### New Government To Have Election

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Premier Ngo Dinh Diem Tuesday night announced formation of a new government with the immediate goal of calling free South Viet Nam's first general elections.

Diem said in forming his new cabinet, he had followed the wishes of two national congresses which met last week. But his announcement made no mention of the future of chief of state Bao Dai.

Sponsors of one of the congresses, the National Revolutionary Committee, have been increasing their pressure on the premier to depose the absentee chief of state Diem reportedly wants to leave Bao Dai's fate to the National Assembly for which his government is pledged to arrange elections.

To his new 14-man cabinet the premier named seven men from South Viet Nam, three from his native Central Viet Nam and four refugees from the Communist-held north. Four former ministers were included. Five political parties or groups were represented.

Diem continues to hold the post of defense minister, as well as the premiership.

The last rebel stronghold in Saigon fell to the government when 21 Binh Xuyen soldiers fled their posts in an abandoned dance hall early Tuesday.

### Conchies Eating Food Treated With Radiation

DENVER (AP) — Nine conscientious objectors are eating food treated with atomic radiation so American soldiers of the future may not have to battle the traditional tin can.

At Fitzsimons Army Hospital here they are experimenting to see how much nutrition is retained in food when it is preserved with radiation instead of stored in cans.

Maj. Gen. M. E. Griffin, Fitzsimons commandant, joined the nine volunteers in their first such meal Monday with Lt. Col. Carl J. Koehn, head of the medical nutritional laboratory.

A hospital spokesman said there is no danger in eating the foods. "The only significant change observed in the irradiated foods (in experiments on animals)," he said, "was a minimum loss of vitamin content which is similar to the slight loss of vitamins in heat-canned foods."

In Washington, Maj. Gen. K. F. Hertford, chief of Army research, said the radiation may preserve a greater variety of foods "with far better taste and texture than available from conventional methods."

Armies for 150 years have been eating out of cans, he said, and the defense department—with a 1 1/2 billion-dollar annual food bill—regards the advantages of radiated food as "of tremendous magnitude."

### Shortage Of Carpenters Threatened In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — A carpenter shortage after June 1 if new agreements are not signed was threatened by the Portland District Council of Carpenters in a statement Tuesday.

The council said it would not provide crews after that date for contractors who have not signed. This is a continuation of the disagreement between the Portland Council and major employers. Earlier in the year employer groups offered a 5 1/2-cent wage increase and the state council of carpenters accepted. The Portland group withdrew from the negotiations, seeking an added 10 cents and a higher travel allowance.

Clell Harris, executive secretary of the Portland carpenters, said some individual contractors in the Portland area have signed agreements granting the extra benefits. The others, he said, will have to sign by June 1 to keep their carpenters.



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## Canada Wants Assurance Of Getting Power Needs

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Future export of Canadian hydroelectric power to the United States will hinge on Canada's sharing on downstream benefits, a cabinet minister told the Pacific Northwest Trade Assn. Monday night.

Jean Lesage, minister of northern affairs and national resources, said any discussion of the U. S. tapping Canadian power resources must provide a formula which would guarantee Canada "an adequate and fair share" of any resultant power generated by her neighbor to the south.

Lesage said Canada stands ready to discuss drafting such a formula.

He urged an early meeting of "all parties concerned" to determine whether "they accept the principle itself, then we will have to discuss how it should be applied."

Lesage said Canadian members of the International Joint Commission already have proposed to U. S. members that a study be made of downstream benefits.

"I hope this proposal will be accepted and that such a study will be initiated in the near future," he said. "Otherwise, further delays in the development of the water resources of the Pacific Northwest will become inevitable."

The cabinet minister said he felt

the economic future of Canada's west coast will be jeopardized if sale "in the United States of on-site or downstream power from British Columbia at a price corresponding to the average cost of power presently available on the market" is permitted.

Canada, Lesage declared, could not be expected to use its own resources to encourage industries to locate south of the border where they would have cheap power, plus tariff protection and immediate access to the United States market.

"Our first duty is to use Canadian resources to foster Canadian

development," Lesage said. "We have always given consideration to the needs of our United States friends and we always will, but we cannot be expected to do that to our jeopardy."

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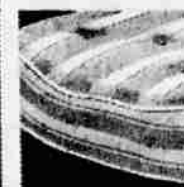
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
