### Car's Efficiency May Hold Fate For Motorist

"In a tight traffic situation, your life may depend on the efficiency of your car. Don't delay—have your car safety checked today."

That is the advice to Roseburg area motorists by Mayor Ernest M. Barker Jr. as he urged them to participate in a vehicle safety check program which began today.

Three check lanes, operated by Roseburg Rotary Club members and city police officers, have been set up on Kane Street, Harvard Avenue and the North Umpqua Road.

Vehicles going through the lanes will be given stickers to show they have been checked. Workers will concentrate on 10 points, according to Rotary Chairman Harold Horn: Brakes, headlights, rear and stop lights, tires, wheel alignment, exhaust system and muffler, windshield wipers, windows, horn and rear-view mirror.

Chief of Police Stan Olson, coordinator of the overall program, reminded that the vehicle check is strictly voluntary, that the check will not be detailed and that no tickets will be written for defects.

If a defect is found, it will be recommended the driver have it corrected, then return for his sticker of approval. Mayor Barker has proclaimed this week "Safety Check Week" and has urged motorists to accept responsibility for public safety by running their vehicles through the check lanes.
