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AFL Teamsters Union Strike Said Possible

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An official of the AFL Teamsters Union says that a strike by Western truck drivers "certainly is not out of the picture."

But Frank Brewster of Seattle, president of the Western Conference of Teamsters, said Tuesday that he didn't think the long-haul drivers would strike this week. The strike, if called, would affect an estimated 30,000 truck drivers in California and possibly 80,000 to 100,000 in 11 states west of the Rockies, an official said. "We are still hoping that we can negotiate a contract," said Brewster, who was here for discussions with 30 representatives of teamster locals. Long hauling contract expired Sunday and local drivers are expiring this month. A spokesman for the union is seeking pay raises of 20 to 30 cents an hour over the prevailing rate of \$2.14 an hour for line drivers.

OLDTIMER DIES

PENDLETON (AP) — George A. Ferguson, 75, longtime automobile dealer and one of the leading figures in the posse which tracked down Sheriff Til Taylor's killer 35 years ago, was buried here Monday. Ferguson suffered a heart attack April 20 and died last week. A native of Umatilla County, he was an automobile salesman in the 1920s and at different times had his own agency. The posse of which he was a part started when Taylor was shot down in a jail break here July 26, 1920. Three men were hanged for their parts in it.

Telephone Conversations Land Man In Jail

TACOMA (AP) — An ex-Tacoma policeman, who telephoned several women here and asked them personal questions "to help disprove the Kinsey report," was sentenced to six months in jail, suspended, by Superior Judge W. A. Richmond Tuesday.

David C. Campbell, 37, told the court he had an irresistible urge to talk with women over the telephone about their private affairs. He pleaded guilty to a vagrancy charge.

The telephone calls lasted several months. Campbell finally was caught when he went to the home of one of his victims where police were waiting.

BATTERED TO DEATH

PORTLAND (AP) — John Hall Goodwin, 47, a county road employee, was found battered to death Wednesday at his rooming house. Police, who said he had apparently been killed by kicks, rounded up as witnesses people who had been present at a drinking party.

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
