Another 500 Employees Idled At Coos Bay

COOS BAY — Another 500 workers were idle Monday as a result of a strike against the Coos Bay Lumber Co.

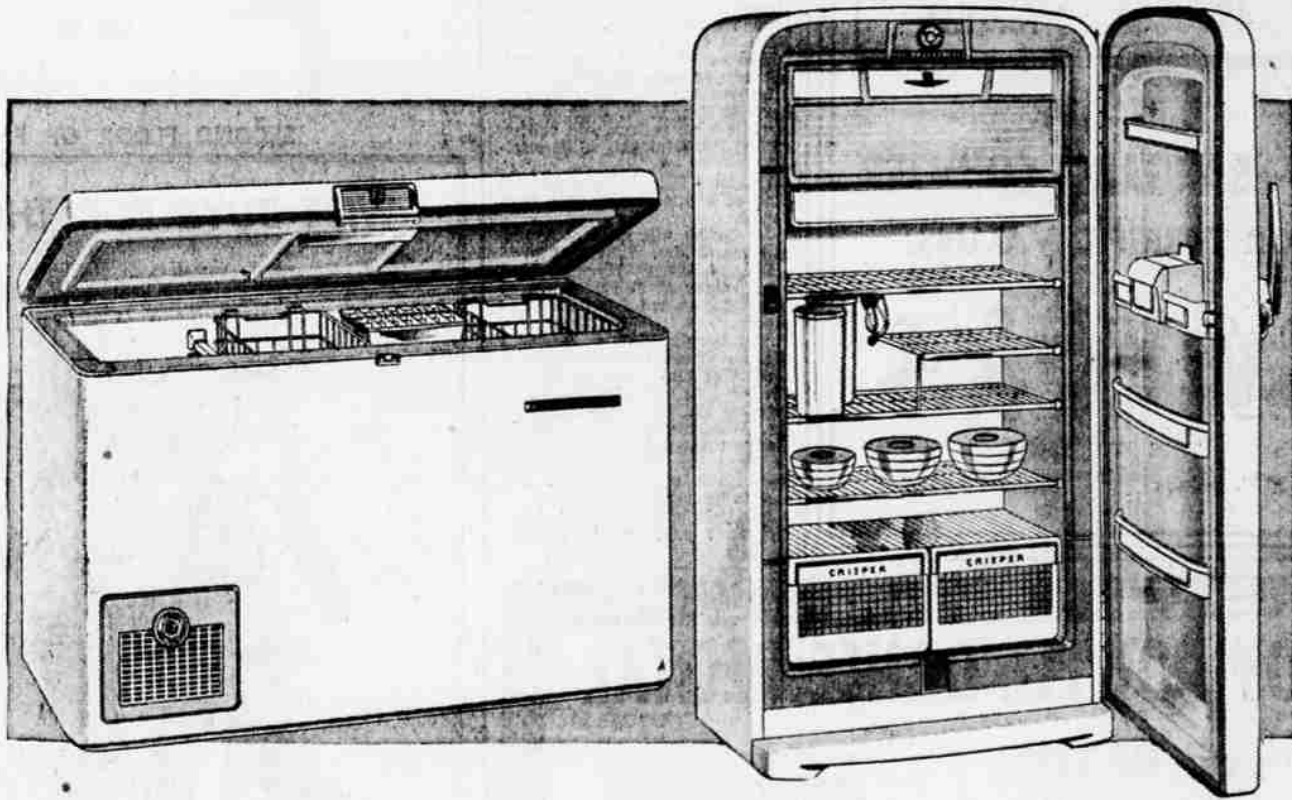
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
