Mrs. Roosevelt Receives Philip Murray Award

NEW YORK (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt is the recipient of the sixth annual Philip Murray award, a plaque, and \$500 for "lifetime of service in behalf of many people."

At the award presentation Mrs. Roosevelt said:

"I can only accept it as really being given largely to my husband, because I think interest in health and welfare was always one of his interests."

She indicated the money would go to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis or to a boys' school in which she is interested.

The award is made yearly in memory of the late president of the CIO.

Ulcer, Pregnancy May Delay Murder Trial's Opening

SAN ANGELO, Tex. (AP)—Harry L. Washburn, accused of killing his rich former mother-in-law who was supposed to go on trial for murder today, But a district attorney's ulcer and a girl wrestler's reported pregnancy may postpone the case.

Washburn, 38, a Houston contractor, is charged with rigging a car bomb that killed Mrs. Helen Weaver, 51, here last Jan. 19.

Officers said the dynamite bomb was intended for her husband Harry E. Weaver, 60, an architect and nonsalaried consultant for the Navy Public Works Department.

Dist. Atty. Aubrey Stokes, who leads the prosecution, collapsed and was hospitalized last night for treatment of a stomach ulcer. A doctor said Stokes "would be laid up for awhile."

Saturday, Stokes asked postponement on grounds a key state witness, Mrs. Adela Heninger, couldn't travel here from East Peoria, Ill. Mrs. Heninger, 24, wrestles professionally under the billing "Nature Girl." Stokes said he was told she is six months pregnant.

"Nature Girl" told police Washburn once approached her with an extortion plan in which Weaver would die in a phony accidental shooting. She said she turned down the deal, in which she would receive \$10,000. She called the proposition part of Washburn's plan to get \$100,000 from Mrs. Weaver.

Washburn, arrested Jan. 29, is held without bond. He denies the murder charge.

According to Weaver, he and his wife had trouble with Washburn after her daughter by a previous marriage divorced Washburn in 1950.

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Sick Leave Abuse By P. O. Workers Told In Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government investigators report that "widespread abuses" of sick leave by Post Office workers are costing the taxpayers millions of dollars a year for substitutes.

There is a general belief among postal workers, the General Accounting Office (GAO) said, that paid "sick leave must be used whenever a day off is desired."

The report, sent to the House Post Office Committee, cited abuses of sick and administrative leave in the postal service, and said adequate controls are needed to stop the practice.

Federal employees are entitled to 13 days of sick leave a year. This is cumulative. If an employee has 10 days of service, he is entitled to 130 days of sick leave, less any time out he has taken for illness.

Investigators said there was also abuse of the practice of giving employees a day off on purely state or local holidays, and hiring substitute workers in their place.

The report noted especially that Boston employees regularly get the day off for three nonfederal holidays — Patriot's Day, Bunker Hill Day and Columbus Day. New Orleans employees get a paid holiday for the Mardi Gras.

LAUGH'S ON THIEF

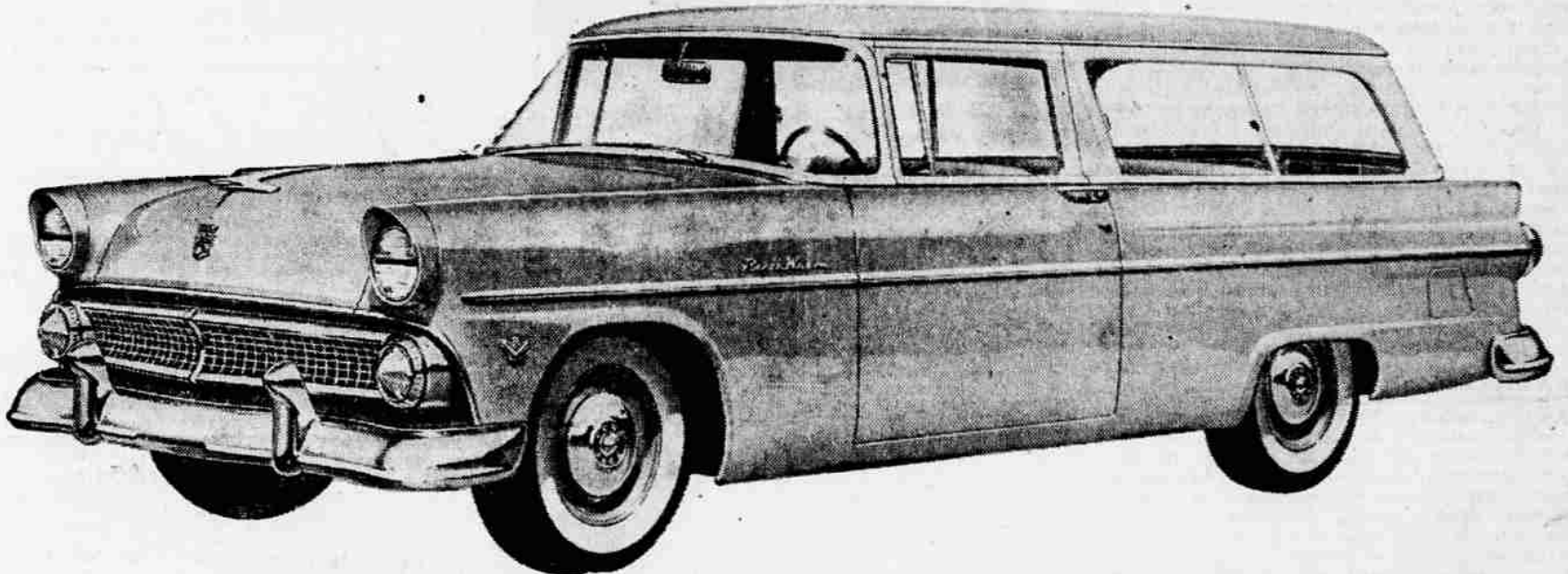

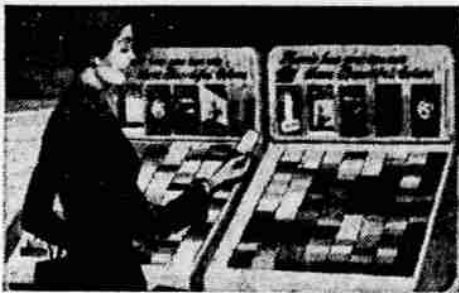

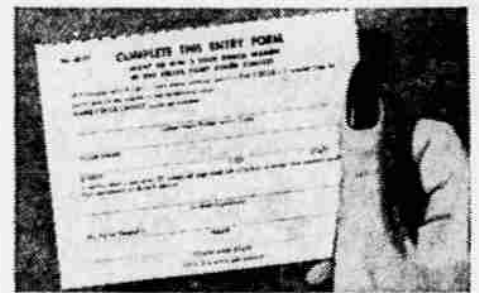
