allied with the West and is not a member of the Arab League.

Red China Threat Heeded

Some of the Africans and Asians at Bandung — with plenty of reason to remember the long history of West European Colonialism, imperialism, exploitation and practice of white supremacy at their expense — will probably tee off on the West.

Trick-Or-Treat Slayer To Die In Electric Chair

EBENSBURG, Pa. (AP) — Harry Gossard must die in the electric chair for the pre-Halloween trick-or-treat slaying of six-year-old Karen Mauk.

Gossard pleaded guilty to strangling the child the night of last Oct. 28. Sentence was passed this week by Judges Ivan J. McKenrick, George W. Griffith and H. Clifton McWilliams of Cambria, Pa. County court.

The three-court judges heard evidence to fix the degree of Gossard's guilt about a month ago. The child's body, half nude, was found near the entrance to a cemetery two miles from her home in nearby Conemaugh.

The court ordered Gossard sent to Western State Penitentiary. The execution date will be set by Gov. George M. Leader.

Six Bidders Want To Operate Timberline

PORTLAND (AP) — Six bidders want to operate Timberline Lodge on Mt. Hood, Forest Supervisor Lloyd R. Olson reported Monday. The successful bidder will be announced within a few days.

The big federally owned lodge was closed down recently when its operators, Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Slaney, failed to pay the resort's electricity bill.

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
