Attorney For Boy Asks Trial Delay

SPOKANE (AP) — The attorney for 16-year-old Richard Petersen of Pasco, accused of first degree murder for an April 1 shooting spree, said Thursday he will "strongly resist" a speedy trial.

Edward W. Robertson of Spokane said he is against a fast trial because of "the gravity of the charges".

Roger Olson, Franklin County prosecutor, said in Pasco Wednesday he will ask the court to call a special jury to try the Petersen case before the fall term of court.

Young Petersen is to be arraigned next Tuesday for first degree murder in the death of Alva Jackson, a Pasco police officer. He will also be arraigned on second degree murder for the death of his father, P. H. Petersen, and second degree assault for the wounding of his grandfather, Chester Young.

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Investigation Underway Of Idaho Polio Deaths

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — A U. S. public health specialist was reported as soon as there is anything to report, Budge was told.

The State Health Department said the epidemiologist would investigate the cases of Susan Pierce, 7, who died Wednesday, and James P. Shipley Jr., 6. It says both "obviously" had been exposed to polio before receiving the shots, but had not developed symptoms of the disease, which has an incubation period of 10 to 14 days.

In Washington, Rep. Budge (R-Idaho) identified the specialist who would make the Pocatello investigation as Dr. Gerald Laveck, who conducted gamma globulin evaluation studies in Idaho and other Northwest states in 1952. The findings will be made public with a gun after an argument with his parents, killing Jackson who tried to disarm him and fatally wounding his father. The grandfather is recovering.



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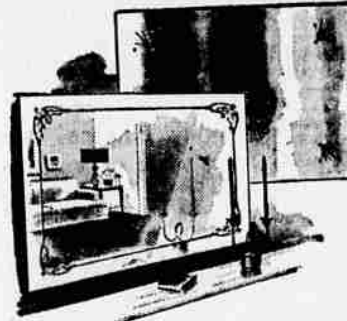
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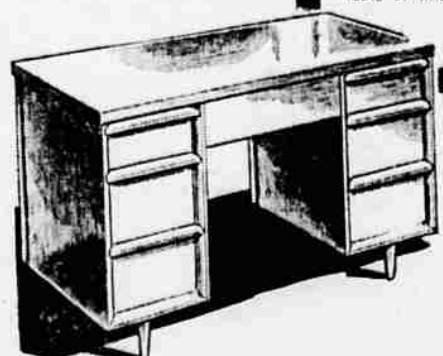
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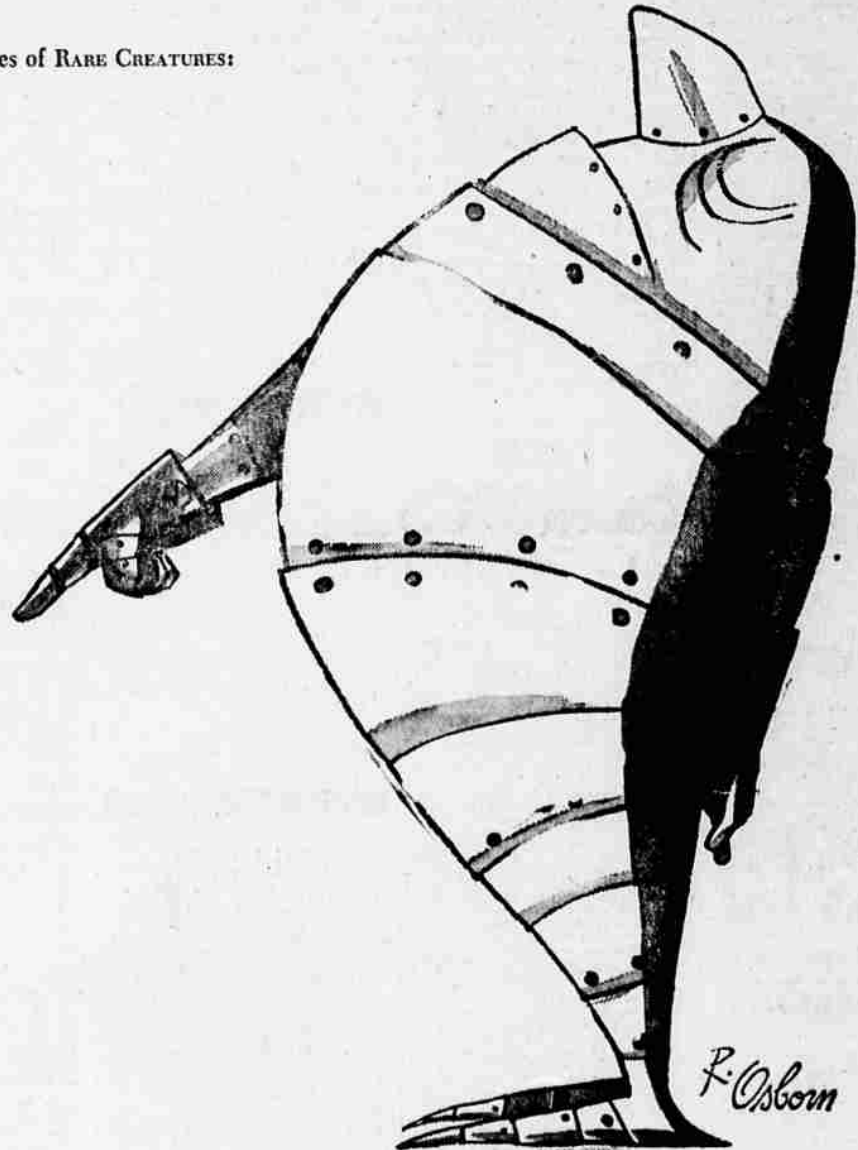
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
