From the looks of the past seven days, this may turn out to be a pitcher's year in the major leagues—their first since 1951.

It's been four years since the pitchers got together and confronted the hitters with as many as 13 guys who won 20 or more. Since then the hitters with the whammy have fallen off to six in '52, eight in '53 and six again last season.

Right now, 17 pitchers have won four or more (a year ago there were 13) and they've had help from the rest to give the majors a total of 39 shutouts to date. In each of the past three seasons there were only 35 scoreless performances on record at this stage.

Thirty-two pitchers have figured in the whitewashings, and 13 shutouts have come in the past week—including Don Newcombe's one-hitter at Chicago and Sam Jones' no-hitter against Pittsburgh.

There were three shutouts last night. Rookie Larry Jackson put the collar on National League, leading Brooklyn at St. Louis in a 3-0 Cardinal victory. In the American League, Alex Kellner

gave the Kansas City Athletics a 1-0 triumph for the New York Yankees against the Chicago White Sox.

Only two other National League games were played. Milwaukee took over second place, eight games behind the Brooks, by beating New York's Giants 9-4. Cincinnati made it six straight defeats for Pittsburgh 9-2. Cold weather shelved Philadelphia's game at Chicago.

In the American, Boston knocked off Cleveland 10-3 and Baltimore beat Detroit 3-2.

Jackson's no-run job on Brooklyn gave St. Louis its third white-wash victory in four games. The Brooks tagged the young right-hander for 10 hits, but when the chips were down, Jackson went to a curve ball and found the answer.

Survey Of Majors Scheduled By Frick

NEW YORK (AP)—Major League baseball, figuring it may be too close to the woods to see the trees, has turned to a private research firm to get the lowdown on what's going on in its own back yard.

Commissioner Ford Frick announced a plan yesterday which will survey baseball's current problems for the purpose of "keeping up with the times and getting our house in order."

As outlined by Frick, the research firm, Stephen Fitzgerald Co., Inc., of New York, will analyze such pressing problems as radio-televisual, major-minor league relations, and feasibility of expansion, falling game attendance, unpopular legislation, relations between front office and player and front office and the press.

Frick said a preliminary report may be ready for the club owners' summer meeting in July.

Additional Money Is To Be Asked For Fishing Rights

THE DALLES (AP)—Warm Springs and Umatilla Indians plan to ask Army Engineers for more money for loss of fishing rights at Celilo Falls.

T. Leland Brown of The Dalles, claims attorney for the Warm Springs Confederation, said the two Indian groups will hold a preliminary meeting in Portland, June 6, with the Army Engineers.

Both groups have agreements with the federal government to receive about 4 million dollars each for loss of fishing rights when Celilo Falls is inundated by The Dalles Dam backwater.

Brown said the payment to the Warm Springs tribe was based on a tribal roll smaller than the actual number of persons registered in the confederation. The additional names were not discovered until after signing of the agreement, he said.

In the Warm Springs contract, Brown said, the Yakima Indians were listed as having 3,637 members, but the actual agreement compensating the Yakima Indians credited the Washington group with some 4,000 members.

A portion of the Warm Springs compensation agreement authorized further negotiations if the Yakima Indians received a higher per capita payment on 3,637 members than the Oregon group, Brown said.

262 Entries Ready for State Meet Friday

CORVALLIS (AP)—The 29th annual state high school track and field championships open here Friday with some 440 athletes from 114 schools scheduled to take part.

There will be 262 entries from 73 schools in the class A division. Gresham leads the list of qualifiers with 12. Medford, the defending champion, will have 11.

In the class B division there will be 178 from 41 schools. Enterprise, last year's winner, qualified only two men for this year's meet. Monroe and Rogue River each will send 11 competitors.

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
