CINCINNATI (AP) — One of the most delicate responsibilities of a free society is to determine what is best kept secret and what should be made known, a Minneapolis editor said Saturday.

Carroll Binder, editorial editor of the Minneapolis Tribune, warned of the "danger of thinking that secrecy will provide security" in a speech before the Associated Harvard Clubs.

"Details as to the manufacture and performance of weapons which

our experts in such fields believe are unknown to the Soviet power need not and should not be made public.

"But it is extremely difficult to confine secrecy to that relatively small area. There is constant pressure from a great variety of officials at all levels, civilian and military, to extend the area of secrecy. These efforts must be combatted constantly . . . our free institutions will be scuttled by misguided efforts to save them."

Pinball Machines Will Be Banned In Baker

BAKER (AP) — Pinball machines will be banned in Baker under a proposed ordinance.

The City Council decided 4-0 against the machines.

The move followed City Mgr. David C. Koester's report that the city had received a check for a pinball machine license and under the existing ordinance had no basis for refusal.

A 1935 ordinance provides for licensing of a pinball machine a charge of \$100 for a master license and \$7.50 annually per machine. No licenses have been issued for a number of years.

France To Back Premier Diem

PARIS (AP) — Premier Faure said here that France the United States and Britain will do everything possible to support South Viet Nam Premier Ngo Dinh Diem.

Speaking to a crowded news conference, the premier said the U.S. Secretary of State Dulles and British Foreign Secretary Macmillan had reached total accord in their conferences here this week on a unified policy in Indochina.

Neither France nor the United States intends to intervene in the internal politics of Viet Nam, Faure declared.

Faure's declaration on Vietnamese sovereignty appeared to indicate that France and the United States for the time being are stringing along with Diem's handling of absentee chief of state Bao Dai.

Strong political factions in South Viet Nam have been demanding that the chief of state, installed by the French in 1949 and now living on the French Riviera, be deposed. Diem's associates have indicated, however, that the premier intends to ignore Bao Dai and let his future be settled by Viet Nam's first elected national assembly.

Neuberger To Turn Over \$500 Award To Linfield

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) plans to turn a \$500 award over to Linfield College next fall for a scholarship fund.

Neuberger is to get the award from the Five Towns Democratic Club on Long Island, N. Y., May 17, for outstanding achievement in politics.

He said he wanted it to go to Linfield "to help students whom the faculty regards as worthy of help whether they are Republicans or Democrats and with no regard to religious or social qualifications."

House Speaker Throws Punch At Legislator

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP) — J. Paul England, a school teacher and member of the West Virginia Legislature, had a black eye here and House Speaker W. E. Flannery acknowledged he threw the punch.

"I just lost my temper, and binged," the 50-year-old Flannery said. "I was sorry two minutes later."

England is 35.

The legislature is in special session, called to raise more money for schools.

Flannery and England, both Democrats, said their one-blow scuffle took place in Flannery's office late Thursday.

Both said it started when England called Flannery a liar.

"You'd better smile when you say that," Flannery retorted.

"I don't smile when I tell the truth," England said.

England said he threw up his arm to ward off Flannery's swing. It glanced off his wrist, breaking his watch band and hitting him in the left eye.

England was knocked off his feet. Later he was taken to a hospital, where he was treated for a hemorrhage of the eyeball. He returned to the House with a patch on his eye.

Injunction To Stop Low Flying Planes Asked

PORTLAND (AP) — Residents of a housing project near the Beaverton airport apparently are getting ready to ask an injunction to stop planes from flying over them.

Their attorney complains in a letter sent to fliers who use the airport that "the noise and vibrations from these planes are seriously interfering with the use and enjoyment of our clients' homes and properties."

"Under the circumstances, these flights constitute a trespass of the air space over their respective properties and a nuisance."

The operator of the airport, Walt Rupert, countered that he was there first. He said the field was established in 1929.

"The houses around here were built with the knowledge they would inevitably be in the traffic pattern of planes using this airport," he said.

Business Picture For Week Shows Continuing Upswing

 NEW YORK (AP) — The business picture this week was a composite of booming production, rising sales — and stiffening competition.

Almost everywhere, the accent was on the "hard sell."

Auto manufacturers, for the first time this year, were offering sales-incentive prizes to their dealers. Department stores slashed prices in fiercely competitive battles with

the neighborhood discount house; merchants of all stripes redoubled their efforts to lure new customers with easy credit.

Competition was reflected, too, in increased spending by business firms on new plants, new machinery and new equipment. Projects announced this week included: A \$2-million-dollar wood pulp mill for International Paper Co., a 30-million-dollar cellulose plant for Rayonier Inc., a 45-million-dollar atomic power plant for northern Illinois.

Over-all, the climate was one that seemed to favor the big, the strong and the efficient. There were hints of rough going ahead for less capably managed enterprises.

Still roaring along at or near peak levels were such basic lines as steel, automobiles and construction.

The stock market continued its downward drift this week amid indications that traders were sitting on the sidelines, waiting to see which way the cat would jump. Commodity futures prices were generally steady.

Favorite topic for professional economists was the current business boom — and how long it would last.

Roy Reiersen, chief economist of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, predicted "a period of very tough competition for sales and a battle to hold costs in line."

Henry H. Heimann, executive vice president of the National Assn. of Credit Men, deplored what he called the practice of guaranteeing present prosperity "by borrowing from the future." Said he: "The philosophy that there need be no adversity whatsoever in this country is false. Periods of adversity are natural in a free country."

Peoples Utility Districts May Properly Be Taxed

THE DALLES (AP) — A people's utility district may properly be taxed in Oregon, Circuit Judge Malcolm W. Wilkinson held here in a case in which the Northern Wasco County PUD had sought to avoid payment.

The state law which sets up the tax structure is a valid one, he said in a memorandum opinion, and does not run counter to the Constitution.

However, the judge held, a 1939 law under which 1950 taxes were levied was faulty. For that reason the PUD must pay only the taxes starting in 1951, when a new tax law was effective, he said.

At issue in the case was some \$20,000 in unpaid taxes and interest.
