

Umpqua River System Poor For Trout Debut

The Umpqua River System joins with much of the rest of the state Saturday for the beginning of trout fishing season.

It is scheduled to run from April 30 to Oct. 9 on the entire system except for Diamond Lake and Loon Lake.

About 47,000 trout have been released into the streams and lakes of the Umpqua in the past month. More, totaling about 60,000, will be released after the first of the month. Some are reported to be smaller than legal sized.

Legal sized trout are six inches above the forks and in tributaries through Elk Creek at Elkton. The limit on the main river and tributaries from the forks on down river is eight inches.

Game Commission Biologist Bill Piney reports that conditions are still poor. The North Umpqua is still high and cold, but is considerably clearer than it has been. The South Umpqua is muddy.

Spring chinook season ends its second week with most of the success, limited though it is, being

enjoyed at Winchester. A few fish have been reported from there and one at Cleveland Rapids during the past week. Nothing has been heard from the forks.

Roseburg won the varsity meet 65-55 by overtaking the visitors in the relay. Cottage Grove held on to a slim team lead in winning the relay and the jayvee meet 65-2-3 to 56-1-3.

John Carson and Bill Poole, the day's top stars for Roseburg, saved the varsity meet. The two more than made up a 15-yard deficit on the second and third legs of the relay, and Ronnie Lowe held on to win.

The lanky Carson won the high hurdles in 16.1 while Poole took both dash events in good times, considering the track conditions. Each team swept one varsity event. The Indians took all three places in the mile although state champion Mark Robbins turned in

PHOTO TIPS

Regardless of experience, any photographer desirous of self-improvement can gain a vast knowledge of light and shadow — the very essence of photography — and find enjoyment, as well, by making still life pictures.

Working with inanimate objects, he can study the effects of light and subject position at leisure, making changes and noting results without the urgency presented by living, animate subject matter. In time, a mastery of light will be gained that will be of material benefit in making superior pictures in all other lines of photography.

To those unfamiliar with the term a still life is composed of static items, usually small enough to be arranged on a table. Common objects are almost always used such as dishes, fruit, or books; the beauty of such pictures relying not on the physical appearance of the objects, but, rather, on their arrangement and the interesting play of light and shadow.

Lighting equipment for still life need not be elaborate: one or two inexpensive baby spotlights and a photoflood are sufficient. One of the spots can be used as a key light, placing it in a position that produces interesting shadows. The flood can be used at the camera to lighten and give details to the shadows, and another spot can be used to accent the edges of objects for separation.

In addition to opening the way for making still life pictures, the described lamps are invaluable in other fields where it is desired to see lighting results before the picture is made. Why not come in and see how a set can be yours at low cost?

A 533 score earned for Wendel Simpson the top gun award at Thursday night's pistol shoot of the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club.

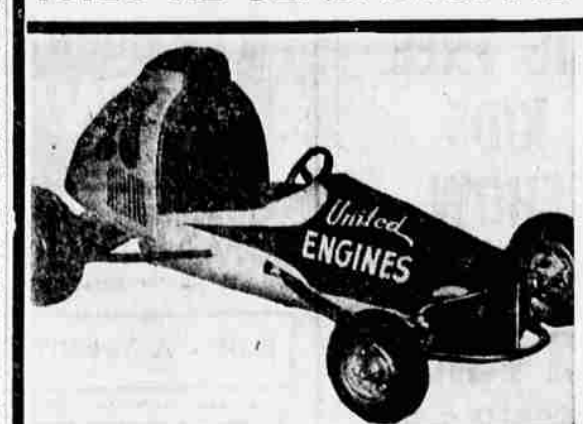
Placing behind Simpson were Menno Miller 501, Sidney Comfort 499, Berl Oar 498 and Robert White 496.
