The YMCA summer recreation program for boys to start in Roseburg June 6 will be staged at the Central Junior High School, reports Robert Shewbert, director of the program. The site of the program had not previously been determined. Meanwhile, a meeting of parents and sons is scheduled Tuesday, May 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the Central Junior High auditorium. Shewbert and Don Naden, YMCA secretary, will present information on the method of operation of the program in this, its first year. The Tuesday program will include movie cartoons on how to swim, ride a horse and play football.

Temperature Hits Peak For 1955 Wednesday

Warmest temperature yet recorded for 1955 was chalked up Wednesday by the Roseburg branch of the U.S. Weather Dept. A sweltering 81 degrees was listed at 4:30 p.m. The warmest days of the year before May 18 had fallen on April 6 and 8 when 77 degrees was recorded. But the 81 high was nowhere near the "hottest" May 18 on record.

Twice since the weather has been recorded a temperature of 88 has been logged. That was in 1940 and 1884. It was the warmest May 18 since 1946 when 85 degrees was listed.

Tax Exemption For Local Rodeo Being Requested

PENDLETON — The Pendleton Round-Up is now tax-exempt, Rep. Sam Coon (R-Ore) said Tuesday.

Under a ruling from the commissioner of Internal Revenue the Round-Up is exempt from admission tax. The ruling followed passage of a bill by Congress, with Coon among the sponsors, under which rodeos are tax exempt if their revenues do not accrue to stockholders, directors or anyone connected with the show and profits are used for the show. The admissions tax formerly was 20 per cent and last year was reduced to 10.

It was announced Wednesday by Dr. Verner Anderson, a representative of the Douglas County Rodeo Assn., that the association is making plans to file for tax exemptions also. He said the association would file for exemptions from federal income and excise taxes and state income tax. He said the money from the rodeo is going to be used for civic projects.

President Eisenhower Vetoes Postal Pay Bill

in the public interest and fair to all the half million employees who man the Postal Service. He said the vetoed measure would impose "a heavier burden upon the taxpayer than is necessary."

Eisenhower listed these three reasons for his veto: "First, the bill creates new discriminations or inequalities which would affect many thousands of postal employees."

"Second, the bill creates grave administrative problems such as the establishment of thousands of individual pay rates. It forces awkward and unfair administrative practices in a government department whose operations affect every person, every enterprise, every community in the country."

"Third, the bill imposes a heavier burden upon the taxpayer than is necessary to establish salary rates throughout the department which will compare favorably with rates for similar work elsewhere in government and in private industry."

The President has indicated an average 7.6 raise is about as far as he is willing to go.

Partnership Dam Proposals' Fate Expected Monday

WASHINGTON — The fate of "partnership" proposals for construction of Cougar and Green Peter-Whitebridge dams in Oregon may be decided next Monday.

Chairman Davis (D-Tenn) said Thursday the House Flood Control Subcommittee then will consider the proposal submitted by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore) and endorsed by President Eisenhower. It will be determined, he said, whether the committee wishes to hold future hearings on the bill.

Spokesmen for local organizations desiring flood protection and utilities which would join the government in building the dams testified before the subcommittee several weeks ago.

Several Democratic members of the committee were sharply critical of the bill's provision to let local utilities control power features of the dams despite their assumption of that portion of the dams' costs allocable to power.

A similar proposal, related to Cugar Dam only, was approved by the committee last year, when the Republicans held a majority, and passed the House. It died in the Senate.

2,099 Local Cars Safety Checked The three-day total of cars going through the vehicle safety check lanes in Roseburg stood at 2,099 Wednesday afternoon.

Tallies kept by Police Chief Stan Olson show that some car-owners whose cars were rejected have reappeared to have their cars okayed by Rotarians and police manning the lanes.

So far, 538 cars have been rejected, but 54 have come back through the lanes and passed. So of the three-day total, 1,615, or nearly 80 per cent, have passed the 10 safety checks.

Wednesday, 535 cars, smallest total of the three days, were checked out in the three lanes in the city. Of those, 108 failed, but 14 car-owners brought their vehicles back in safe condition.

Chief Olson reiterated this morning that the safety check program is voluntary. He added, though, that the check is free of charge. The lanes are on Kane Street between Washington and Oak; Harvard Avenue near Douglas Community Hospital; and Second Avenue South near Third Avenue. All will be open between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. through Friday.
