Corsi Charges Refugee Act Complete Failure, Scandal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edward Corsi, who was fired as State Department immigration advisor, declared Wednesday "the security gang" headed by Scott McLeod has turned the refugee relief act into "a complete failure and national scandal."

Appearing before a Senate judiciary subcommittee, Corsi said the program needs "new, competent and sympathetic leadership," and should be taken out of "the hands of the policemen."

Corsi advanced these contentions in a statement as he took the stand, under oath, to tell his side of the controversy which has boiled up since he was dismissed by Secretary Dulles two weeks ago.

McLeod had just testified that Corsi once told him he intended to run for political office in New York State in 1956.

McLeod said he informed Secretary Dulles. "I thought the secretary should know about it," he said. "It seemed to me significant to the role he (Corsi) played in the department."

Corsi was an advisor on the department's security chief. Denouncing its present administration, Corsi said: "The President's refugee relief act is in the hands of policemen.

It is a police job. "Mr. McLeod is police trained. Mr. John Reiger, the second in command, is security police trained. Mr. Roy Wade, the European representative, was a Texas Ranger, and so on down the line."

"I have the highest respect for policemen and their services to society but I do not believe they are particularly qualified to administer refugee relief projects."

"There is not a single top administrator in the whole administration of the act who has ever had any experience with immigrants or refugees."

Corsi has charged that McLeod engineered his dismissal, and denied he ever informed anyone in the department of alleged intentions to run for political office.

Corsi, a prominent figure in New York State politics, has made unsuccessful races for the U.S. Senate and for mayor of New York.

A critic of present immigration laws, he was under fire from Rep. Walter (D-Pa.), co-author of the existing act, when he was let out. He has denied Walter's accusations of former association with groups later cited as Communist fronts and Dulles in letting him go said no question of security was involved.

AEC Will Hold Surplus Auction

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — The Atomic Energy Commission will hold an auction April 25-28 for some 6 million dollars worth of surplus items including cement mixers and automobiles, nuts, bolts and 6,000 railroad ties.

There will be chains, cranes and carburetors, tractors, trucks and trailers, safety shoes and clothing, 1,500 metal drums, an unspecified number of quonset huts, plus thousands of other things.

The AEC said the auction will be held in the Airway Ballroom at Pasco. The equipment for sale, both new and used, will be available for inspection inside the Hanford barricades from April 16 to 24. Buses will leave North Richland from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. to take prospective buyers around.

The firm of Ross & Ross of Minneapolis will conduct the auction for the Blaw-Knox Co. and Kaiser Engineers, prime contractors for AEC construction here. The AEC said B. K. Maxwell of Kaiser Engineers at Richland has free catalogues of the items for sale.

The equipment on the auction block cost the AEC 6 million dollars for use in building new plants here.

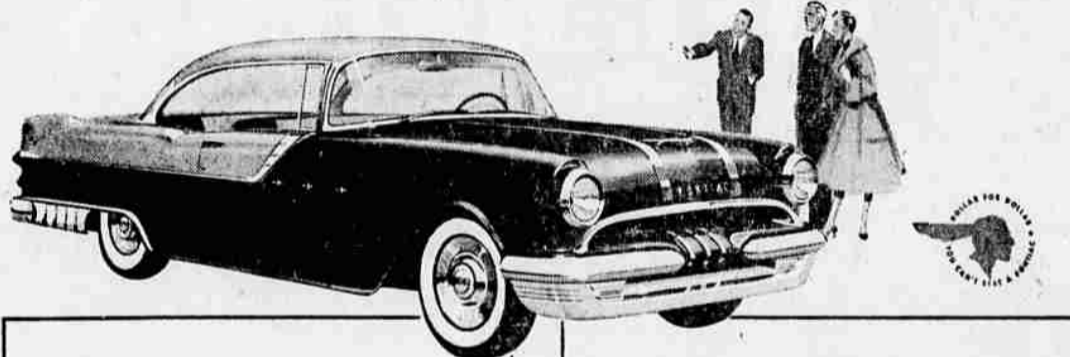

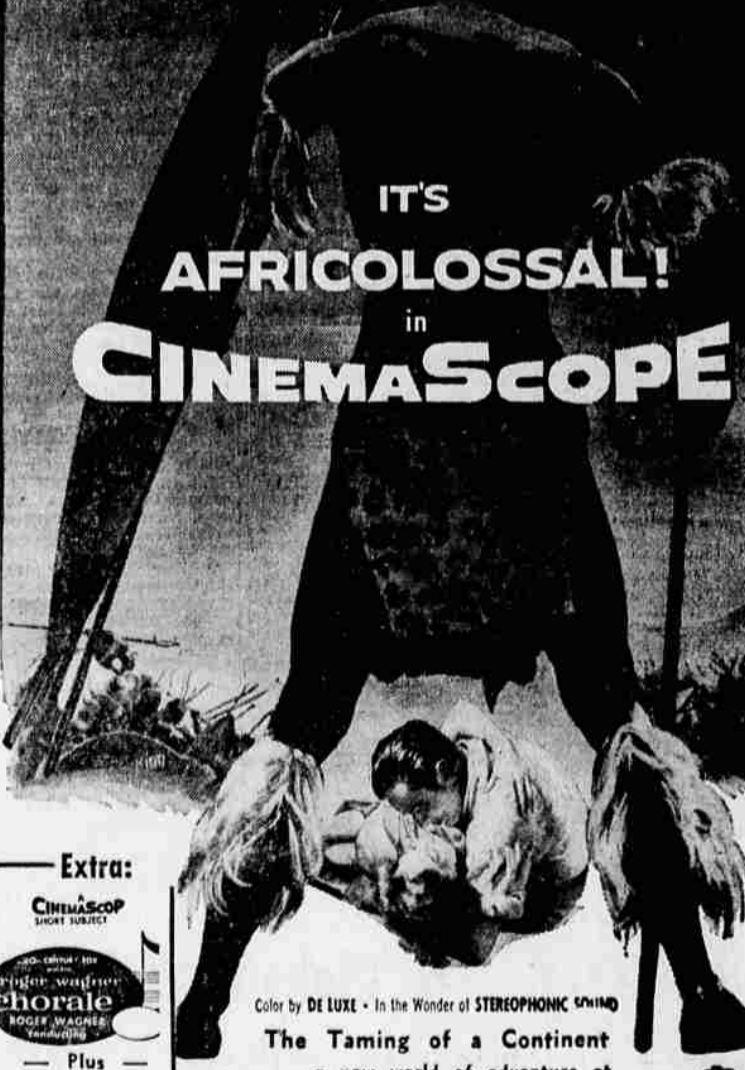
