Racing officials expect to continue the practice of Sunday racing when the season reopens next fall. Hardtop auto racing is slated to begin in May.

Eaton Wins
Jay Eaton has more than clinched the micromidget driving title for the first season of racing in Roseburg after adding to his season-long lead with a 44-point performance at last weekend's races.
