 Chet Chet Johnson, the Sacramento mound clown, whipped up a 6-hitter Friday night to hand the Seattle Rainiers, current front-runners in the Pacific Coast League pennant chase, a 2-1 defeat.

But the loss didn't cause the Rainiers to lose ground as second-place Los Angeles dropped a 5-3 decision to Oakland's Oaks.

The Portland Beavers lost a 4-1 contest to the San Diego Padres and the Hollywood Stars, on the upswing after a dismal start, beat back San Francisco, 3-1.

Sacramento downed the Rainiers with two runs in the fourth inning when Pete Milne doubled to drive in Nippy Jones and Nanny Fernandez.

The Rainiers threatened in the ninth when Bill Brenner tapped a pinch-hit double and moved up on a sacrifice fly. Two groundouts left him stranded on third.

Earl Rapp's three-for-three hitting, including an eighth-inning homer, helped San Diego take the Beavers. The Padres started off with a two-run first inning. Don Eggert clouted a home run in the second, for Portland but Rapp showed his power in the third by singling Milt Smith to third base.

Smith came in on Ed Kaska's long foul fly. In the eighth Rapp pounded the ball 360 feet over the right field wall to give San Diego its final run.

 Hollywood made it three straight over San Francisco. The Stars thrashed twice in the fourth, Jim Walsh, at second on a single and a wild pitch, came in on Bob Prescott's double. Prescott went to third on a grounder and scored on Bill Hall's single. Alfred Klein, state athletic commissioner, told reporters there was something "definitely mysterious" about what happened to Johnson. The doctors believe he may have been drugged. We will conduct a thorough investigation," he announced.

Is That So!

The letters I get about snakes seem to be in the majority. So, again, for a set of Facts vs. Fallacies about snakes.

FALLACY: A snake can inflict pain and sting with its forked tongue.

Fact: The forked flicking tongue is soft and incapable of inflicting any injury. It is a highly developed sense organ used principally in touching and as an aid in smelling. That is why, as the snake goes about, it darts its tongue in and out continuously, particularly when its suspicion has been aroused.

FALLACY: A rattlesnake's age can be told by the number of its rattles.

Fact: This belief stems from the assumption that the rattler sheds its skin once a year and in doing so adds a rattle.

However, the rattlesnake does not shed its skin once a year. It sheds its skin depending upon the amount of food it eats. It may shed its skin at all, or it may shed it several times, two or three in fact comes closer to being the average. And although a rattle is usually added with each shedding, old ones frequently break off. A large snake may not have more than one or two—or, if it has not shed any, may have three times as many as its years might seem to indicate.

FALLACY: A rattlesnake always rattles before it strikes.

Fact: Of about 2,400 kinds of snakes only about 200 are dangerously poisonous to man. In most areas, excluding Australia, the number of poisonous snakes is a very small percentage of the total snake population. In Australia, the majority are venomous.

FALLACY: All venomous snakes have large, triangular-shaped heads and an elliptical pupil.

Fact: Although most pit vipers and vipers do have a large, triangular-shaped head and most have elliptical pupils the same is true of some non-venomous snakes. Besides, the head of the cobra and the coral snake is quite slender. And their pupils are round.

FALLACY: All poisonous snakes either bite or strike a victim.

Fact: No, so. There are some spitting cobras, mostly found in Africa, which can aim deliberately and usually for the eyes of its victim. They sometimes eject their venom as far as ten or twelve feet with surprising accuracy. If the venom gets into the eyes it causes intense pain and if not washed out, temporary or permanent blindness may result.
