

City Council Hearings Set On Budget, Setbacks

from the east line of Corey Avenue to the west bank of the South Umpqua River.

Plans and specifications prepared by City Engineer Kenneth Meng for improvement to Ball and Harrison streets were accepted, and public hearing was set for June 6, at the next regular council meeting of next month.

Estimated total cost of the Ball work is \$22,242.90, of which \$21,258.10 is to be assessment. The work calls for paving 24 feet wide and 4 1/2-foot sidewalks.

Estimated cost of the Harrison work is \$23,546.88, of which \$22,032.27 would be assessment. The project cost includes a 39-foot street and 4-foot walks.

The Ball Street project would run from Harvard Avenue to the north line of Neill Avenue. The Harrison Street project would run from the north line of Harvard to a point 450 feet north of Yale Avenue.

The council received a petition urging improvement to Hamilton Street. It was signed by 41 persons, representing 69 per cent of the property owners involved.

Big Damage Suit Names Insurance Adjuster Here

Two suits totalling \$101,000 have been filed against a Roseburg insurance claims adjuster by a man and wife who allege their reputations were injured.

The suits are by Ross Clinton Carl and Leo Carl, with each seeking \$50,000 general and \$500 special damages from Charles A. Thomas, circuit court records show.

Both plaintiffs allege the defendant falsely and maliciously brought about their arrest for the crime of "burning with intent to injure an insurer."

Ross Carl was acquitted in a jury trial (March 8-11, 1954) which followed his arrest on the arson charge. A similar charge against Mrs. Carl was later dismissed on motion of the district attorney on grounds there was insufficient evidence to obtain a conviction.

The charges came after the house the Carls were renting about a mile west of Canyonville burned on Jan. 9, 1954. The state alleged some items listed on an insurance claim were not actually in the house at the time it burned.

Insurance of \$2,500 was carried on the personal property. The Carls denied the charge from the outset. Thomas testified for the state in the case. He had handled inventories of loss made out by the Carls.

CHARGE DISMISSED

An alleged arson charge filed against William McSperritt, Winston, has been dismissed from district court, according to Judge Warren A. Woodruff. The complaint against McSperritt alleged he and another youth beat a boy by the name of Harry Nichols.

MAN RETURNED

Manhunt At End; 1 Dead; 2 Injured

CANTON, N.Y. (AP)—A manhunt through northern New York wilderness has ended where it began—in St. Lawrence County Jail, from which four men fled Wednesday.

Freshly shaven and clothed, Patrick Brooks, 26, of Gabriels, walked quietly into the main jail office at 9:06 Monday night. A friend drove him from the swampy woodland where he had been hunted since Friday. Two children rode with them.

The final score stood: one desperado dead, one wounded and two in custody. A state trooper was recovering from his wounds.

Leon Caskinette, 24, was taken after a gun battle Friday. Frank Ialarico, 44, Utica, and Ralph LaShomb, 29, were shot when troopers found them yesterday morning. Ialarico was killed.

More than 200 state police, sheriff's deputies and volunteers took part in the manhunt in rough country near the Canadian border.

'Dry-Run' Adult Swimming Class Off To Good Start

The "dry run" adult swimming course now being offered by the Douglas County Chapter, American Red Cross, got off to an enthusiastic start Monday evening.

Twelve men and women, ages 20 through the mid-40s showed up at RC offices in the Roseburg Armory to learn about swimming.

Class members were welcomed by county water safety chairman Leon Mulkey. Instruction was given by Mrs. Gertrude Sherlock.

A black and white sound film "Learning How To Swim" preceded a lesson in practice breathing. Persons attending the special class had been asked to bring a wash basin and towel. They put both to use Monday evening.

Mrs. Sherlock explained the principle of breath-holding in water and then asked the adults to practice by placing their faces in the water-filled basins.

Mrs. Sherlock said Tuesday the class was coming along fine. It will be held Monday evenings at 7:30 in the RC office, Roseburg.

Last Of Building Program Gets Legislators Okay

Legislators approved the last bill in a program for higher education and state institutions.

The last bill was approved by the Senate Monday afternoon and sent to the governor.

