

Mitchell Says Eliminating Party Oath Wouldn't Stop Barring Challenged Persons

CHICAGO (AP) — Stephen A. Mitchell, former Democratic national chairman, said Tuesday that elimination of the party loyalty oath would not prevent barring of 1932 convention delegates whose loyalty is challenged.

Mitchell, who heads the 70-member Democratic Advisory Committee on rules for next year's convention, said he believes that should former Gov. Byrnes of South Carolina, or Gov. Kennon of Louisiana and Shivers of Texas seek credentials as delegates, they would be rejected.

"No one should be misled about the effect of dropping the loyalty oath," Mitchell said in an interview. "It doesn't follow that there are no requirements of eligibility."

Mitchell said it is his opinion that the three Southern governors would be denied seats by the credentials committee "because they are political apostates."

"The delegates will not forget," Mitchell said, "that they participated in the 1932 convention as Democrats, and then went home and supported the opposition. It's a question of party responsibility. I

think these men would be personally obnoxious to the convention, and there's plenty of precedent for rejecting delegates on this ground."

pointed out that such rejection would not deny any state a vote, because alternates to rejected emmissaries would be seated.

Asked whether the convention would not be bound by rules to seat any delegate who was regularly elected in his home state, Mitchell replied, "Not at all. A convention makes its own rules. It's a usual parliamentary rule that a person who has demonstrated bad faith can be challenged. The Senate has rejected a regularly elected candidate."

Despite the touchy question of eligibility of some of the 1932 Southern leaders, Mitchell predicted, "We won't have this fight again."

The loyalty oath rule for the 1932 Democratic convention provided that delegates pledge their aid to getting the convention's nominees on the ticket in their states under the Democratic Party label, but delegates could be seated without taking the pledge if to take it would violate state law or instructions of the state Democratic governing body.

Cost Of Hospital Objections Delay Committee Action

SALEM (AP) — Objections to the cost of the proposed \$15,000,000 state mental hospital near Portland tied up the Legislature's Joint Ways and Means Committee Tuesday as it began consideration of a \$14,904,658 state building program for the next two years.

Glenn Stanton, Portland architect who is drawing plans for the hospital, told the committee that the initial \$6,330,000 appropriation would provide a 450-bed unit.

Sens. George A. Ulett, Coquille, and Gene L. Brown, Grants Pass, criticized the \$10,000 per bed cost as "unrealistic."

Ulett said he couldn't reconcile the hospital cost with a cost of about \$300 per inmate to build and equip the \$2,500,000 first section of the correctional institution to be built north of Salem.

Stanton cited instances in other states where hospital costs have gone as high as \$18,000 per bed.

The committee couldn't agree whether to introduce the building program in 28 separate bills, or to package them by departments.

The Board of Control would get \$10,205,000 for construction at state institutions, the Board of Higher Education \$2,975,000, Department of Agriculture and Printing Department \$160,000, Fish Commission \$50,298, and Oregon Technical Institute \$414,500.

The committee approved introduction of bills to put civil defense workers under state industrial accident insurance, but turned down a proposal to have an interim committee study timber taxation.

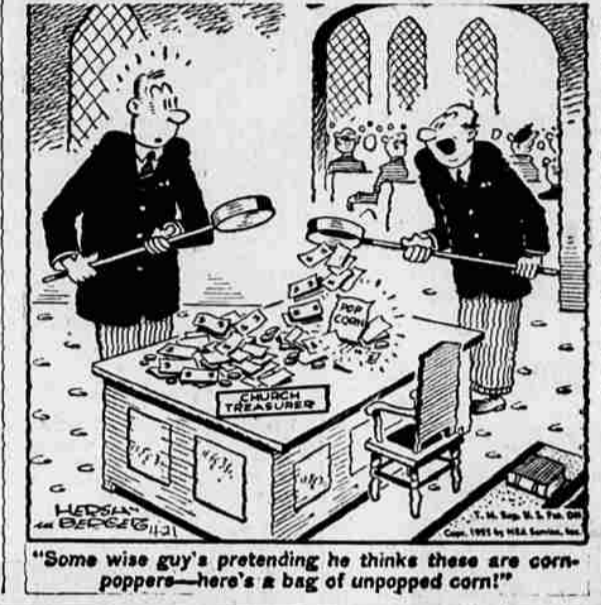

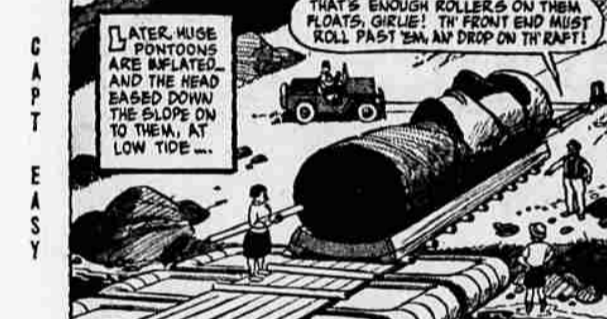
