Chou Gives No Hope Of Accord On Formosa

told him it was still open." Mum on Details
Chou En-lai, Mohammed Ali said, "has an answer to the question of the disposition of Chiang Kai-Shek." The Pakistani leader refused to say what was.

"I think the United States cannot throw him overboard," he added. "I told him that if I was in that position (of the United States) I would stick to my friends." He and Chou En-lai discussed the question of Russia, also, Mohammed Ali said, but declined to give details.

He did not say whether he had asked the Red Chinese Premier to release imprisoned American airmen as one means of showing sincerity for the negotiations. All intimated, however, that he had raised the question, by saying: "There is the need to eliminate suspicion on both sides, and I believe China could help by releasing the American airmen or perhaps arranging for a National-Chinese evacuation of the offshore islands."

No Rancor Toward West
At the Asian-Pacific conference, there was acceptance of a resolution condemning colonialism "in all its manifestations." It carefully avoided specifying either Western or Communist colonialism.

There was little or none of the bitter condemnation of the West had expected from the formerly subject peoples. Anti-Communist spokesmen captured the initiative at the outset of the conference with telling blasts against Red imperialism.

The resolution on nuclear weapons was sweeping. It called for an end to production, experimentation and use of nuclear and thermonuclear weapons and effective international control to carry out such a prohibition.

TOKYO—A recent Japanese visitor to Red China told today of seeing 10 or 15 captured Americans' photographs and hundreds of U.S. parachutes and airmen's uniforms at a public exhibition in Peking.

Shortly after announcing the Americans' conviction, Peking radio announced the staging of a public display of equipment it claimed was used by "American spies."

Military Phase Readied
The military phase will include placement of 3,100 yards of 55 tanks bearing 228 soldiers and at least 15 newsmen; 2,332 men in trenches at 3,500 yards; and 240 men in armored personnel carriers at 3,900 yards. Thirteen special volunteers will crouch in foxholes at 2,600 yards.

Civil defense workers, including three to five women, will take other trench positions at 3,500 yards. Graves says the frezall tomorrow will be 1,000 feet in diameter roughly three times as long as a football field.

was in a paper shopping bag and was rigged so it could be exploded electrically.
At Washington, L&N company and union representatives met four hours with the National Mediation Board but no change in the situation was reported.

Gov. Lawrence Wetherby of Kentucky asked the 13 governors of the states affected by the L&N walkout to meet in Nashville Tuesday with company and union representatives in a new effort to reach agreement.
Hoses Turned On Mob
Seven men were arrested on disorderly conduct charges at Miami, Fla., when 40 policemen and firemen broke up a noisy crowd of about 500 outside the main telephone exchange. Hoses were turned on the crowd and union leaders protested the action as unnecessary.

Six crewmen were injured in the derailment of an L&N freight train five miles south of Barboursville, Ky. Four diesel engines and 27 cars went off the rails. A company spokesman termed the incident a sabotage.

Gov. Marvin Griffin of Georgia, Hugh White of Mississippi and James Folsom of Alabama, made an unsuccessful attempt in Atlanta to settle the strike of the Communications Workers of America (CWA) against Southern Bell.

APL nonoperating unions are on strike against the L&N for a medical care insurance plan to be paid on a 50-50 basis by the company and the employees. Operating unions—men who actually run the trains—are refusing to cross picket lines of nonoperating unions.

Blast Erases Powder House, Kills Shop Boss

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP)—The Union County powder house blew up Monday in a blast that killed one man and shattered nearly all the store-front windows along Adams Street, the main street of this Eastern Oregon city 1 1/2 miles from the explosion.

The powder house, a brick building, 12 feet square, disappeared. When first investigators arrived through the settling dust, they found only a hole, 30 by 15 feet wide. It was down 15 feet at its deepest point.

H. Eugene Banton, county shop foreman, was killed. He had gone to the powder house to check over the storage of the county's dynamite. He was alone when the blast came at 9:20 a.m. Other officials said they did not know how much dynamite had been stored there.

It was felt as far away as Elgin, 20 miles to the north. A nearby farm was covered with brick dust and a man working at the county fairgrounds, a half-mile away, said the explosion knocked him flat.

The window damage along the main street alone was expected to run into thousands of dollars, but no injuries were reported.

Study Of City Budget Scheduled Tonight

THEFT PLUS INSULT
