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Eugene, Roseburg District Favorites In Friday Meeting

With strong Roseburg and Yoncalla teams leading the way, Douglas County qualifiers to the District 4 A and B track meets shoot for district titles and state meet berths Friday night at Springfield.

Roseburg, with 15 individual qualifiers in 21 events and a relay team, is a strong co-favorite with Eugene, the defending champion, to annex district honors. Yoncalla, with 12 qualifiers in 21 events, is rated along with 10 other teams, far behind the defending champion Lowell Tigers.

The A field, composed of 18 teams, is expected to provide outstanding duels in almost every event among the champions from each of the two subdistricts. Eugene is the Lane County subdistrict titlist and Roseburg won the Douglas-Coos county title here last week.

A comparison of winning performances between the two districts is listed below. Most rank with the state's best. Qualifying for the state A and B meets will be limited to the top three finishers in each event in each class.

The Pacific Coast League lead was packaged in a two-way tie Thursday—the knot being deftly looped Wednesday night when Los Angeles won a doubleheader from Seattle to knock the Rainiers from first place to third.

That put the Angels in a tie with San Diego's Padres, who had belted a homer by Ted Beard in the third—San Francisco's only run.

The Angels took the first game in the two-night twinbill, 7-5, in 10 innings, then wallowed the Rainiers 9-1 in the nightcap. In the second game Los Angeles collected 15 hits off Bob Kelly and Howie Judson while rookie right-hander Jim Brosnan kept Seattle in check with eight scattered blows.

In other contests Sacramento defeated the host San Francisco Seals, 4-1 and Oakland downed the Beavers 5-1 at Portland.

Portland Obtains Players From A's

Seattle and Portland moved to add muscles to their Pacific Coast League baseball teams by acquiring players cast off by the major leagues in Wednesday's cutback. Seattle bought first baseman Bill Glynn from the Cleveland Indians and acquired Lou Ortiz, who can play second, short and third, from the Philadelphia Phillies.

Portland obtained catcher Al Robertson and outfielder Joe Taylor on option from the Kansas City Athletics.

For both Seattle and Portland, the deals will necessitate cutbacks under Pacific Coast League rules limiting player rosters to 25 men after May 1.

Seattle plans were not announced immediately. Portland cut loose three players. Outfielder Russ Sullivan was sold to Columbus of the International League; catcher Ron Botlier was optioned to Columbus, Ga., of the Sally League, subject to 24-hour recall, and his brother, pitcher Bill Botlier, was sent to Spokane of the Northwest League.

Melting Snow Puts Many Streams In Unfavorable Condition For Fishing

Melting snow in recent days has brought up the level of many streams and put them in unfavorable fishing condition, the Oregon State Game Commission reported Thursday.

However, there is good fishing to be had in enough waters of the state that the weekend outlook is from fair to good.

The commission's report by districts:

Northwest

Although north coastal streams are in good condition, they have been giving up few fish. Also despite good water conditions in the Clackamas and the Sandy rivers, fishing there has been poor. Fair to good trout fishing is expected, though, in lower Willamette tributaries. Detroit Reservoir and Albiqua Creek angling has been fair and steelhead should be present in good numbers in the North Santiam between Slayton and Gates. The best west side prospects appear to be in the Luckiamute, Little Luckiamute and Marys River. The McKenzie and Willamette have been getting enough snow melt to slow up fishing somewhat. Reservoirs such as Dorena and Lookout Point have been fair to good.

Southwest

Cutthroat angling has been good in the Smith River. Trout fishing in Loon Lake and El Lake has been fair and in Tenmile Lake very good. Fair to good catches of rainbow and cutthroat continue in the north and south forks of the Coquille River. The east and middle forks are getting in excellent shape and the weekend is promising for at least fair bait angling. The south fork of the Coos River has been fair to good on cutthroats and improving on striped bass. The Rogue has been slow and so have been the upper and middle Umpqua streams due to high, turbid water. With warm weather melting the mountain snows, the outlook for the weekend isn't much better.

Central

Crooked River has been high and muddy and the same condition has been noted in the De-

schutes around Warm Springs, Mecca and Trout Creek areas. The outlook for improvement is not favorable. But Wickiup Reservoir has been improving and Ochoco Reservoir has been giving up fair to good catches. The Deschutes above Bend is fair to good. Odell and Suttle lakes have been good.

Northeast

Ice is now out of Wallawa Lake and while trolling has been rather poor, some good rainbow have been taken from the bank. The Wallawa River below Wallawa is muddy; the Imnaha River and tributaries are high and murky. Some good rainbow catches have been made in Lookingglass Creek, which is clear. Umatilla County streams are all high and murky except Walla Walla River and the upper north fork of the John Day River. Most Grant County streams are high and muddy and angling has been very poor. Morrow, Wheeler and Gilliam County streams also have not been good.

Southeast

The Owyhee River in Malheur County has been very good for trout. The various reservoirs have been generally fair but in Harney County Moon Reservoir has been poor. In Lake County there has been excellent success in Ana Reservoir but poor in Drews Reservoir. Camas Creek, somewhat high, has been yielding small catches of rainbow while its tributary streams have been excellent for small rainbow. Deep Creek has been too high for good success.

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
