### Angling Off Coast Must Conform To Bag Limits

SALEM (AP)—Legislation intended to make salmon anglers beyond the three-mile limit conform with state bag limits was approved by the Senate and sent to the governor.

It provides that all salmon caught by sportsmen off the coast would have to conform with the same limits that affect salmon caught in Oregon waters. About 100,000 salmon are landed in the state.

The House also completed legislative action providing for a \$1 daily nonresident salmon license.

Despite continuing bad weather, the Northern Division got in two more baseball games Tuesday with Washington State upending Washington 5-4 in 10 innings and Oregon shutting out Idaho 2-0.

Rain caused a 20-minute interruption of the game at Seattle but after the deluge the Cougars from Pullman went on to hand the Huskies their second straight defeat.

Oregon, which has had five postponements due to rain, and Idaho paid no attention to an eighth inning snow flurry as the Ducks finally got their season under way.

Oregon won the game in the fourth inning. Pete Williams bunted, was singled to third by Jimmy Johnson and scored on Neil Marlett's center field fly. Johnson stole second and came home when Idaho's Bob Falash tried to throw him out at third.

Washington State scored four runs in the top of the 10th inning of the rain-soaked game at Seattle. Ron Foise singled off starter Bill Remes, who then walked two and hit Ron Overby. Ed LaJala replaced Remes and struck out the first batter. The next two were safe on errors and three more runs came in.

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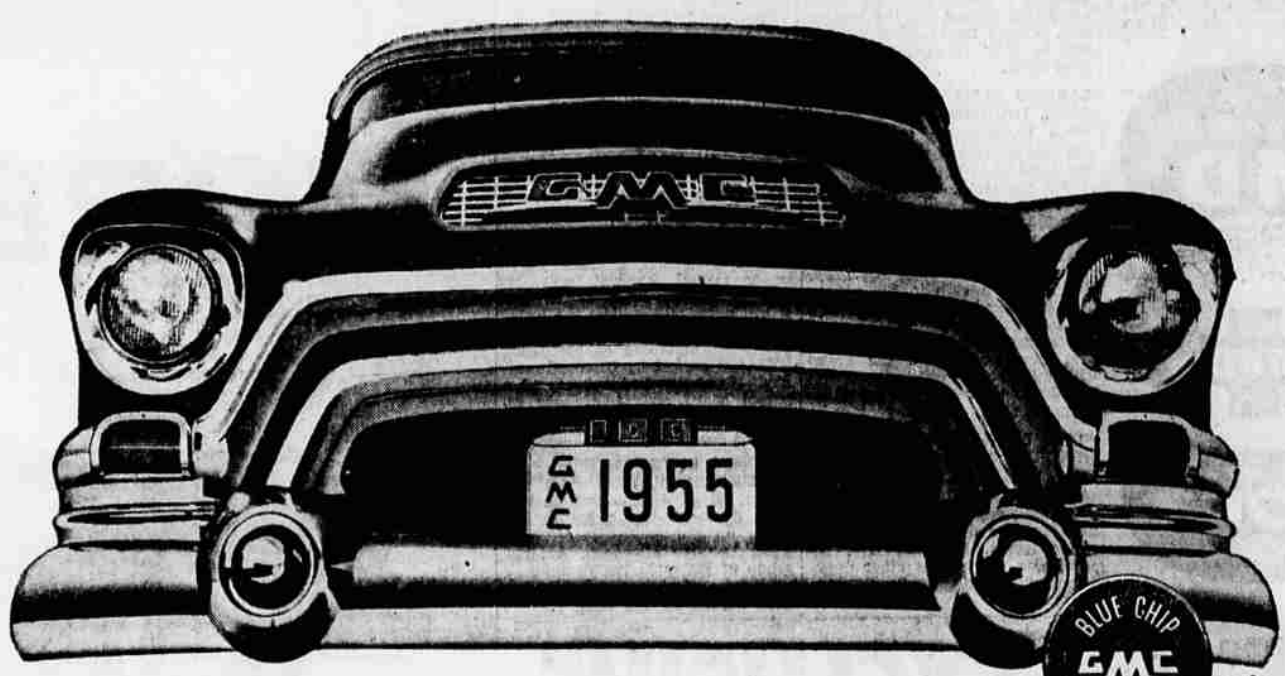
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
