Cory Happy At Decision Reversing Conviction

strict attorney's discretion as to whether the act could be invoked against a convict on a crime of non-violent nature.

Lurid History Cory's history in the past 29 months has been lurid.

In November 1952, he was arrested and charged with a safe burglary in a local fraternal club. He was tried on the charge in February 1953 and acquitted by a circuit court jury.

Just six months later, he was in jail again. This time it was after he allegedly kidnaped the wife of the attorney who had defended him in the burglary trial — Mrs. William H. Jones.

Jones filed five charges against him. Four were dismissed in a district court hearing. The fifth, possession of a firearm, stood and Cory was bound over to the grand jury, which indicted him on the charge.

He was tried in the county in December 1953, convicted and sent to the state prison for four years.

Habitual Criminal Charge Then Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults filed an information charging him with being a habitual criminal.

After three months in the penitentiary, Cory was returned to stand trial on Stults' charge. He was convicted again. The 4-year sentence was set aside and Circuit Judge William G. East, Eugene, meted the 15-year term just reversed in Salem.

The habitual charge came about because of three convictions before the one on the gun possession charge. Specifically, they were three years in a federal reformatory for a postoffice burglary in Oklahoma, two years in a federal reformatory for another postoffice burglary in Texas and six months to 10 years for attempted burglary in Utah.

Records show other convictions. Law enforcement men say he has spent about 18 years of his life in prison.

The Supreme Court opinion was written by Justice Earl C. Latour. It upheld the conviction on the gun-bearing charge, which Cory still claims came only after he had acted as agent of Mrs. Jones in the attempted sale of two .22-caliber revolvers.

That's why he claims a "raw deal." The particular charge was filed by Stults. Jones had filed a complaint charging the same crime, but different circumstances.

But as Cory said Thursday afternoon: "I know I'm not an angel. He'll be delivered to the penitentiary by a deputy sheriff sometime this week."
