Senate Gives Approval To Reclamation Projects

WASHINGTON — The Senate Tuesday passed an appropriation bill providing about \$1,400,000 for the Agriculture Department's far-flung activities in the new fiscal year beginning July 1.

The bill, as passed by the Senate, carries \$844,393,923 in new cash. A provision allowing 388 million dollars for loans plus other authorizations runs the total to about \$1,400,000,000.

The total of new cash is 11 million more than asked by the Eisenhower administration and 4 million more than the bill carried when it passed the House.

Ordnance Housing Project School Gets Bomb Threat

ORDNANCE, Ore. — A fake bomb threat, another in a series that has plagued Pacific Northwest schools recently, was received at the Ordnance housing project grade school Tuesday morning.

School officials met the situation by taking the 80 children on a field trip, then bringing them back for afternoon classes after the building had been searched without a bomb being found.

The threat was in a telephone call in which \$75 was demanded or a bomb would be set off in the furnace room. Mrs. Naomi Mohr, principal, thought the voice was that of a teen-ager. The caller said the bomb would go off later Tuesday morning.

The 60 children were crowded into a school bus that normally holds 30. They were taken to the state pleasant farm four miles away, where game conservation methods were explained.

D. W. Bliss, housing project administrator, directed the search of the school.

The school is not on land of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot.

Sailplane Pilot Makes Safe Parachute Landing

BISHOP, Calif. — A sailplane pilot parachuted to safety when his craft disintegrated as he spiraled down from a flight in the 100 mph jet stream of the Sierra Nevada.

Larry Edgar, 38, holder of the world's altitude record for gliders, said his plane came apart this week at 15,000 feet after a flight which had taken him to 39,000 feet.

Edgar landed three miles south of Bishop. He suffered only cuts and bruises.

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Faeroe Islands Trade Council Calls For Strike

THORSHAVN, Faeroe Islands — The trade union council in this Faeroe Island capital called a general strike Wednesday to support the rebellious residents of Bordo Island.

The strike complicated the dispute over removal of the Bordo Island doctor by linking the issue with the Faeroes movement for independence from Denmark. Political observers said this development threatened the entire political setup of the North Atlantic island group.

The Danish government announced in Copenhagen that it would finance minister Viggo Kampmann, an expert on Faeroe affairs, is flying here.

A delegation from Klaksvig, Bordo's chief town, met with Faeroe authorities Tuesday, but the talks ended in a deadlock when the delegation remained firm in backing Dr. E. Halvorsen as the Bordo Island doctor. Danish authorities had fired him two years ago. The islanders defied the order and have been using force to prevent his removal.

Copenhagen authorities, worried by the tense situation, ordered the Faero government to resume the talks Wednesday. Prospects of a settlement appeared slim. Some authorities voiced suspicion the Bordo representatives had come to Thorshavn to play for time so the 3,000 people in Klaksvig could prepare their defenses against any attempt to use force against them.

Dulles Opposes Limitation Of Treaty Making

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles said here he is still opposed to the Bricker amendment to limit the treaty making power.

Dulles also told a news conference he had fully expected until Monday to testify this week before the Senate judiciary subcommittee conducting hearings on the constitutional amendment proposed by Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio).

He was advised Monday, Dulles said, that the Eisenhower administration considered it undesirable for any Cabinet officer to testify until all were ready, and all of them were not yet prepared.

Dulles replied no when asked whether his views on the Bricker amendment had changed since he testified last year in opposition to a similar proposal. He noted that the amendment now proposed by Bricker is somewhat altered in form but said it is in his opinion, substantially the same.

Suburbs Must Supply Blood For Transfusions

SAN FRANCISCO — Suburban and small city hospitals must prepare to supply most of the blood transfusions for refugees from bombed cities, Vice Adm. Ross T. McIntire (ret.) says.

McIntire, once personal physician to the late President Roosevelt, told the Assn. of Western Hospitals convention that civil defense planning is inadequate. Congress hasn't appropriated adequate money, he said.

Of plans to evacuate populations of cities like San Francisco and Los Angeles, McIntire said, "We aren't going to be able to do these things."

Wilson's Cane Brings \$625 Top At Demo Auction

WASHINGTON — President Woodrow Wilson's gold-headed cane brought the top price of \$625 in a Democratic "White Donkey" auction Tuesday night.

The sale netted several thousand dollars—the exact total wasn't tabulated immediately—for the Woman's National Democratic Club, which obviously didn't want to stage a "white elephant" sale. The idea was the same.

Wilson's cane, donated by his widow, was bought by Courtland J. Silver of St. Paul, Minn., who presented it to Mrs. Leslie Biddle, wife of the former secretary of the Senate. Mrs. Biddle still limps from an auto accident two years ago.

Silver had to do some spirited bidding against Stanley Woodward, former ambassador to Canada, and a group of men who had pooled funds hoping to bid in the walking stick as a gift for former President Truman.

Donations to the auction ranged from an autographed lithograph of Adlai Stevenson to a receipt for a real white baby donkey to be shipped postpaid from Eagle Pass, Tex. The Stevenson picture brought \$15; the donkey \$75.

Senate Confirmation Given Admiral Mumma

WASHINGTON — The Senate confirmed Tuesday President Eisenhower's nomination of Rear Adm. Albert G. Mumma as chief of the Navy's Bureau of Ships for a 4-year term.

Mumma's previous assignment was commander of the Mare Island shipyard in California. He is an expert on atomic weapons and atomic propulsion of ships.

He succeeds Rear Adm. Wilson D. Leggett Jr., as chief of the Bureau of Ships. Leggett's retirement was announced recently.

Oppenheimer Gets Ovation From OSC Audience Of 3,000

CORVALLIS — Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, making his third talk in Oregon and first here as Condon Lecturer, drew an ovation Tuesday night from an attentive audience of 3,000.

There was considerable question whether many non-scientists understood him as he spoke of the composition of matter. But a large number of those present were observed taking notes, there was a rousing ovation for him when he finished, and he was surrounded for a half hour afterward by questioners.

Wilson Asserts Some Criticisms Involve Trifles

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Wilson said some criticisms leveled at the Pentagon by the Hoover Commission involve "tremendous trifles."

Wilson and several other Defense Department officials Tuesday disputed some findings in a commission report, released Sunday, on the buying and handling of food and clothing by the military.

Thomas Pike, assistant secretary for supply and logistics, said some of the commission's specific allegations of waste were "old, not factual or misleading."

A commission statement that the Navy has a 60-year supply of canned hamburger was challenged by Secretary of the Navy Thomas. He said the hamburger available for issue will be eaten within four years and that the rest is stockpiled for use in a war emergency.

The secretaries discussed the report at a news conference.

His lecture, originally scheduled for an Oregon State College hall seating 750, was moved to Gill Coliseum when it became apparent from the size of audiences greeting him at the University of Oregon last week that interest in the nuclear physicist is high.
