Solomon Tied For Gun Title

RENO — Forrest Solomon, Winchester, Ore., and Earl Colson, Toppenish, Wash., met Friday to decide their tie for the Class A singles championship in the Golden West Grand American Trapshoot.

Each has a two-day score of 198x200. R. C. McGinnis, Lathrop, Mo., shot 197 and Carl Flock, Miami, Florida State champion, 196.

Flock scored 97 from 22 yards Thursday to win the 100 - target Washoe Handicap in a field of 250 gunners. Runnerup was Ralph Hennes, Bellingham, Wash., with a 96, and Harold Zurick, La-Grande, Ore., was third with 95.



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Sub-District Track Tourney Saturday To Draw List of States' Top Athletes

Subdistrict four track champions and district qualifiers will be determined at Finlay Field all day Saturday when trackmen from Douglas and Coos counties assault the record books.

The annual meet will get underway at 10:30 a.m. with 11 class A schools and five class B's entered.

Roseburg Favored

Roseburg, the Douglas County A titlist and third-place finisher in the subdistrict last year, is favored to take the subdistrict team prize away from Marshfield's defending champion Pirates. The Pirates and North Bend are expected to fight it out for second place. Marshfield is the Coos titlist after a slim margin victory over North Bend in last weekend's meet.

The B meet will again be entered only by Douglas County schools with Yoncalla heavily favored to add the subdistrict B title to its county winnings. The Eagles are defending subdistrict champs.

Interest is expected to be widespread Saturday over all 14 class A events. Usually close and heated rivalry for first place among a select few standouts from the two counties marks each event. Few darkhorses or underdogs are given a chance to nail blue ribbons in view of past performances.

Rank With Best

Top marks rank with the best in the state in many events. Comparative performances off last week's county meets give Roseburg seven clear-cut firsts and a tie for another. North Bend three firsts, Marshfield one first

and a tie for another, Coquille and Myrtle Point each one first. Roseburg's all-around balance gives the Indians equalizers against North Bend's field - event strength and Marshfield's strong running game.

Yoncalla has too much first-place strength for the rest of the B field which will probably number Canyonville, Days Creek and Riddle in its turnout. The Eagles figure to again be paced by brothers Phil and John Blomquist while Days Creek can argue with weight man Bobby Babbs.

Other A school entries include Douglas, Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek, Glendale and Drain from Douglas County and Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle Point from Coos points.

The trophy will be awarded to the winning team following the one hour or best of three falls engagement to signify the champions.

The one hour semifinal pits popular Gino Nicolini against the equally popular Jerry Woods. Nicolini defeated Jack Kiser here last week while Woods was losing to Mr. Sakata and his sleeper hold.

The two contestants are about equal in experience and speed and a fast, scientific match is expected.
