An interesting event of the week was the luncheon meeting of the Roseburg Branch of AAUW Saturday at the Hotel Umpqua Civic Room at which time one of Oregon's outstanding women lawyers, Mrs. Cecelia P. Galey of Sweet Home, was the guest speaker on the topic, "Wills and Estates."

Miss Evangeline Chapman, pianist, played a special arrangement of the song, "Deep Purple," after which the group sang the Oregon State Song accompanied by Mrs. J. A. Caraway.

Mrs. Russell Hagg was program chairman for the day. Mrs. Harold Hoyt, president, conducted the meeting, at which time it was announced the following delegates will attend the state convention of AAUW in Portland: Mrs. Harold Hoyt, Mrs. M. Announcement was made as to the next program for the Roseburg Branch, which will be held Wednesday, May 11, at 7:30 p.m. at the High School Library Arts building with Mrs. Bety Lou Dunlop, Ashland, state education chairman for AAUW, as the guest speaker.

The luncheon was arranged by Mrs. Harold E. Schmeer. Mrs. Galey stressed the importance of persons having wills prepared. The drawing of a will, she said, is not a "last minute effort" prior to death. With the assistance of legal counsel it becomes a simple matter, she added. A legally prepared will circumvents much work on the part of lawyers handling of estates in the event of death, she added.

Cited instances where months were consumed in finding rightful legal heirs because "no will had been prepared." Often the speaker said, money and other properties from an estate does not go to a person the deceased would have preferred, "because the person was not related."

Mrs. Galey recently completed a three-weeks term as circuit judge "pro-tem" in Marion County. She is the second woman in the state to serve in such a capacity. She told AAUW members she accepted the appointment with a feeling of hesitation.

The session as circuit judge was a wonderful experience, she added. Much of her time was spent in the court of domestic relations. A practicing lawyer in her home town, Mrs. Galey is a member of the Oregon State Bar Assn. She is an active member of Toastmistresses, Zonta and BPW.

An attractive, softspoken person, Mrs. Galey has served as state president of BPW. She is currently on the national steering committee of the organization and is chairman of its national legislative committee.

She attended Reed College, the Northwestern College of Law and the University of Oregon Law School. Since 1947 she has lived in Sweet Home. She and her husband were in partnership in a law firm there until his death in May 1954. Mrs. Galey pointed out that the fact they had drawn a will previously made the settling of her husband's estate considerably easier.

Mrs. Galey has two children. Her daughter is now attending Reed College. Her son is in the Marine Corps.

The speaker was selected to speak to AAUW by the organization's status of women committee. The committee has been studying money management this year. Chairman of the committee is Mrs. Russell Hagg.
