Plans To Build Vast Pipeline Said Progressing

NEW YORK (AP)—Plans for construction of the 160 million dollar Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp.'s natural gas pipeline into Oregon and Washington are proceeding according to schedule, C.R. Williams president, declared.

Williams said that Pacific Northwest expects to sign a bond purchase agreement covering the pipeline's financing with underwriters in New York on Thursday or Friday and plans to have the bond offering next week.

The Federal Power Commission on Feb. 11 approved the company's proposed financing, major part of which would be the sale of 120 million dollars of first mortgage bonds to insurance companies.

The pipeline, extending some 1,500 miles, will extend from the San Juan Basin of New Mexico to the Pacific Northwest states.

Williams indicated that arrangements for the sale of securities to cover the cost of the pipeline had been slowed a bit by the huge amount of legal work involved.

"There are 326 pages in the financing plans and it takes time to get 12 to 15 lawyers to agree on every word," Williams added.

He repeated his statement of last week that Pacific Northwest hopes to start "putting pipe into the ground around the first of May."

Last week a court action blocking construction of the pipeline was dropped by Trans-Northwest Gas Co., Spokane, Wash.

It was understood that an agreement between the two companies involved purchase by Pacific of certain assets of Trans-Northwest in the area around Spokane. In return, it was reported, Trans-Northwest agreed to drop its action in U.S. court of appeals in Philadelphia challenging certification of Pacific by the FPC.

California Said Facing Critical Water Shortage

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Indications that most sections of California will be hit by a critical water shortage this summer were given in a U. S. Department of Commerce publication.


The publication, Water Supply Forecasts for the Western United States, reported the San Joaquin and Sacramento basins would suffer most.

Seasonal rainfall in the San Joaquin Basin had only averaged 70 per cent of normal by the end of March, and the Sacramento Basin has been "much below normal," the report said.

March was the driest month since September.

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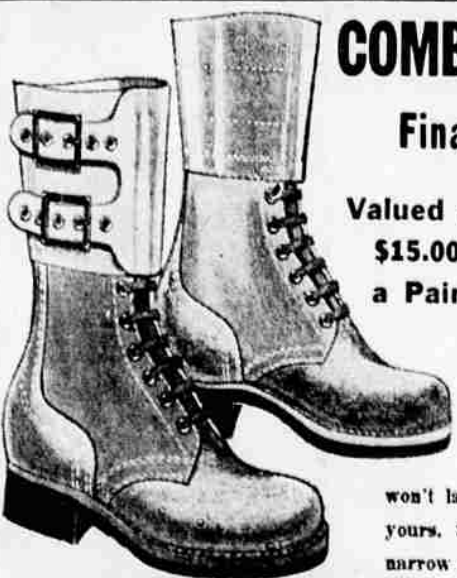