It appropriates \$9,810,563 for state institutions. The bill includes \$6,330,000 to begin construction of the proposed mental hospital in the Portland area, and \$1,176,563 for the proposed reformatory north of Salem.

The Senate also completed action on the biggest appropriation bill. It will give \$32,429,687 for higher education.

A pilot program for state meat inspection was passed 27-3 by the Senate after it heard unexpected stories about the kind of meat that comes from some uninspected plants. It goes to the governor.

Deaths Don't Stop Idaho's Demand For Polio Vaccine

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—Three north Idaho counties plan to give second shots of Salk polio vaccine by May 16 and there have been no cancellations among 2,200 children who got the first one, C. F. Bain said Monday.

"In fact, it's been the other way around," said Bain, acting director of the Panhandle Health Unit. "We ordered vaccine on the basis of signed requests by parents. Later about 100 more parents asked that their children be given the shots," he said.

He said one mother threatened to wire Gov. Smylie to demand that her child be given the shots along with the other children.

Bain said there have been no reported reactions among the 2,200 children who got the first free shot. The second shots will be given as soon as the serum arrives.

Ten Idaho children have contracted polio after being vaccinated. Two have died. The Cutter vaccine has been withdrawn for further study.

After Bain's statement on the second shots, however, the director of the Idaho State Health Department said the program would not be resumed until the state has been assured in writing by the National Institute of Health and the laboratory that the vaccine is safe.

Sign-Up Starts For Camp Tye Session Of Girls

Registration for summer session at Camp Tye got underway Monday. The camp is owned and operated by the Roseburg Camp Fire Council. This will be the eighth year it has been open.

Members are requested to register during May as registration will be opened to non-members June 1.

The honor of being first to register went to nine Camas Valley girls. They "jumped the gun" and enrolled for camp last week. They are Mary White, Phyllis Schmidt, LeAnn Dancy, Sherri Moody, Wynne Moore, Judy Milton, Myrna Pasco, Susan White and Betty Spencer.

Registration will continue until camp quota is full. Seventy girls may be accommodated each week. Five sessions are planned. Camping starts July 10 and ends August 14.

The first two sessions, July 10-17 and July 17-24, are for girls in the fifth grade or older. The third period, July 24-31, is for girls age 7 to 17. Second, third and fourth graders only are slated for the fourth and fifth sessions, July 31-August 7 and August 7-14.

Health Inspection Free

Camp Chairman Irv Reiersen predicted an early registration. He said the necessary health inspection would be given free at the Douglas County Health Office only if it is taken at the specified time. That time will be given campers at the time of registration.

The inspection may be given by a family doctor, he added, but said it must be done within three days of attending camp. The card on the inspection has to be returned to the Camp Fire Office in the Masonic Bldg., Roseburg, before noon of the Saturday preceding the session of the camper is attending.

Reiersen said it is recommended that campers have the three typhoid shots, or a "booster." If they wish, parents may sign the release included on the medical card. Instead, he said, Typhoid and booster shots are given at the county health office on Monday. There is a slight cost.

The camp sessions are open to both Camp Fire and Blue Bird members and girls who do not belong to the council. Fees are \$15 a session. An additional dollar is charged non-members. Fees must be paid before camp, Reiersen stressed.

Complete information may be secured at the Camp Fire Office or by calling Mrs. Amundson at OR 3-8277. Camp Tye is 26 miles north of Roseburg. It is situated along the Umpqua River.

Officers Intensify Search For Missing Couple

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Law enforcement officers intensified their search today for Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ferri but they said there was little hope that the well-to-do couple would be found alive.

The couple were classified as "missing persons." Although the condition of the seven-room home from which they disappeared Friday night pointed to murder, blood spots led from the front room to a bedroom and then to a carport. Human blood was on a pair of Ferri's slippers near the driveway.

A theory that Ferri, 68-year-old retired plumber and pipe fitter, was the victim of a gangland slaying lost significance as officers delved into the couple's background.

WASHINGTON (AP)—One Senate- House bill said Tuesday a tentative agreement had been reached on a salary boost averaging 8 1/2 per cent.

This would be close to the 8.3 average increase voted by the House. The Senate passed a bill calling for a flat 10 per cent raise except that every postal employee would get at least \$400 annually.
