 Bob Lemon finally is catching up with the New York Yankees. They're the only outfit that has an edge on the big Cleveland right-hander.

Lemon, 34, has had six seasons of 20 or more victories since switching from third base in 1946. But he's only 22-24 lifetime against the Bombers.

He has split even in two tries against New York this season. He beat the Yanks 9-6 last night with the help of Don Mossi. They're still giving him trouble, but he's at last edging up and is 9-6 against them the past two seasons.

His victory last night was his sixth of the season, against that lone defeat by the Yanks last week, and it tumbled New York into third, three games behind pace - setting Cleveland. Chicago took over second by defeating Boston 4-2.

Washington moved into fifth, knocking off Detroit 7-4, while Baltimore was living it up 11-1 over Kansas City.

It was the same old story with a new twist in the National. Brooklyn won another, but Don Newcombe tossed himself a one-hitter in beating the Chicago Cubs.

Fighter Doped, Says Physician

PHILADELPHIA (U)—A State Athletic Commission doctor reported yesterday Harold Johnson was drugged before his nationally televised fight last Friday. Gov. George M. Leader promptly suspended all professional boxing in the state for 90 days, except for bouts already arranged.

Dr. Alfred S. Ayella Jr., commission physician, reported a barbiturate caused Johnson to collapse after two rounds of his heavyweight match with Julio Mendez at the arena.

Ayella said other possible causes of Johnson's collapse were ruled out in the four days of tests. Leader termed the whole affair "shocking" and said the report "leaves no doubt that Johnson was drugged and... further that knowledge of Johnson's condition was available to his handlers prior to his entry into the ring."

Leader said the Commission is looking into all the circumstances surrounding the affair. Police reported that Johnson was a 4-1 favorite the day before the fight but at ringtime the odds had dropped to 2-1.

Meanwhile, Johnson was still confined to his hospital room at Hahnemann Hospital under 24-hour police guard.

A police source said Philadelphia authorities were inclined to discount Johnson's postfight story that an orange given him by a stranger was the cause of the trouble. Johnson said the stranger gave him the orange after the weigh-in ceremonies and he didn't eat it until shortly before fight time.

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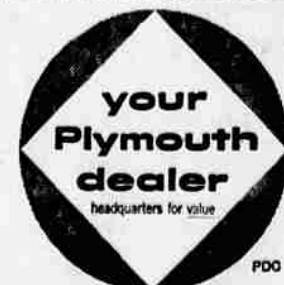
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
