Economical Production Urged On Cattlemen

CORVALLIS (AP) — Economical production rather than higher prices may hold the key to cattlemen's future beef profits, the Oregon Cattlemen's Assn. was told the group's meeting here.

Alan Rogers of Ellensburg, Wash., research chairman of the American National Cattlemen's Assn., said the lack of efficiency in feeding beef cattle was apparent from comparisons. Poultrymen, he said, get a pound of frying chicken meat from 2.5 to 3 pounds of feed; swine growers get a pound of pork from 3.5 to 4 pounds of feed; but cattlemen get a pound of beef only from 6 to 9 pounds of feed.

More research, Rogers said, is needed to get the beef production in line with other meat production. Earlier, association officers supported a plan to establish a state commission to raise funds to promote beef sales.

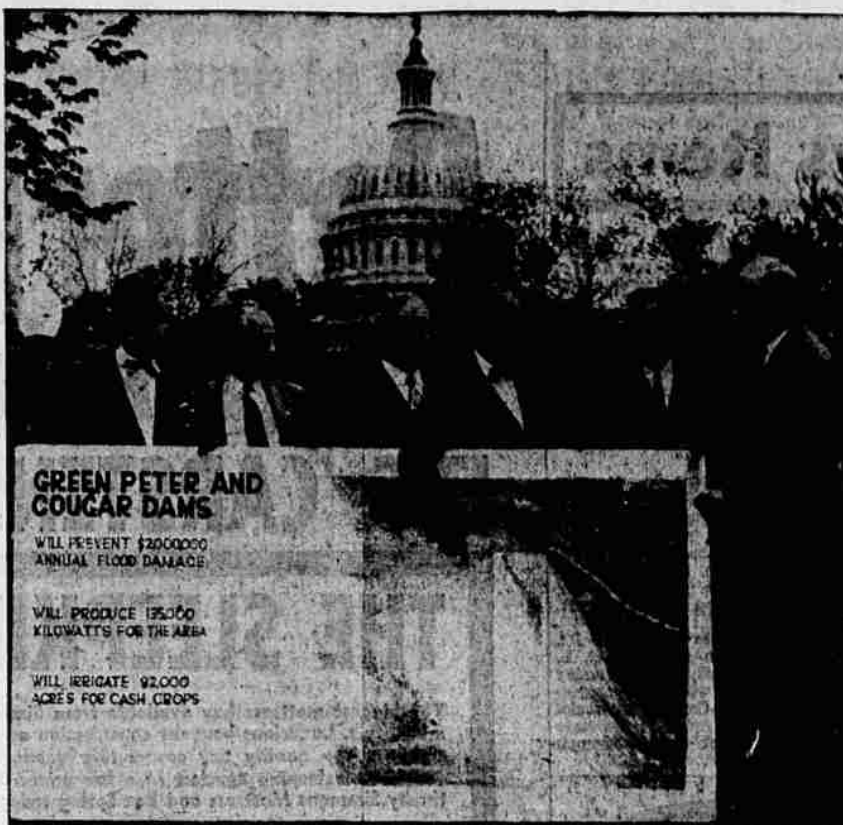

GREEN PETER AND COUGAR DAMS

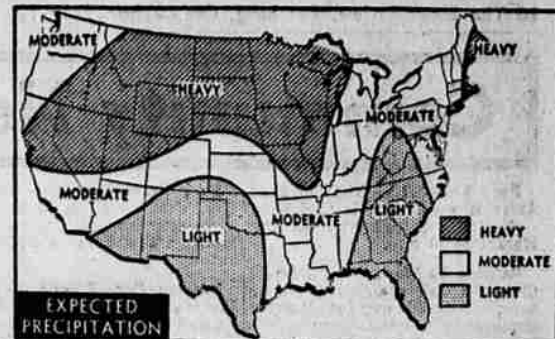

Formation Of State Beef Commission Approved

CORVALLIS (AP) — Formation of a state beef commission for promotion and research in the beef industry was approved here by the executive committee of the Oregon Cattlemen's Assn. Delegates attending the organization's annual convention here were to vote on the plan Wednesday.

The commission would be financed by a tax on each head of cattle sold. Tuesday's convention business included approving a resolution calling for a hunter's choice deer and elk season this fall.

Delegates also urged the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide additional funds for research on anaplasmosis, a disease spread among cattle by ticks.

The G. F. Swift Centennial Founders' award, for leadership in the livestock and meat industry, was presented to Herman Oliver of John Day.
