'Eagle' Turns Out To Be Merely A Great Horned Owl

SPOKANE — A man named Robins reported this week that the big "eagle" shot near Mount Spokane recently was really a great horned owl.

Edward Robins, state game protector here, made his report to bird-conscious sheriff's deputies who cut down a 100-foot tree Wednesday to get it. The bird was shot and killed Tuesday by a State Patrol officer but it lodged high up in a snag and was left overnight.

The sheriff's office has had somewhat of a bird detail ever since a 14-year-old boy reported last week he was attacked, scratched knocked down and dazed by a big eagle on his farm north of here.

Warren Pat McKernan said the eagle swooped down on the family dog and that he was attacked when he entered the battle. Another boy reported a similar incident over the weekend.

The bird was killed by officer Elmo Denney. The tree was then cut down to get the bird.

The tree fell with a bang and the officers found two crushed bird eggs along with the winged victims. They brought the remains in to Robins. They said first they thought it was a golden eagle.

He examined the evidence and said it was definitely a horned owl, the only one not protected by state game laws. The owl had a wing spread of about four feet. Denney's single shot from long range that killed the bird was a really feather in the cap for his marksmanship but Robins' identification leaves the Wanapum Indians with bonnets still frayed and tattered.

Program To Rehabilitate Men And Forests Slated

VANCOUVER, Wash. — A long range program to rehabilitate men and forest will start this summer in southwestern Washington.

A camp for 65 convicts is to be established in the Yacolt burn, the site of a huge forest fire in Clark and Skamania counties. The convicts to be placed in the camp will be those considered minimum security cases.

District forester Ralph Beswick said the program will continue over an 11-year period. The convicts will clear roads, cut fire breaks and eventually replant the state land involved. Private land will be included in all parts of the program but replanting, Beswick said.

Oregon has a similar program in the Tillamook burn.

The Army Corps of Engineers had estimated \$14,800 on the job. Nine other bids ranged as high as \$24,500.

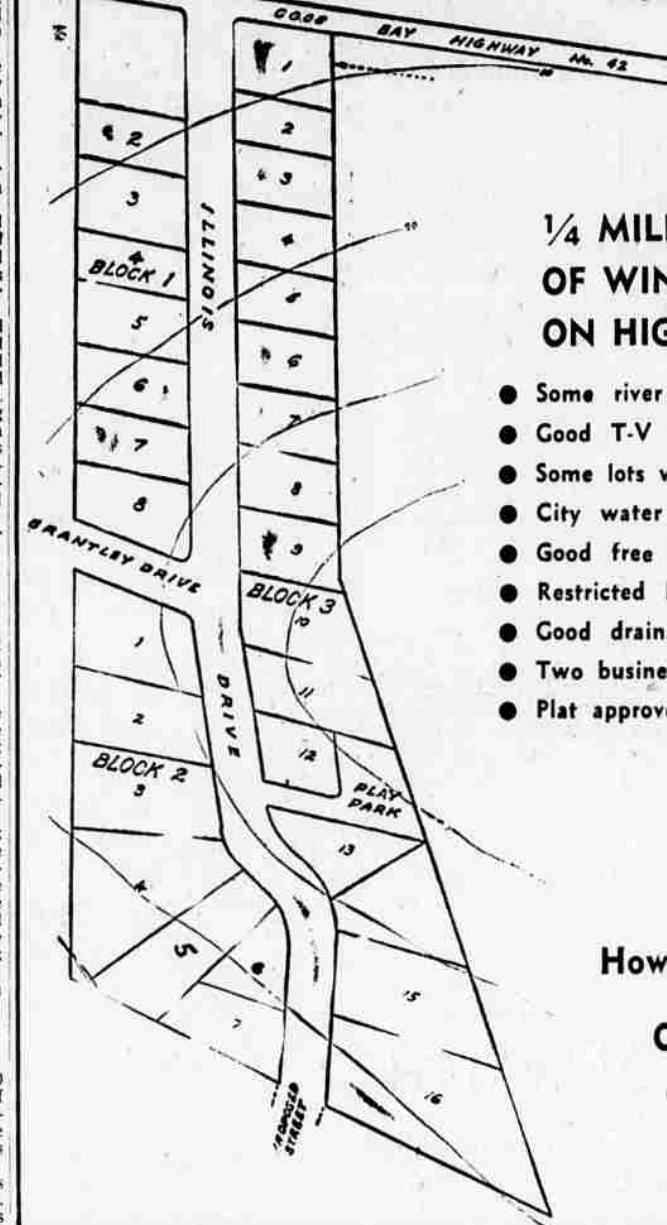
of the remnant Wanapums, put in a request for the eagle feathers Wednesday after hearing reports of the shooting.

needed for ceremonial purposes. The Wanapums, whose ancestors refused to sign a peace treaty with the United States, live between the sensitive Hanford atomic works and the Army's Yakima Firing Center.

A deputy sheriff shot a bird in the Mount Spokane area earlier in a hunt for the eagle. It turned out to be a buzzard with a five-foot wing span. There was no word on whether the officers would look any more.
