Health Officials Urge Cooperation On Salk Vaccine

PORTLAND — Health officials are appealing to Oregon residents to see to it that young children and pregnant women get the Salk polio vaccine as it becomes available.

Letters are going to all Oregon physicians, asking them to help see that the persons most susceptible get the first polio shots. They urged the vaccine be used only for expectant mothers and children 1 to 14 years old.

The public was urged to co-operate.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, and Dr. A. O. Pitman, president of the State Medical Society, are sending the joint letter.

"If sufficient vaccine is available by fall, the 15-30 age group should also be given the opportunity to have these immunizations," they said.

Health officials said no word yet has been received on when to expect shipments of the vaccine for school children.

Consideration Given Keeping Contracts Home

WASHINGTON — Serious consideration has been promised to a plea to give under-bid Pennsylvania electrical firms contracts for generators and transformers rather than to the low-bidding English firm.

The appeal was made to Army engineers that they channel the work into a distressed labor area of Pennsylvania. Involved is a million man hours of work on material scheduled to be used on the Chief Joseph Dam on the Columbia River.

English Electric Co., underbid all others, offering to supply three transformers for \$470,955 and six water wheel generators for \$5,460,361.

Low American bidder for the transformers was Pennsylvania Transformer Co., Cannonsburg, Pa., which asked \$536,882. Westinghouse Electric Co., Pittsburgh, asked \$6,338,491 for the generators.

SUBDISTRICT MARION

SALEM — By a 38-18 vote, the House approved Thursday a bill to subdistrict Marion County into two parts for the election of its four state representatives.

The bill, which goes to the Senate, would be referred to the voters, to be county at the 1956 general election.
